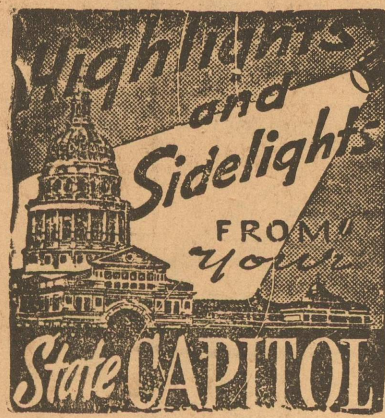

Austin, Tex.—Insurance made news again, as the State Insurance Board hiked rates for homeowners coverage effective February 16. Board staffers a week earlier recommended an average 17% increase statewide in auto insurance premiums.

The Board-approved homeowners' rates will increase at an average of 8.3%, fire insurance rates on homes 7.9% for single-year policies and 14% on three-year policies. Rates were far less than those requested by the insurance industry.

Homeowners policy rates and extended coverage (storms, hail, riots, accidents, etc.) vary by territories.

Homeowners' rates for average residences would increase as follows:

- Seacoast, 7.6%.
- Central, 7.6%.
- North-Northwest, 12%.

Rate on a \$35,000 brick veneer home in Galveston will go from \$940 to \$1,021 for a three-year homeowners policy. The same type home in Houston would see a rate increase from \$814 to \$886, in Austin from \$654 to \$714 and in Lubbock from \$1,137 to \$1,283.

Amount of the annual increase on the same home would be \$17 in Galveston, \$24 in Houston, \$20 in Austin and \$49 in Lubbock.

#### VRA Study On

The House Elections Committee began a "major study" of effects of the recently extended and expanded Voting Rights Act on Texas. The Committee will try to gauge impact of the law on local governments and recommend legislation needed to help smaller governmental units comply with complex VRA requirements.

All governmental units, under VRA, must submit to the U. S. Department of Justice any changes in their election laws, procedures or voting precinct boundaries dating back to Nov. 1, 1972, and in the future.

Elections Committee Chairman Rep. Luther Jones of El Paso said many small cities and other units don't have resources or required data to make full submissions and will have serious difficulty complying with requirements without assistance.

#### Short Snorts . . .

Dr. Philip Gramm, a conservative economics professor on leave from Texas A&M University, has entered the Democratic U. S. Senate primary, challenging Senator Bentsen for re-election. The Senate's impeachment trial of Judge O. P. Carrillo has been postponed again—until November 18th.

A malpractice insurance company set up by the Texas Hospital Association has received approval of the Texas Insurance Commissioner.

Cigarette tax income to the state increased \$4.5 million (to \$22.3 million) from September 1974 to September 1975.

Opponents of the proposed new constitution are outspending proponents in the November 4 campaign. Opponents have taken in \$14,785 and spent \$8,701, while proponents raised \$8,701 and spent \$4,253, according to official reports.

#### L. T. Cain Completes 40 Years With Shell

L. T. Cain, station attendant at Shell Pipe Line's Eldorado Station, has recently completed 40 years of service with the company. #### Market Report

College Station, Tex.—Pork supplies are at a 40-year low—with "features" for the consumer practically "non-existent with the exception of bacon and sausage," according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt.

Mrs. Clyatt is consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

At other meat sections in Texas grocery stores this week, she advised consumers to check poultry price.

"Fryer chicken supplies are adequate — price-wise and tastewise, they are an excellent buy. Chicken hens are good values, and turkeys are featured in some markets this week.

"Also, as large-size eggs become more abundant, their prices will drop.

"Currently, best beef values are found on corned beef, ground beef, liver, stew meat and chuck roasts — and there may be a slight increase in beef supplies, which could result in slightly lower prices," she added.

