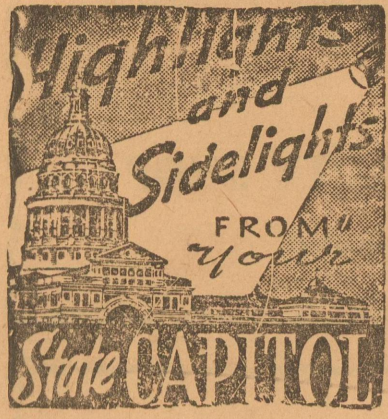

Austin, Tex.—Legislators are moving toward adoption of a scaled-to-income school finance bill, their No. 1 priority item in closing weeks of their 1975 session.

The House, on the third day of trying, finally reached narrow agreement on a \$721 million version of education finance overhaul.

Under terms of the bill, now before the Senate, school teachers would draw a starting pay of \$8,000 a year.

House Speaker Bill Clayton, who engineered the House bill after representatives scammed out running the cost up to nearly \$2 billion, termed the result a "responsible compromise."

However, it far exceeded the \$500 million to \$600 million then expected to be available for additional school spending.

Comptroller Bob Bullock was expected to send in a revised revenue forecast any day which could make it possible to spend as much on schools as contemplated by the House without additional taxation.

Test votes in both the House and in Senate subcommittee have gone against Gov. Dolph Briscoe's so-called weighted-pupil approach to distributing state school aid.

Indications are the bill finally agreed on in conference committee will follow pretty close present formulas for state education spending, and critics claim there isn't enough money to do an adequate job of equalizing opportunities.

Bills Advanced

Three bills designed to curb rising cost of medical malpractice insurance, which has led to doctor strikes in California, were passed by the Senate amid heated debate.

One of the bills provides for a malpractice pool to guarantee coverage for doctors and hospitals who cannot buy policies on the open market. Another sets up a system of rate filings with the State Insurance board. The third fixes limits of \$500,000 on recovery for malpractice, not including actual medical bills.

State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie expressed sharp displeasure over some of the measures.

Short Shorts . . .

Don B. Odum resigned as Texas Insurance Commissioner, one of state government's top regulatory jobs.

Texas Bureau of Business Research at The University of Texas sees signs of an economic revival just around the corner.

Local and regional chambers of commerce have been called on by the Governor to coordinate the new Texas First program to generate 4,000 new jobs in the next year.

Legislation to encourage development of geothermal energy resources has been sent to the governor.

The 1976 presidential preference primary bill also has been finally passed and awaits signature.

Drouth in the High Plains may cut winter wheat to 137.5 million bushels, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

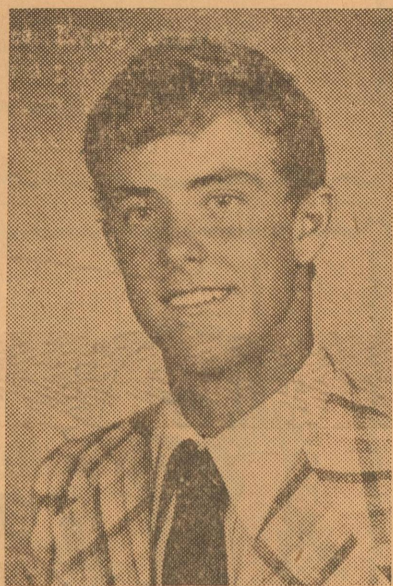
Smoking in public places will bring fines up to \$200 if the Governor approves a bill sent to his desk last week.

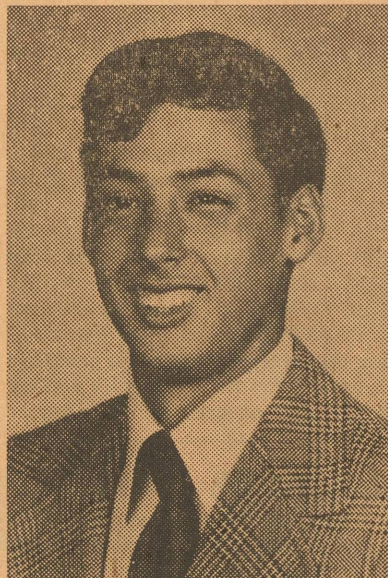
Four-Color Brochures On Fair Available

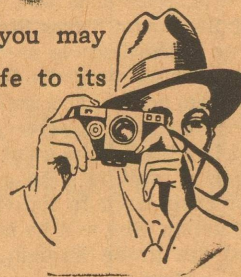
JAIME MINOR

THE HEARTY ROSE

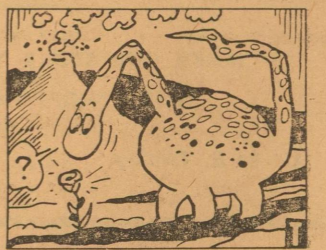
If roses are your favorite flower, join the ranks of rose lovers through history. Fossil roses have been found in Oregon dating back 35 million years.

