DEATH ANGEL CALLS AT HOME! OF JOHN GOAD.

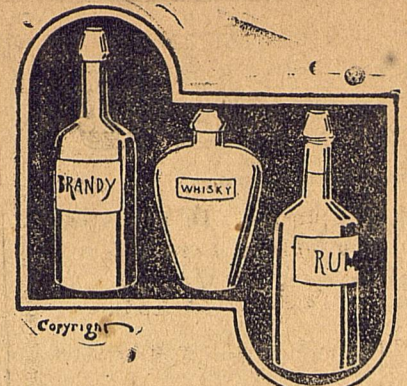

BIG DEAL IN LAND.

Wm. L. Black sells 2100 Acres of His Fine Tract of Land.
Another big deal in real estate was consummated in this city Monday morning when A. R. Pool sold for Col. Wm. L. Black 2100 acres of his fine tract of land above the town of McKavett.

The land sold lies along the north prong of the San Saba river, and is one of the best watered and most attractively located pieces of property in this whole section for an ideal farm and ranch.
L. H. McCrea, of Roby, Fisher county was the purchaser, and the price paid was \$10 an acre for 1,460 acres, and \$6.50 an acre for the other 640 acres, making the total consideration about \$19,000. The terms of the sale were one third cash, balance in five years, with 8 per cent interest on deferred payments.

Mr. McCrea will not move to this county at present, his intention now being to spend only the summer here but the Messenger makes the prediction that after spending one summer at his new place and enjoying the many advantages of living so close to God's country (which lies just eighteen miles east of the place he bought) he will be so well pleased that he will make Menard county his permanent headquarters.