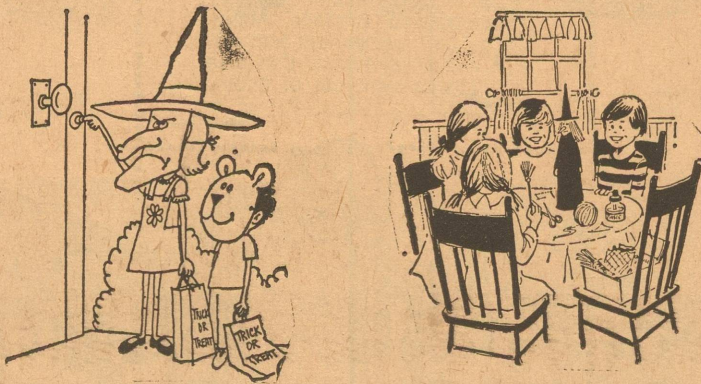
At fruit counters, grapes are in good supply with several varieties no available. The specialist said quality choices depend on freshness and brightness—with most quality grapes having a powdery or cloudy appearance on the skin, called "bloom."

Vegetable economy includes broccoli, cauliflower, eggplant, rutabagas and hard-shell squash, along with sweet potatoes and pumpkins — all of which Mrs. Clyatt termed "good quality at reasonable prices."

Other economical choices include cabbage, carrots, turnips & greens, mustard, green peppers and collard greens.

Consumer Watchwords: Although Texas grapefruit is now available by the pound or by the bag, its quality will improve—and prices will trend downward, as the season progresses.

**County Ag. Agent's Column**

**Prepare Compost Pit This Fall**

Do you have grass cuttings, table scraps or livestock manure you need to get rid of? Are you troubled by what to do with fallen leaves? Do you have a sunny, well-ventilated area somewhere in your yard?

If you answer "yes" to all these questions, then what you need is a compost pit.

A compost pit is a good way to dispose of waste products without polluting the air by burning or adding to the garbage load. Furthermore, the compost can be used as a valuable fertilizer or mulch for your own yard or garden.

Compost is produced in a pile or pit in a sunny, well-ventilated area with almost any type of waste material. If the pile is properly prepared, it will be free of weeds and odor. Support the compost pit with wire, lumber or other type of well-ventilated material.

To start the pile, apply one-to-two inches of soil, then add a two-to-six inch layer of leaves or grass cuttings. For the last layer, add one-to-two inches of manure. If manure is not available, apply one-to-two cups of commercial fertilizer per square yard of surface area. This layering process may be repeated a number of times.

The top of the pile should be dish-shaped to catch rain. Keep the compost moist but not soggy. Turning the compost pile every five-to-six weeks will speed up the decomposition. Depending on the season and the material used in the pit, the compost should be ready to use in about four to eight months.

**Take Landscape Inventory**  
Have you made an inventory of your home landscape recently? The fall season is the ideal time to check the home landscape and decide whether replacement plants or improvements are needed.

Maybe a rose bush has died or failed to live up to expectations, or there is a gap in the shrub border where a new plant is needed. Is shade adequate in the outdoor living area for optimum enjoyment? Make a list of landscape needs and be ready to take advantage of the selections offered to the alert gardener by garden and nursery centers.

The natural inclination is to put off garden work until late spring when everything is greening up and spring flowers are in bloom. Suddenly the urge comes to plant

trees and shrubs, and we rush out to buy plants only to find pick-over stock. We remind homeowners that balled and burlapped plants and those grown in containers can be planted any time of the year. Many of the deciduous plants, those that lose their leaves each fall, are more easily handled or transplanted in a bare root condition. For best results, set out bare root plants in late fall and winter from mid-November through February in most areas of Texas. Planting during this period provides ample time for good root development before new top growth begins in the spring.

With proper care, bare root plants can be set out as late as March and April. Success, however, is dependent upon the condition of the nursery stock used and the care they will receive after planting. For ease of maintenance and to reduce disease and insect damage, always select landscape plants that are native or adapted to the area in which they are planted.

**Kale For Fall Gardens**

If you want to keep your family supplied with a nutritious, leafy green vegetable all winter, try planting kale in your fall garden. Kale, sometimes called borecole, is a biennial vegetable similar to cabbage or collards.

The nutritional value of kale is higher than that of many other vegetables because it contains a form of calcium that is more easily broken down in the human digestive system. The calcium contained in chards, spinach and beet greens is non-usable in human nutrition.

Common home garden varieties are Improved Siberian and Dwarf Blue Curled. Plant kale 1/2 inch deep in rows 36 inches apart with individual plants about two inches apart. Plant a 5-to-10-foot row of kale for each person in the family.

