1. Read the owner's manual

disengage power to attachments and give blade ample time to 4. Be extra careful when

THIS FOWL IS FAIR

A barbecue recipe on which you can steak your reputation as a cook, this turkey has a saucy dressing that makes it taste better than you probably thought a bird could be.

BARBECUED TURKEY STEAKS

Have the meat man electric-saw a large frozen turkey crosswise into 1 inch slices. Cut large center slices in half for the grill; remove and reserve gizzards and bony ends for other uses. Brush the frozen steaks with Barbecue Sauce (below) and thaw at room temperature. Grill 5-6 inches from the coals, about 20 minutes in all, until cooked through. Turn and baste often with the barbecue

BARBECUE SAUCE

1/2 cup oil

- 1/2 cup Bourbon 1 onion, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, mashed 1 teaspoon crushed black
- peppercorns 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
 Blend well, use to marinate and broil turkey steaks.

Makes about 1-1/4 cups.



Here's a real honey of a dish that can light up the night for your guests, yet is light to the taste and doesn't take a lot of time and trouble to put together.

FLAMING FRUIT KABOBS

- 1/3 cup orange liqueur
- 2 tablespoons honey 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3 peaches 3 firm bananas 1 can (about 13 ounces)
- pineapple chunks bamboo skewers 1/4 cup additional orange liqueur warmed (for

flaming) Combine 1/3 cup orange liqueur, honey and cinnamon. Cut each peach into 8 slices, cut bananas into 1-inch lengths, drain pineapple, arrange about 4 pieces of fruit on each bamboo skewer. Dip into orange liqueur mixture and turn to coat fruit pieces completely. Broil over hot coals about 5 minutes, turning. Place on heat-proof platter. Ignite 1/4 cup warmed orange liqueur and pour flaming over fruit. Serve when flames go out. Makes 16-20 skewers, 8-10 servings.

WASHINGTON-Crime pays. That's the grim truth, It's time we faced up to it.

Figures released by the FBI for 1973 reveal that there were 8,638,400 major crimes reported in America. This included 19,510 murders, 51,000 forcible rapes, 382,680 robberies, 416,270 aggravated assaults and 2,540,900 bur-

Expressed another way, there were 16 serious crimes committed each minute; one violent crime every 36 seconds; a forcible rape every 10 minutes; a robbery every 82 seconds; an aggravated assault every 76 seconds; a burglary every 12 seconds; a larceny or theft every 7 seconds. That was in 1973. The crime rate has risen substantially since

The victims pay by far the highest price for this veritable epidemic of crime. But crime bears a price tag that all of us must pay. That price last year was nearly \$90 bil-

U.S. News & World Report magazine calculated that in 1974, organized crime—through its interests in gambling, narcotics, hijacked goods and loansharking-took \$37.2 billion from the American people. Crimes against property and business totalled \$21.3 billion. Other crimes, such as homicides, assaults and drunken driving, added up to \$9.5 billion. Law enforcement costs were \$14.6 billion, and pri-

vate crime fighting costs totaled \$6 billion. Experts list a wide variety of "causes" of crime, but it should be clear to all of us that the principal cause of crime is criminals. And for far too many criminals, crime does pay. The risk they run is too small, compared with the profits, to be an effective deterrent.

FBI statistics reveal that only about 21 percent of all serious crimes are "cleared" by arrests. Only about 5 percent are "solved" by convictions. And a steadily diminishing percentage of those convicted are being sent to prison. The prison population in all state and federal penitentiaries is smaller now than it was in 1960, although a vastly greater number of crimes are being committed each year. The principal problem, I'm convinced, is with our courts.

Our criminal justice system has become heavily biased in

favor of the criminal, at the expense of the victims of crime

and law-abiding society as a whole. The time for reform is long overdue. We can, I'm certain, carry out the prosecution of criminals efficiently and with justice, without endangering the civil liberties of the innocent. We did for nearly 200 years before the "reforms" of the Warren Court. We are all in favor of due process for the accused, but we should never forget that the potential victim has just as much right not to be violently molested as the person accused of such



crimes has to a fair trial and a skillful defense.

DO IT YOURSELF The era of the do-it-yourself tinker with automobiles which began to fade with the passing of the Model T is making a strong comeback today. With costs of repairs increasing so rapidly, it makes good sense to do routine

maintenance checks yourself. Here are some tips on what to

watch out for: 1. BRAKES, A sagging pedal may indicate a hydraulic leak. Other danger signals are squealing, grabbing or locking of brakes. The hand brake should be capable of holding the car on a steep hill when the transmission

is in neutral. 2. TIRES. Look periodically for cuts, breaks, embe worn spots on the treads and sidewalls. Tire pressure should be checked every two weeks and before every long trip.



3. GOOD HOUSEKEEPING. Lives can be saved through good housekeeping inside your car. Keep it tidy with clean windows and no loose objects on the back shelf. To remove soil, grease, grime and stains from rugs, fabric upholstery and vinyl, use an effective deep cleaner, such as Simoniz Car Interior Cleaner. Vacuum or brush first to remove

loose dirt.
4. MUFFLER. Holes that rust through mufflers not only broadcast noise, they let deadly carbon monoxide fumes escape and cut down on a car's performance.

Screwworm Alert Sounded

Warm weather and rains over a big part of Texas have combined to provide ideal conditions for the most serious livestock pest in the state—the ever-menacing screw-

Stockmen should be particularly alert for this flesh-eating pest at this time because infestations can build up rapidly in late spring and early summer unless all cases are reported as soon as possible.

Regular herd checks and the treatment of all wounds is essential to keep screwworm cases at a minimum.

Any worms found in livestock wounds should be sent to the Mission Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. Kits for mailing the worm samples are available from the county Extension office and local livestock inspectors and veterinarians.

If the worms are confirmed as being screwworms. sterile male flies will be dropped over the area where the confirmed case origin-These sterile males mate with the female screwworm flies, and the eggs that are produced will not hatch. 

HIGHLIGHTS OF AMERICAN HISTORY Col. William Prescott At The Battle Of Bunker Hill



1775. A detachment of some 1,200 Continental soldiers, commanded by Colonel William Prescott, a spirited veteran officer in the Massachusetts line, moved cautiously under the darkened sky. Their mission was to fortify and defend a hilly zone in the Heights over-looking Boston. The British were fast closing in.

Paced by Colonel Prescott two sergeants laden with dark lanterns, the force pushed toward the Heights. At Charlestown, they were met by wagons carrying entrenching tools.

The written orders were

for them to man Bunker Hill. But upon arrival at the Boston outskirts, plans were amended. It was decided that Breed's Hill, about 700 yards nearer to Boston, was a more advantageous posi-tion for the defense of the town and ports.

The lines for fortification. were mapped out. The men stacked their guns and packs, seized their trenching tools and got down to work. Colonel Prescott sent out

The date was June 16, a patrol to ferret out any enemy movement at the foot of the Heights. Not willing to trust the vigilance of others entirely, Colonel Prescott twice went down to the water's edge, investigating every sight and sound.

At dawn, the Continental soldiers were discovered by British ships of war floating on the nearby waters. The alarm was sounded. The captain of the Lively, the nearest ship, opened fire upon the Hill. Others followed and the battle was on.

This historical scene of embattled men digging "fox holes," with Colonel Prescott's towering figure standing atop the parapet bravely urging them on amid flying cannon balls, is colorfully recaptured in a painting by F.C. Yohn, part of a collection owned by The Continental Insurance Companies.

Encouraged by the spirit of their commander, the Continental soldiers com-pleted the earthworks in time to battle the onrushing British soldiers. And they



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
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
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
