Plans For New School Building

Accepted, Bids Will Be Received By June 26th For
It's Erection.

Erection For Bonds Will Be Submitted About Middle Of July.

E. Stanley Field, Architect of San Angelo, one of the firm of Waller Shaw & Field, was in our city this week with some school house plans and met with the Board Wednesday morning and submitted his plans which was accepted by the Board. The Board informed us that they will be ready on June 26th to receive bids for the erection of our new school building, which will be a monument to our city and which will help make the Eldorado High School the best in the West. The election for the bonds will probably be submitted to the voters of this district the middle of July.

R. B. COUSINS FAVORS HIGH GRADE TEACHERS FOR SCHOOLS.

Austin, Texas, June 3.—R. B. Cousins, State superintendent of public instruction, talked today of the demand for high grade teachers. He said:

This is the season of change among the schools and teachers. There is a greater demand in Texas for teachers of good preparation than has ever been known before. I have been asked oftener this season to recommend teachers of the first rank than in any previous season. I am informed by men in the State colleges and in the denominational colleges of the first rank that those institutions have been unable to supply the demand for high grade teachers.

This increased demand for people of this kind is due to the fact that in these prosperous times many of the best men and women have been attracted to other lines of endeavor by the greater financial returns offered by other callings and professions and have quite teaching. All things considered, the teacher is the poorest paid man in the country.

The public will never receive the best class of profession service until the people feel the need of men of the first rank to mold the character and fix the ideals of the children and the young men and women of this State, and will make it possible for a qualified man to devote his life to this great work without sacrificing the comforts of life that are enjoyed by men of like talent and success in other lines of useful employment.

Another cause for the increasing demand for better prepared teachers is the general awakening of educational sentiment all over the country. Intelligent people everywhere will not be willing for their children to be in daily contact with inferior men and women as soon as they give the matter any attention.

Young people who read this article should remember that there is nowhere any pressing demand in desirable localities for teachers who measure their accomplishments by the grade of certificate held. Backward and backwoods communities talk about wanting teachers holding second grade certificates, rather than third

grade certificates, and they talk about wanting a teacher with a first grade certificate, and sometimes they hold in a kind of contempt teachers holding a lower grade certificate; but desirable positions demand teachers of character and scholarship—those whose attainments are indicated by college degrees.

TROUBLE THAT ARISE.

Much trouble arises between trustees and teachers, due to a lack of understanding of the contract. Let it be understood at the beginning of each year that trustees and teachers should have a contract in writing. In the common school districts the blanks furnished by the State should be filled and signed by all parties to the contract. There should be no verbal understandings, but whatever is a part of the contract should be written and attached to the regular forms. In independent districts the written records of the board and the written acceptance of the teachers elected, should contain all the points of agreement that the contracts should embrace.

The trustees are not the "bosses" of the teachers, like the owners of a store or other business enterprise are bosses of the employees, but they are parties to a contract. They can not dismiss a teacher unless the teacher proves to be incompetent or violates his contract. When boards dismiss teachers they should remember that their actions are subjects to review by those in authority above them, and that the questions of real contractual rights and school laws will be applied to their actions.

The contract should be regarded as a compact of honor. The trustees should not undertake to violate it without much provocation, and teachers should not violate it for any avoidable cause. Either party may ask to be released, honorably, from a contract, but neither party should abandon one without the consent of the other; and asking to be released should not become a habit with teachers.

Trustees frequently make unnecessary and harmful changes in the corps of teachers. Some boards are easily swept off their feet by glowing recommendations of transient teachers, and lay aside faithful, thought plodding, teachers, who are worth more to making a solid character for their children than the brilliant bird of passage that flits from school to school, collecting autograph albums of glowing and meaningless recommendations. On the other hand, many teachers, especially men of parts and promise, keep their eyes and ears open always for something better in the way of prominence and pay, instead of remaining in their present position long enough to make them prominent in good qualities among schools of like character, and profitable to their patrons and pupils. This ceaseless change of teachers, is harmful to both schools and teachers. —Houston Post.

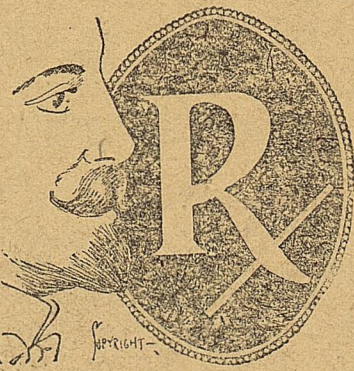

LEADING CITIZENS ABROAD, SINGING PRAISES OF THEIR SCHOOL.

Saturday afternoon, Prof. Smith, principal of the Eldorado school, and Dr. C. H. Murphy, a member of the school board, looked over the plans for the new school building at Schleicher county's capital and seemed well pleased with them. The plans are in Waller, Shaw & Field's offices.

In conversation with a reporter, Prof. Smith stated that in the Eldorado independent school district are about one hundred and fifty voters, four-fifths of whom he thinks will vote for the issuance of bonds for purpose of erecting a new building and equipping same. The election, he states, will perhaps be ordered for some time in July. There were something over two hundred pupils enrolled at school last term, and Mr. Smith is confident that the number will be increased considerably when the building is finished or even started, as many people from the county will move to Eldorado to get the advantages of a good school. Last term there were five teachers in the school.—San Angelo Daily Standard.

CHINA WEDDING DAY.

Thursday June 3rd was the 20th anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Doty's wedding-day, while they did not celebrate their china wedding-day, some of their many friends remembered them by sending them some presents of china.

The Groom was probably the most law-abiding tax assessor that Texas has ever produced and served in that capacity for four consecutive terms after the organization of this county.

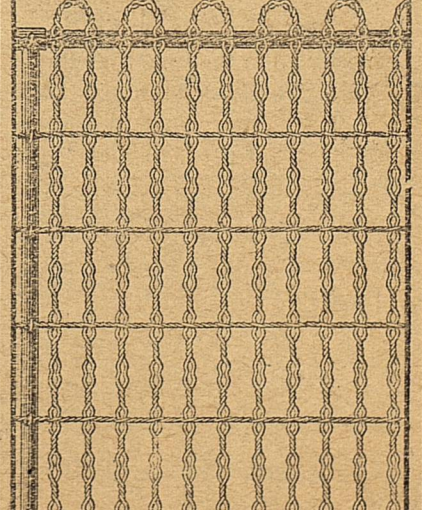

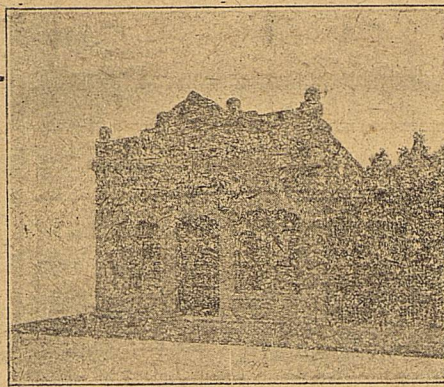