One reason for the popularity of the rose is that it is marvelously hearty and will grow in almost any soil in every section of the country.

The basic requirements are that the ground be well drained and the site receive full or partial sunlight. To plant roses start with a hole 12 inches deep and 18 inches in diameter. Loosen the bottom soil and form a small cone of earth in the center. Carefully fan out the roots, place the bush over the cone and fill in soil over the roots to about four inches from the top of the hole. Tamp firmly so the roots are well anchored, and water thoroughly. Fill the hole completely and fill the soil one or two inches up the stock of the bush. After that, fertilize your roses two or three times a year with a fertilizer that's high in phosphorus and water them steadily and regularly, so the roots are always kept moist.

One thing to remember, however, is that insects like roses almost as much as people do. To protect your

bushes, it's a good idea to use an effective non-persistent pesticide like Spectracide Rose and Flower Spray. Spray on both sides of the leaves until they're dripping wet. You can also use Spectracide Garden Insect Dust to protect your roses effectively.



Rose lovers without much garden space will be happy to know that roses can be grown in containers. Any place that enjoys 4 to 6 hours of sunlight daily is suitable.

When you cut your roses, it's best to cut just above the topmost spray of fine leaves. It's better to cut off too little than too much, though pruning usually stimulates growth and helps prolong the life of the roses.

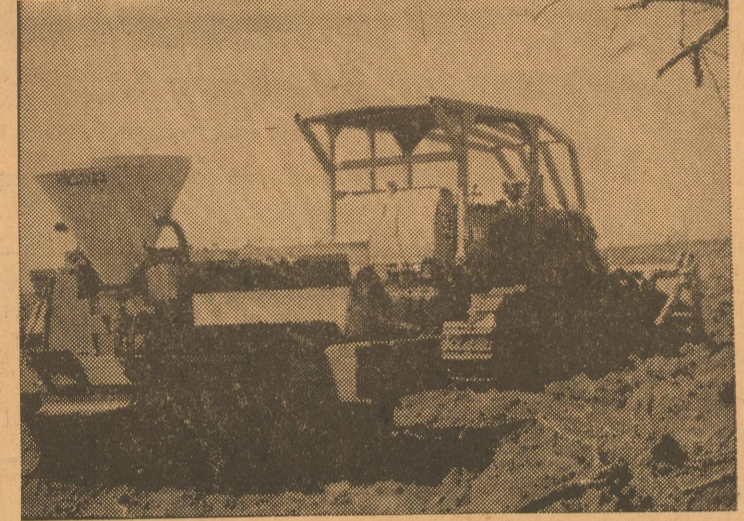

Brush Management and Range Seeding

Since sometime back in December the control of undesirable brush and range seeding are two conservation practices being carried out in the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District. To date 4,239 acres of brush management and 4,543 acres of range seeding has been carried out and cost share assistance has been received from the Great Plains Conservation Program.

It is estimated that some 780,000 acres in the district is infested with medium or heavy stands of brush such as mesquite, cedar, lote, agavito, and pricklypear.

Bill Rountree, District Conservationist assisting the district said—"During the past years brush has continued to get thicker on rangeland already infested. Also, brush is fast becoming a problem on rangeland where there was very little undesirable brush a few years ago. If we control brush at the rate of some 18,000 to 20,000 acres each year it will take approximately 39 years to get the brush controlled."

How long can we afford to allow undesirable brush to use our moisture that should be used for growing grass for our livestock and wildlife? Research has proved that it takes three times as much moisture to grow a pound of brush as it does to produce a pound of grass. Brush control alone will not as-

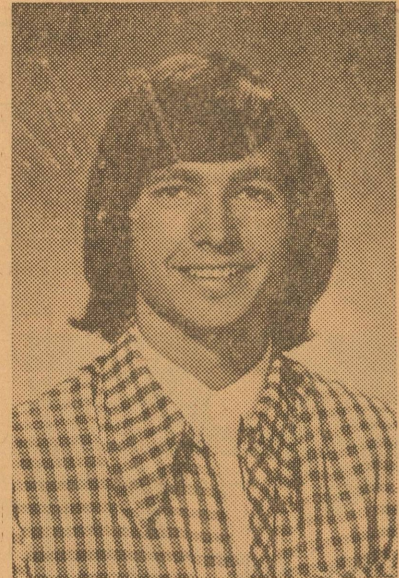

Eat the strawberries fresh in a variety of ways, but cook with them, too. And above all, include that old fashioned favorite, homemade strawberry ice cream.

