

Corned Beef For An Easy Dinner by Martha Logan



A roast is hard to beat when an easy dinner menu is wanted. Put-in-the-oven-and-forget preparation makes corned beef for oven roasting a busy cook's best friend. The roast is available with either a mild cure or with garlic and spice.

Corned beef means cabbage to many people. An attractive way of serving the cabbage is to make a slaw that is spooned into tomato shells. These are baked with the roast for individual servings. The stuffed tomatoes can then be brought to the table as a hot garnish for the roast.

Corned Beef For Oven Roasting With Cabbage-Stuffed Tomatoes

Swift Premium Corned Beef 1 teaspoon sugar for Oven Roasting 1/2 teaspoon salt 6 small tomatoes 3/4 teaspoon cracked pepper 1 small head cabbage, grated 2 tablespoons mayonnaise, if

1/4 cup chopped green onion desired, for creamier ½ cup sliced celery 2 tablespoons butter

Place corned beef on rack in shallow open pan. Roast in 325°F. oven until fork tender, about 21/4 to 23/4 hours. Slice top off each tomato. Scoop out pulp, strain and reserve. Drain any excess moisture from grated cabbage. Saute onion and celery in butter. Combine with tomato pulp, cabbage and seasonings. Mix well and spoon into tomatoes. Place in buttered shallow baking dish. Place in oven with corned beef during the last ½ hour of cooking time.







With so many prices skyrocketing these days, mushrooms have remained a good buy, often lower priced than in the past. Mushrooms, fresh or canned, add fine flavor and, at the same time, help extend more expensive foods. These Mushroom Stuffed Rolls are easy to make and can be served most attractively.

MUSHROOM STUFFED FISH ROLLS

- 1 pound fresh mushrooms or 2 cans (6 to 8 oz. each) sliced mushrooms
- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine 2 pounds fish fillets
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground white pepper 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup light cream or half and half

Rinse, pat dry and slice fresh mushrooms or drain canned mushrooms. In skillet heat 2 tablespoons of the butter; add mushrooms; saute until golden; reserve for later use. Sprinkle fish with salt, white pepper and half of the mushrooms; roll up, jelly-roll fashion. Arrange in greased 12 x 8 x 2-inch baking pan. Sprinkle fish with lemon juice; dot with remaining butter. Pour water over all. Cover with foil. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork, about 45 minutes. Carefully pour off fish stock from baking pan. In small saucepan blend flour with 1 tablespoon of the fish stock. Gradually stir in remaining stock; cook and stir until thickened. Stir in cream; add mushrooms; heat until hot. Pour over fish. Garnish with parsley, if desired. Yield: 6 portions.



Turkey In The Spring

Easter dinner deserves a festive meat such as tender, juicy, golden brown turkey. It's a special kind of meal that will be welcomed by the family. You can save energy by cooking a large enough turkey for the holiday meal so there is enough left for nibbling and later meals. As a buying guide allow 1½ pounds of turkey per person.

To make the turkey spring special, garnish the platter with slices of fresh lemons and limes and serve it with spring stuffing. The stuffing may be placed in the bird or baked in a casserole with the bird the last hour of roasting. Giblet gravy, honey glazed sweet potatoes and pineapple, a green vegetable, and hot biscuits will complete the main course. A dessert of your choice will finish the meal.

> Spring Stuffing for Turkey Yield: 9 cups (enough to stuff a 12 pound turkey)

3/4 cup chopped celery 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

3/3 stick (1/3 cup) butter or margarine

11/4 cups chopped cooked spinach
