By enrolling in the Texas Tomorrow Fund, the State of Texas guarantees tuition and required fees will be paid regardless of how much they increase. By saving through the Texas Tomorrow Fund, a four-year education at one of Texas' public colleges and universities would cost the parents of a newborn \$104 per month until their child is ready for college.