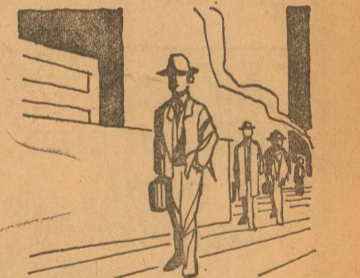
STRAWBERRY ICE CREAM

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/4 cup corn starch
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2/3 cup Karo light corn syrup
- 4 eggs
- 5 cups milk
- 3 pints strawberries
- 2 cups heavy cream
- 2 teaspoons vanilla

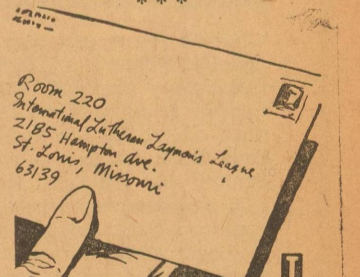
In heavy 4-quart saucepan stir together sugar, corn starch, salt, corn syrup and eggs. Gradually stir in milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until small amount spooned onto surface of custard mounds slightly. Chill. Rinse, stem and crush strawberries; stir into chilled custard. Stir in heavy cream and vanilla. Freeze in 5 or 6 quart electric or hand crank freezer following manufacturer's directions. Makes about 5 quarts.



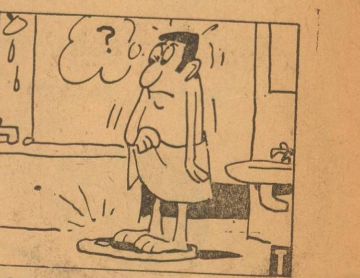

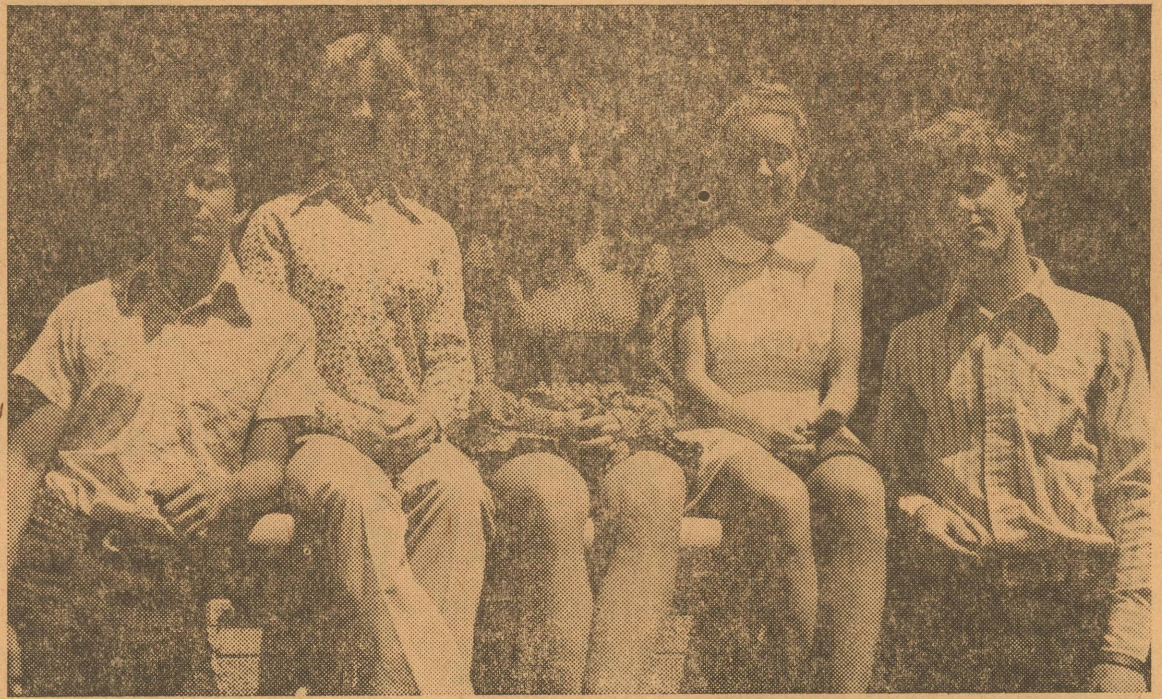

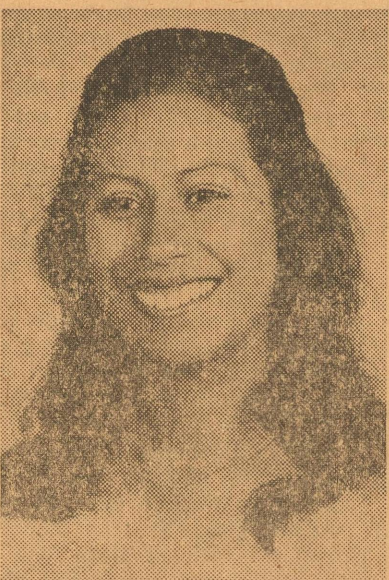
BRITT BUMGUARDNER

Arlington, Texas.—On Saturday, May 17th, Six Flags Over Texas welcomed its 25-millionth guest.

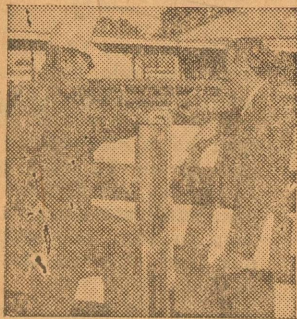
