Elections Square Away

With passing of the filing deadline recently for local elections, Success printers will be busy this week printing ballots and delivering them in time for start of absentee voting on Monday. Little interest is foreseen, however, since most nominees are unopposed.

On the hospital district ballot, Winnie Jackson will be a hold-over nominee with Evelyn Wimer and Raymond Hall as new nominees. Retiring from the hospital board will be Mrs. Geneva McWhorter and John Edward Meador.

On the City ballot, Mayor Raymond L. Mobley and Aldermen Bobby R. Sykes and W. E. McCravy will be listed for re-election without opposition.

City of Eldorado voters will also vote April 5th on the 1% city sales tax. Official notice of that election is given inside this Success issue and will be repeated next week. The 1% city sales tax was voted on here about 2½ years ago and was rejected at that time by a slight margin.

The Plateau Underground Water Conservation & Supply District will elect directors on April 5th. Mort Mertz will be director at large and precinct directors will be: Ford Oglesby, 1; James L. Powell, 2; (write-in), 3; and Earl Lloyd, 4.

April 22nd is date set for county voters to join others over the state in a Special Election on two constitutional amendments.

The first consolidates retirement systems, and the second sets new salary rates and per diem for members of the legislature.

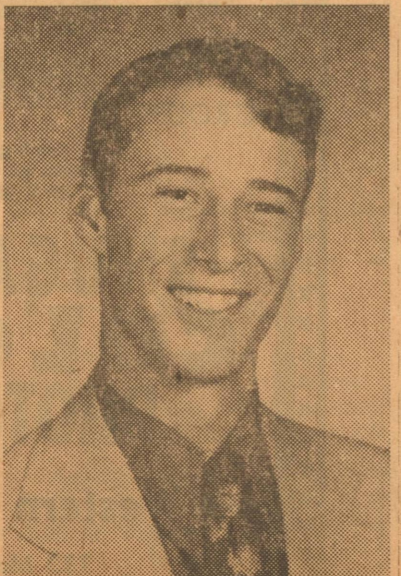

Mrs. Arch Mittel was appointed as chairman of the projects committee.


Mrs. Carroll Retliff was appointed to get some pictures to be used in arts and crafts.

Fertilizer Tips For Gardeners

A knowledge and use of good fertilizer practices is important for one gardening.

The contents of a fertilizer are shown by three numbers on the label. The first gives the percentage of nitrogen; the second, the percentage of phosphorus; and the third, the percentage of potassium. The numbers tell the buyer how many pounds of a particular nutrient are in the fertilizer. A 50-pound bag of 10-10-10 contains five pounds each of the three plant nutrients (50 x .10 equals 5).

Nitrogen, a nutrient essential for plant growth, development and green color, it often deficient in soils. It generally needs to be applied more frequently than the other nutrients because it tends to wash out of the soil. Nitrogen should be used sparingly, though, as excessive amounts will burn plants as well as cause excessive growth.

Lack of nitrogen in the soil causes yellowing of lower leaves, stunted growth and reduced flowering.

Phosphorus, which is necessary for the development of younger plants, does not need to be applied as often as nitrogen. It should be mixed well into the soil when applied as it does not move down more than a few inches.

Plants lacking phosphorus have abnormal bluish-green to reddish-purple lower leaves and tender growth.

Potassium, a nutrient necessary for growth, maturity and the chemical balance of plants, is usually adequate in Texas soils. However, deficiencies may occur in sandy soils.

Lack of potassium will result in mottling and browning along the edges or older leaves.

Iron and zinc are two minor nutrients which are sometimes deficient in alkaline soils. Plants use only minimal amount of the nutrients, so they should be applied cautiously to the soil.

Manures make doubly good fertilizers because they condition soil with their high organic content while at the same time contributing to soil fertility. However, manures contain about 10% salt and should be applied properly to prevent salt burn.

It is recommended adding manure to soil a few weeks before planting and then following with irrigation.

If using manure as a surface mulch, apply during the fall or winter and keep it from direct contact with stems and roots of plants.

Garden Check List For March

1. Begin spraying roses for black-spot control. Use Benlate, Manzate or Folpet at 7 to 10 day intervals.
2. Time to make that application of complete fertilizer on the lawn area. Grass and trees will all benefit.
3. Last chance to make any corrective pruning on summer flowering trees and shrubs unless you are willing to reduce flowering.
4. Good time to plant any container grown or balled-and-burlapped plants. Time for planting bare-root plants will soon be past.
5. Complete your planting of pansies, petunias, snapdragons and

pinks early this month. Other plantings to be made in March include vinca, moss rose or portulaca, copper plants, lantana, zinnia, marigold and petunia in the sunny locations.

6. Watch tender new growth for plant lice or aphids; they look like tiny pear-shaped objects and may come in green, red, black or brown colors usually clustered on the young tender shoots and leaves.

7. Check the garden section in your local library. There are many excellent books available on almost any gardening topic you can imagine. Also check the County Extension office for information.

8. Just because you are ready to garden, don't bite off more than you can chew. In other words, a small well-cared-for garden is always more productive than one that requires more work than you have time to perform.