As the plants begin to grow, thin them by pulling out every other plant. These thinnings can be eaten. This will leave about four inches between plants. Wait until the plants begin to touch again, then repeat the thinning process. Do this until there is about 12-16 inches between plants.

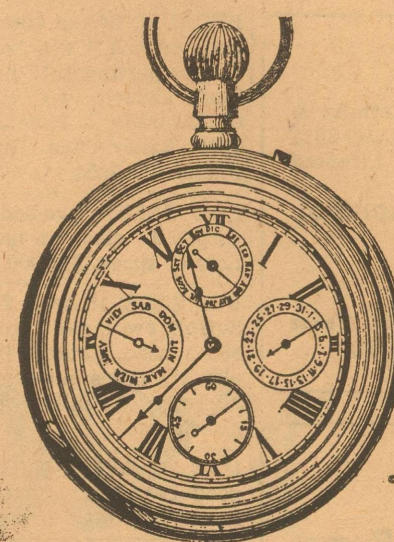
"True" harvesting begins about two months after planting. This is done by pulling off one or more leaves from each plant. Never harvest more than one-third of the top growth of a single plant.

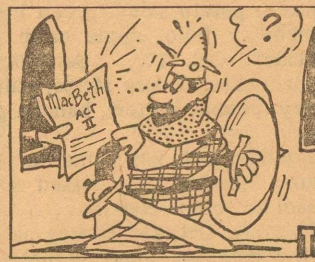

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**MANAGING YOUR FAMILY'S FINANCES**

By Dr. Carl F. Hawver

**Q. I've got a good job but I can't seem to get ahead financially. In fact, in recent months I can't even pay all my bills. I don't know where the money goes! How can you manage money if you don't have any left over to manage? It's all spent before I get it.**

**A. If you really don't know where your money is going it's time you found out. Put all of your income in your checking account and pay all your bills by check. For cash needs like lunches, car fare, etc., have each member of the family write down expected needs for the next week and write one check on the same day each week for your total cash needs. At the end of a month you'll have a reliable record of where your money is going. At the end of three months you'll have a pretty good average as a guideline.**

Then make a list of everything you spend money for each month and how much. Next mark the list, #1 for most important to you, #2 for next most, and on down to the least important. Then consider giving up some of those on the bottom of your list. Cut till you get the monthly figure well under your monthly income. If you have too many monthly payments for credit purchases, consider consolidation to lower the monthly payments—and stop using credit till it's paid off. There is just so much money—YOU decide what you want it to buy for you. Don't leave it to chance.

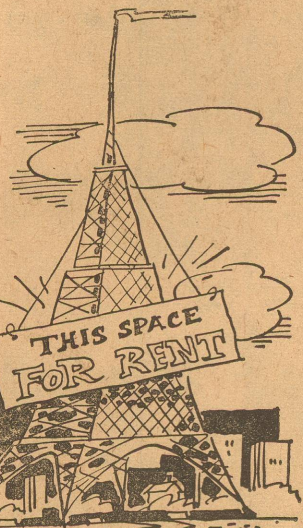
**FIRE PREVENTION TIPS**  
 Taking steps toward fire prevention should be second nature. Our families and homes are important.

That landmark of Paris, the Eiffel Tower, which was erected for the Paris Exposition of 1889, later boasted the world's greatest advertising sign. From 1925 to 1936 the word "Citroen" in electric lights of six colors ran down the length of the tower—the letter N alone measured over 68 feet in height—and could be read 24 miles away.



Next time you're visiting that American landmark, the Washington Monument, chances are you'll notice that the top half is not exactly the same color as the bottom half. That's because so long a period had elapsed between the times when the bottom and top parts were erected that the quarry had run out of the same color stone.

A monument that nobody could really see would be an oil rig built 54 miles off the coast. To see just the tip of a 200 foot drilling tower, a person would have to stand, on a hill a full 1,662 feet above sea level. This is 412 feet higher than the Empire State Building. Among the Atlantic offshore tracts proposed to be offered at oil drilling lease sales by the federal government, experts at American Petroleum Institute have pointed out that the nearest is 54 miles from shore!

- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves.
- 2/3 cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk
- 3 cups (about 2 large apples) finely diced peeled green apples
- 1 cup chopped walnuts

Cream butter and sugar in large mixing bowl. Beat in eggs, vanilla and coffee. Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves together.
