

Austin, Texas.—Major legislation bearing on property tax values throughout the state has been passed by the House and sent to the

Representatives approved two separate measures which some contend provide for "the first major overhaul of the property tax structure in Texas this century."

HB 637 by Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso establishes a legislative tax board which will conduct an \$8 million statewide audit of taxable pige 5. property during the next two years.

HB 1463 by Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange would direct all property tax appraisals to be made by countywide offices. Local taxing authcrities would still establish their own tax rates and assessment ratios under the legislation.

The State Comptroller's office would develop standards and procedures for the county tax apprai-



Weeds are a problem in most home gardens and compete with vegetables for water, nutrients, and sunlight. They also may harbor many different insects and dis-

While hoeing, a fair amount of such features. hand pulling is usually necessary close around the base of plants. Concentrate on weeding when the base of plants and elegant detachment is achieved with a gallery or loft, because vegetable plants will be damaged as weeds are pulled out.

In addition to hand weeding, control weeds.

Mulching controls weeds keeping light away from seedlings and providing a mechanical barrier to weed emergence. Weeds that do come through the mulch are easily spotted and pulled thru the soil. Good mulching materials include straw, leaves, hay sawdust, wood shavings, bark, paper and palstic sheeting. If plastic sheeting is used, only the black plastic is recommended since clear plastic allows light to enter and actually encourages weed growth.

Chemical weed control presently has limited value in the home garden. While herbicides work well n single crop situations, it is more difficult to use them where a wide assortment of vegetables are occupying a small space. If herbicides re used, application methods must be followed carefully and only correct amounts should be used.

Chemical weed control is rather complex and perhaps is still too sophisticated for the average home So, the hoe is still the best bet.



Soils can be kept in a high productive condition if they are continuously managed properly. Soils that received good management while in grassland are usually in their best condition when first put in cultivation. The application and mainenance of the needed cropping system. along with other needed soil and water conservation practices, on each acre of cropland, will maintain soils in their best productive condition.

The rotation of crops whereby low residue producing crops are not planted on the same land for too many successive years, does not constitute a conservation cropping system. Crops must be grown in combination with needed cultural and management measures to carry out a conservation cropping system. Cropping systems must include the use of rotations that contain high residue and soil improving crops, as well as sequences in which the desired benefits are achieved with the use such crops.







The Question: When To Dryclean

If the label on your favorite pair of slacks indicates "machine washable," remember it's probably "drycleanable" as well. All washable fabrics may be drycleaned unless the label tells

Actually, fine cotton garments and household items look better and last longer when drycleaned. Drycleaning helps clothing retain its original appearance. For example, adding sizing to cottons improves the crisp feel of the material. Drycleaners can apply water repellent and stain resistant finishes to garments.

Other common fabrics which lend themselves to drycleaning are linens, silk, wool, specialty hair fibers, rayons, acetates, nylon, acrylics, modacrylic, knitted or woven polyester, metallic some spandex - nearly every type of material you can name,

Any fabric not marked drycleanable (certainly drapes and upholsteries) should be cleaned first by a professional or with the help of a knowledgeable coin-operated store manager.

While laundering your favorite knit garments may get out most of the dirt, drycleaning not only cleans but prolongs the life of your clothing. Your drycleaner controls the amount and time of cleaning action-minimizing the wear on the fabric in getting it clean.

Consider the value you place on each article—from the standpoints of original cost, fit and styling. Your garments are going to be around longer when cleaned by a quality-conscious drycleaner.

What are some of the services provided by professional and coin-operated drycleaners?

- Pre-spotting-treatment of badly soiled or stained areas with special solutions before the clothing goes into the drycleaning machine.
- Sorting—garments are normally sorted and cleaned according to color and type of
- Post-spotting—a hand process of removing spots and stains which may still remain after cleaning.
- · Machine or hand finishing -a process of removing wrinkles, reviving fabric texture and restoring original shape using special equipment.
- · Repairs-minor or major.
- Inspection assuring each article is properly cleaned, spotted and finished.



Trimming Appliance Energy Use

The federal government recently suggested that major appliance manufacturers increase the overall efficiency of their products by about 20 per cent.

That might make one assume that appliances are the primary cause of residential energy consumption.

The fact is, they run third in metered residential energy use, behind furnaces and other home heating devices, and water heating.

Also suggested was federal legislation to require increases in efficiency if a voluntary program among major manufacturers could not be established in six months. This might cause one to assume that appliance makers have been lax in improving the efficiency of their products since the energy squeeze began to tighten in the fall of 1973:

Actually, appliance companies individually, and through the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers, are striving conscientiously to contribute to the President's energy-saving goals.

In some areas, improvements far greater than 20 per cent already have been made in the past two years.

past two years.

For instance, the General Electric Company has improved the efficiency of its no-frost refrigerators significantly during that period. The addition of a power saver switch on all its no-frost models, and other improvements and redesigns, have helped reduce energy

consumption up to 28 per cent over the models produced two years earlier.

Many Hotpoint and GE dishwashers offer a power-saver option that permits the homemaker to select natural, noenergy drying when clean dishes are not needed in a hurry. Selection of natural drying can save up to 40 per cent of the power consumed by the dishwasher during a normal cycle.

One of the significant responses that manufacturers have made toward the drive for conservation of energy is their development of a wide selection of high-efficiency room air conditioners. Larger cooling coils and special fan motors incorporated into these units allow them to produce more cooling per watt of electricity than standard units.

General Electric's high-efficiency room air conditioners save an average of 26 per cent in energy consumption over the company's regular units.

And power-saver switches, added to 15 intermediate and larger-capacity GE models this year, make it possible for consumers to save as much as another 12 per cent in operating costs

Also available on many GE room air conditioners is a "Save Energy Range" indicator on the thermostat control to remind consumers that they can save approximately 5 per cent of the energy used for each degree of cooling given up.

Crowding Out

Goliath is pushing all the little Davids out of America's capital market. You and I will be poorer because of it.

The capital market is the pool of savings from which our economy obtains the funds needed to increase productive capacity create new jobs, and raise our standard of living. Feeding the pool are the individuals and institutions—

banks, savings and loan associations, insurance companies, etc —who have money to lend or invest.

Drawing from the nool are businesses whose earnings

alone will not cover the cost of replacing worn-out equipment or building a new plant, and consumers who want to buy a new house or automobile.

Both private businesses and consumers have to compete with federal, state and local governments for the limited

funds available in the capital market, because whenever covernment runs a deficit, it has to borrow money to make it up.

The capital market is the portion of our economy most responsive to the law of supply and demand. When there is a lot of money to lend, and borrowing by government,

business and consumers is low, interest rates will also be low.

But when we are in a situation such as we are in today, when total public and private debt is estimated at \$2.5

trillion, interest rates threaten to go sky-high.

Most of the pressure on the capital market comes from the federal government. During the next fiscal year, the federal government, in order to cover its mounting deficits, is expected to borrow 68 per cent of all the funds that will

be available to lend.

If this happens, interest rates could go through the ceiling. Some economists estimate they could go to over 20 per cent. This would be a "price of money" too high for many businesses and most consumers to pay. Production, employment and consumer spending likely would drop, thus deepening the recession,

The government could avert this calamity by "monetizing the debt," that is, by printing more dollars so that there would be more dollars to lend. But this cure could be worse than the disease. It would set off a roaring inflation that would make what we have experienced in the past seem mild by comparison.

There are only two solutions to this problem. Neither is quick or easy. We have to reduce the federal government's pressure on the money market by cutting government spending. And we have to increase the money supply in the capital market by providing incentives for people to save. Any other course leads to economic catastrophe.
