My Experience as a Soldier To the Editor of The Success

Eldorado, Texas.

Ft. Statenburg P. I.
Sept. 10, 1908.

I will give a little sketch of my experience as a U. S. Soldier. I enlisted at Camp Mabry, Austin, Texas, August, 27, 1906, in Troop A 1st U. S. Calv., was sent from there to Ft. Clark Texas, where I stayed a year and 3 months wishing every day for the order to depart from that horrible place, finally the order came to sail for the Philippine Islands on Dec. 25, 1907. I was just returning from a furlough where I had been spending 30 days of pleasure with the good people of Eldorado, my dear old home. I oft-times sit and think of the pleasant hours I have spent around that glorious little Divide City and long to see the day when I will be back there. I am about to get off of my subject, the readers will think I am home sick, but anyway the boys were all tucked to hear we were going to the Philippine's. So on the night of Nov., 28th 1907, we had every thing ready to leave the next morning, and I don't think there was a man in the outfit that slept a wink that night, so glad we were leaving Ft. Clark. The next morning call to arms was given about 5 o'clock and we turned out full packed, in style to walk to

Spofford Junction about 10 miles, the band playing and every body giving a war hoop. We reached the rail road station about 11 o'clock, some of them still yelling, but I wasn't for I was to hear all in, and I wasn't by my self either. We boarded the train and it gave a long keen whistle and then we were off, bound for San Francisco Calif. I tell you we had a good ride before we got there, I saw some rough country while passing through New Mexico and Arizona, and some awful pretty country through Calif. We got into San Francisco about 12 o'clock the night of Dec., 3rd 1907, and went aboard the U. S. Transport Thomas the next morning. We all got shore leave that afternoon and saw the sights of San Francisco. The next day at 10 o'clock we began gradually getting out from the dock, and a boat began one of the boys was roaring and of a kind of whistle and a sad affair, and a sweetheart was about 3,000 and those docks and some girls, some were throwing kerchering, and some were imag, and some were cross, and some were cartri-

ges and many other things for keeps. I tell you there sure were some fine to king little girls there for a man to know he was going 8000 miles away to where there is nothing that even resembles a white woman. As we passed out through the golden gates, some of those old boys began looking down in the mouth, and I didn't feel the best in the world either. As I looked back over the city, I couldn't help thinking of mama ever little bit, by this time we began to get out to where the waves were playing ball with that old ship, it would get on the tip top of some of them and quiver for a little bit, then it would fall about 50 feet and my stomach seemed like it would push my head off, but I soon got use to it. The first ones to get sick was the ones that would look over the sides down at the water, pretty soon I saw one little fellow stagger over towards the center of the ship and begin to look pale, then he began disputing the measure, all the boys began laughing at him, and it wasn't but a little while until you could see them vomiting in every direction, some of them wishing the ship would sink, but the most of them got over it in a day or so and everything went on fine. And about 8 days we ran into Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands, there we stopped to coal the ship, and we got shore leave and surely did take in that place, and of all the pretty places I ever saw that undoubtedly is the gar-

den spot of the world. We left there Dec. 14 and didn't see a speck of land until we came to a little island away out in the middle of the Pacific Ocean named Guam, a lonesome looking little old place, we didn't get a shore there, we just stopped about two hours to take on some Marines that were stationed there, the next land we saw was when we got into the Sanardena Strait then in to Manila Bay where every body was glad to see. The next morning we left the boat and got on the Manila and Digupan rail road which led to Ft. Statenburg 65 miles north west of Manila and when we got there the 3rd Cavalry gave us a nice reception, they were all just running over with joy thinking of getting to leave Ft. Statenburg where they had been for two long years among these unsivilized Savages. Now I will give you a little of my opinion of the Philippines, the soil is mostly just common sand and the hole country is cut to pieces with swamps and deep gullies, and there is mountains here that a man could travel for a month and never get to the top, you can't ride a horse over the country in but few places and those are just narrow trail-ways and you have to walk then and lead the horse half the time. There is all kinds of water here, Creeks and running Rivers. The principles occupation here is raising rice and hemp and quite a lot of ribbon cane, all the farming tools they

have is a crooked bamboo stick with a Caribou or an Australian ball dragging it through the mud about a knee deep. They have a few horses over here and they are just about as big as a good size jack rabbit, practically good for nothing, there is all kind of fruits growing wild every where, but a man never know when he will get a hold of the wrong banana, for it is especially adapted to the terrible germs, of cholera, and when you swallow that germ it is worse than ruff on rats. I saw a case not long ago while on a practice march where there were 14 dead Goo Gooes in one shack, and the way we got rid of the cholera germ in that case was we just touched the shack, Goo Gooes and all on fire. When a soldier dies with cholera they destroy every thing around him and cremate his body, they do that in order to keep the disease from spreading, for they claim the germ breeds over 3 milliam a minute it is not very bad among soldiers for they use all the preventatives possible, and are very careful in regard to cleanliness. This country is laid off in precincts that is something similar to a county, each prec., has a different language, but the worst unsivilized National they have over here are the Igaraty, they are a very small class of people and they live up in the mountains, they will run from you just like a wolf, they have little bamboo shacks up in the hills, to see it at a distance it

would put you in the mind of a good size rats nest, they were a little bunch of bamboo leaves tied around their body and carry a bow and arrow. There is lots of game here such as deer wild hogs etc., but the grass is from 6 to 10 feet high and a man can't do any good hunting in day time and it is not a safe plan to go out at night among these reptiles and Igaratys in these jungles, of course if a man has got a bottle of this native drink they call beno he isn't a afraid of the reptiles or any thing else, as long as the beno last, for when you are under the influence of it you can eat lightning, bight ten penny nails into, fight bull dogs or do most any thing. I don't want you think that I am a beno lover, but if it hadn't for beno I would have been scared to death a dozen times since I have been over here. Well I will close for this time and tell you the rest when I come home, if I don't have the misfortune of a many a poor soldier run into the sharp edge of a bolo but I will never do that unless I stomp my toe and fall down, for when I am scared I can out run any Goo Goo that ever was in the Philippine Island.