9. Reread those color ads about garden plants. Do they really say what they appear to be saying? Check the mailin address. If the source is out-of-state, chances are that the varieties are not suitable for your area. Also, don't be a sucker for other fraudulent ads and door-to-door salesmen.

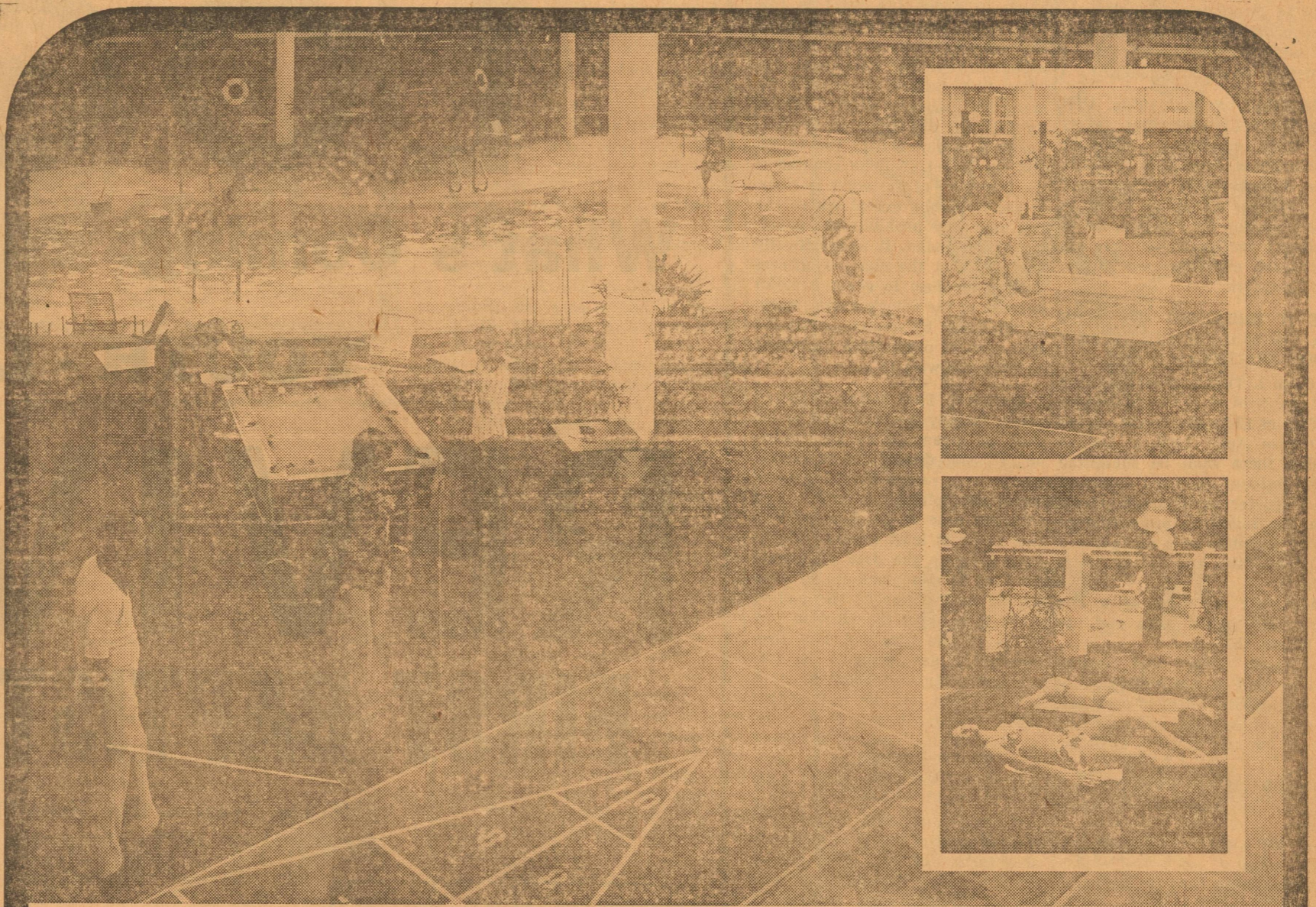

SPECIAL ELECTION

TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Eldorado, Texas on the 5th day of April, 1975, on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

An Ordinance ordering a Special Election to be held in the City of Eldorado, Texas, on the question of the adoption of One Percent (1%) local Sales and Use Tax within the city; designating the day of the election and the polling place; appointing election officials therefor; providing that all duly qualified resident electors shall be qualified to vote; prescribing form of ballot; providing for Notice of Election; containing other provisions relating to said election; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village. Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ELDORADO, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Eldorado, Texas, on the 5th day of April 1975, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

City Fire Hall, Polling Place.
Mrs. Billie Andrews, Presiding Judge.

Mrs. Billie Porter, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint 1 clerk.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Eldorado, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the

requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, or Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.93, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Eldorado Success is a newspaper published within the City of Eldorado, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. Severability. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or sentence of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 8. Repealing Clause. All ordinances and resolutions of the City of Eldorado, Texas, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 9. Emergency clause. Whereas, it appears that to hold this election in conjunction with our general election on April 5, 1975, an emergency exists requiring the rule providing ordinances be read at separate regular meetings of the City Council be suspended, and that this ordinance be fully adopted and made effective from the date of its passage and approval.
