





EADS BRIDGE: THE IMPOSSIBLE DREAM

BUILDING A BETTER WORLD



The 100-year old Eads Bridge in St. Louis, a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark.

If you are thrilled by "they said-it-couldn't-be-done" storries, the construction of America's Ead's Bridge which was completed in 1874 should make an exciting addition to your collection.

It was the biggest bridge ever built up to that time, was beset by troubles and tragedy during the seven years a civil engineer took to complete it, and had a lot of people saying it would fall down when the first train started across.

The three-span bridge, the first major railroad link over the Mississippi, joining St. Louis, Mo., with East St. Louis, Ill., has affixed to it a least identifying it again. plaque identifying it as a national historic civil engi-neering landmark. The Ameri-can Society of Civil Engineers - a 69,000-member society--has so far designated 38 landmarks, including bridges, canals, railroads, buildings and other historically significant civil engineering projects.

The 1,627-foot bridge of stone piers and sweeping steel designed and built by James Buchanan Eads has two levels, the upper for a roadway and the lower as a railroad crossing. In addition to being structurally a monu-ment in bridge building it is

also considered to be one of America's most beautiful bridges.

The remarkable Captain Eads pioneered many innovations: His bridge was the first major construction of any sort in steel; the first to use hollow tubular chord members-arching gracefully between the masonry piers; the first to use cantilever construction methods entirely, avoiding the need for falsework; the first to use pneumatic caissons in the use of large piers. The caisson that Eads sank for the east abutment foundation remains today, the deepest at which workers in compressed air have ever worked.

If anything could go wrong during construction it did. Thirteen men working in cai sons below the river died from "the bends." The partially completed bridge was damaged by rampaging floods in the spring and high walls of jagged ice in the winter. Once it was smashed by a tornado. Ships bringing materials from Maine sunk. The rolling mill preparing steel for the bridge blew up.

But Eads never gave up. And now his magnificent bridge is a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark.



Closing The Garbage Gap

More than 23 years ago, Jas- | States last year. per, Ind., a typical small Midwestern county-seat town, attracted national attention as the first city in the United States to ban the storage and hauling of wet garbage. Its alternative: require every home be connected to the sewer system and to install a garbage disposer.

The success of this daring maneuver to eliminate breeding places for flies and rats soon encouraged other cities to follow Jasper's lead - Tell City, Ind., and the Wisconsin communities of Shorewood, Glendale and Whitefish Bay, for example.

Today, with many cities, large and small, concerned about ecology, and the skyrocketing costs of solid waste collection and disposal, these pioneer communities are once again being closely studied for the lessons to be learned.

One happy difference is that today, with the advent of the household trash compactor, communities also can deal with the mounting problems of collecting and disposing of solid wastes such as boxes, plastics, aerosol cans, and glass containers.

And in a time when the nation's output of solid waste is approaching a staggering 350 million tons a year, trash collection becomes an economic as well as an environmental problem. An estimated \$4.5 billion was spent collecting and disposing of trash in the United | "garbage gap."

Naturally, food-waste disposers and trash compactors figure heavily in the minds of city administrators concerned with garbage and trash disposal.

In a community using both appliances, the collection job would be simplified from 3-to-4 garbage cans per family a week to a single compacted cube of trash each week.

Several test programs have been conducted recently verifying the environmental benefits as well as collection and disposal savings from the mass community usage of household trash compactors, according to N. Powell Taylor of the General Electric Company. He cited a recent one-year study in Atlanta by the Environmental Protection Agency which produced dramatic trash collection savings through the joint use of disposers and compactors.

Taylor points out that the EPA report recommends regulations requiring trash compactors and food waste disposers for all new residential construction and proposes a plan for mass community usage of household compactors along with once-a-week curbside collection.

If Americans continue to generate garbage and trash at an increasing rapid rate (and there is every reason to believe that they will) it may require a step even bolder than Jasper took 23 years ago to begin closing the