THE VOTERS' DUTY TO COUNTRY CHILDREN.

At the election on November 3d the voters of Texas will decide whether there shall be incorporated into the Constitution an amendment to Sec. 3, Art. 7, which relates to public schools.

To adopt this amendment would accomplish these results.

1. It would empower every rural school district to levy a local school tax by majority vote of the property-holding, tax-paying voters.

2. It would grant to each district the right to levy a local school tax at any rate not greater than fifty cents on the one hundred dollars of property valuation. A vote for the amendment is not a vote for a tax on any one; it merely authorizes a district to settle school taxation for itself.

These two results are in harmony with the fundamental principles of Democracy—local self-government and majority rules.

The Fathers of Texas laid a splendid foundation for our system of public schools; it is our duty to manifest equal intelligence and patriotism in building on that foundation.

Give the country child a fair chance, and on your ballot scratch Against Amendment to Sec. 3, Art. 7, relating to public school.

In voting for Bryan, you can do so, knowing that his campaign fund was not made up by the big Trust.

To THE SUCCESS,

After reading the THE SUCCESS over and seeing the many good things said about grand old Schleicher, it indeed makes one feel better and makes one feel glad that they live in such a grand and glorious country, this county has a grand future and in fact there are few if any place in Tex, that has such possibilities before it, as Schleicher county has with its wonderful soil that will grow any thing that can be grown in dirt. Our soil is as rich as the best land in Kansas or Nebraska, our crops this year are simply wonderful. Much of our land was poorly prepared for a crop and would not have yielded the seed that was planted on it in many Eastern counties, and yet we are harvesting 3 4 of a bale per acre of cotton, of course farming is in its infancy as yet and we need more up to date farmers, many men who were raised on horse back are not prone to take the hoe and dig from early to late and consequently are not converted into real farmers yet, but we are demonstrating each year just what can be done here on the farm. We should have commenced early to collect our best specimens of farm products for the fair and could have made the best exhibit of any county in Texas. Owing to the rush to get cotton all gathered, school will not commence for several days yet. Quite a lot of the Vermont farmers will try to get to gather their own cotton and thus keep what they have made. There is not much in farming when one has to hire everything done.

"So it is not what one makes that's profits, but what he saves."

Most of the cotton raised here is marketed in Eldorado, the buyers paying San Angelo prices less one dollar per bale for freight.

The farmers of the Vermont neighborhood will raise about 200 bales of cotton.

TO DEMOCRATIC VOTERS
Lockhart, Texas, Oct. 21, 1908.
Chairman, Democratic County Committee, Schleicher county.

Dear Sir:—

I write to you again urge upon your attention, and to request that you urge upon the attention of the Democrats of your county the importance of getting out a full Democratic vote at the ensuing election, on Tuesday, November 3rd. While the overwhelming majority of the votes cast in the state of Texas are certain to be registered in favor of the Democratic candidates, it is important, as Mr. Bryan has repeatedly called attention to. The Commoner, from the standpoint of the national prestige of the Democratic Party, that every possible Democratic vote be gotten in the polls in Texas and the other Southern States. In a large part of these states, the Democratic majority is so overwhelming that but a small proportion of the Democratic vote is registered; and, as a result, the Democratic party loses the benefit of a large popular vote to which it is entitled. In the State of Texas, four years ago (in 1904) the Democratic ticket received only 167,000 votes, as against 50,000 cast for the Republican ticket. There were approximately 350,000 Democratic votes cast in the recent Democratic primary in this state, and it is safe to say that there are 500,000 Democratic voters in Texas, but in view of the well known overwhelming Democratic majority in the state, and in practically every congressional district and county, little or no interest is taken in the November election; and, consequently, the vote cast is very small in comparison to the real party strength.

The news from the other sections of the country is most encouraging and there is much ground for the belief that the splendid fight Mr. Bryan is making will be rewarded by his triumphant election to the Presidency.

Let us put forth every effort to give him the largest possible popular vote; and to that end, let us bring to the polls, on November 3rd, as nearly as possible the full Democratic strength in the state.

To this end, I wish to request that you call your Democratic County Executive Committee together at the County Seat of your County on Saturday, October 24, and that at such meeting you devise plans to get out every Democratic vote possible at the election on November 3. I suggest that at such meeting your Committee issue an address and have the same published in your local papers, urging the voters to go to the polls and cast their ballots and presenting to them the importance to the Democratic party, from the National standpoint, of so doing. Let us use every effort to remove the opportunity for Republican members of Congress to taunt our Texas representative with the small vote cast at our November elections, and to urge this as a ground for favoring the reduction of Southern representation in Congress.


