Proponents of the far-reaching County Museum. revision to be voted on November 4 have opened an Austin headquarters under the direction of former State Supreme Court Chief Justice Ronald Earle of Austin.

Opponents, for the time being led by State Sen. Peyton McKnight 'Texas Publisher:' of Tyler, are setting up shop in an office building across the street.

First copies of a proposed voter's guide to the revision document were placed in the mail last week. They present complete text of the eight propositions to be voted on, love, who is now deceased. with a comparison summary of the "-old" and "new" constitutional provisions.

Acknowledged opposition has centered largely on the proposal for annual sessions of the legislature—a 140-day session during oddnumbered years and a 90-day meeting on even-numbered years.

House Speaker Bill Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, concerned over effect of the opposition, asked an ending of World War II with Jaattorney general's opinion on whether the short, even-year session could be limited by law or legislative rule to budgetary and emergency matters.

Their proposal immediately stirred strong disapproving comment from both proponents and opponents of revision(indicating, perhaps, a hot campaign during the next three months.

sparkling, fresh vegetable soup of Spanish origin, try adding shrimp the next time you make it. Or add shrimp the first time. It's witchcraft. Gazpacho is a very successful cold soup to serve outdoors because, traditionally, it is spooned into the plate or bowl over ice. By all means serve it with crusty bread well laced with garlic butter, well sprinkled with Parmesan chasse and lightly togeted. cheese and lightly toasted:

BLENDER SHRIMP GAZPACHO 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) shrimp 1 medium cucumber, unpeeled, sliced 1 green pepper, sliced 1 medium onion, sliced 1 garlic clove 4 sprigs fresh parsley 4 cups tomato juice

- Juice of 1 average lemon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon vinegar (optional)


Have shrimp and other main ingredients chilled. Place cucumber, pepper, onion, garlic, parsley in a blender. Set on "chop" speed, if available, or turn blender quickly on and off for chopping action, stopping before mixture be-comes pureed. 

Once you have saved, borrowed or otherwise acquired the money to pay for a longdreamed-of vacation, the question arises: How will you carry it? Cash is too dangerous, credit cards not useful in all circumstances and personal checks almost useless - especially in a foreign country.

Obviously, you want a means of exchange that will provide both wide international acceptance and protection against loss, and nothing fits that bill better than travelers checks. Available to vacationers since the end of the 19th century, these selfidentifying money orders are widely accepted by hotels, merchants and restaurants because they include a guarantee that they will be honored by the issuer if proper cashing proce-dures have been followed.

Protection against loss is provided by the bank or issuing company itself, provided that you have agreed to and met certain conditions stated at the time of purchase. Specifically, you must be able to provide positive identification of yourself and supply the receipt or the numbers of the lost or stolen checks, or at the very least the name and address of the bank or place where you bought them and the date on which they were purchased.

Then too, you must strictly follow the signature identification system. When you purchase travelers checks, you will sign them once in the presence of



cation required. Travelers checks may be obtained in various denominations, usually \$10, \$20, \$50 or \$100. In recent years, they have also become available in the U.S. in some foreign currencies. The fee to purchase them is nominal - normally about one per cent of face value, or \$1 for \$100 worth of checks. In some cases, they are free to bank customers. Some final tips for safety and quick refunds when checks are

lost or stolen: • Carry your checks in an in-side pocket or money belt and keep them in your possession at

all times. • Keep the purchase receipt in locked luggage or the hotel safe, but do *not* keep it with your checks. If they are lost or stolen, the receipt would also be gone. You might even want to keep a list of the check numbers at home.

• Keep a record of the numbers of the checks you cash, when and where you cashed them and the amount involved. so you will know which ones were lost or stolen. And finally, • Do not sign the checks the

second time until the moment you are ready to cash them. If your lost or stolen checks have been signed twice, you will probably have difficulty in obtaining a refund.

REDDY'S REFRIGERATOR **SAVINGS TIPS**

- Return fresh foods to the refrigerator and frozen foods, such as ice cream, to the freezer as soon as possible. Measure and remove the quantity needed for cooking or for the table, and refrigerate the remainder at once.
- \bullet Use cold controls efficiently by selecting the settings that provide about 36° F. in the refrigerator and o° F. in the freezer.
- Fill the refrigerator with food, but be careful not to overfill. Make sure that food packages don't block air vents in the freezer or refrigerator section.
- Clean the condenser surfaces of the refrigerator; dirt restricts air flow and acts to insulate the condenser, forcing the refrigerator to work harder and longer to maintain proper temperatures.





How To Improve Home Lighting, Cut Cost

Homes of the future, say lighting experts, may well be illuminated with highly efficient light sources which will last 10 to 20 times longer than today's household incandescent bulbs. They will substantially reduce harsh shadows and will bring out the color vibrance of interior walls and draperies as well as floor and furniture coverings.

When will these sources be available? They are right now, according to Nancy Christensen, lighting specialist for the General Electric Company. They're called fluorescent tubes.

"There's no big technological breakthrough needed to adapt fluorescent lighting for use in the home. All that is needed is for consumers to recognize its advantages."

Ms. Christensen says many consumers still think of fluorescent lighting in connection with stores and offices, and that fluorescent tubes give off an unflattering blue-white light.

"When fluorescent lights were first introduced in 1938, this was the case," she says. "But today deluxe fluorescent tubes actually enhance flesh tones and all colors in the home."

Deluxe cool white tubes especially complement "cool" colors such as blue or green, while deluxe warm white tubes are generally preferred in rooms dominated by browns, yellow, red or wood tones. Deluxe warm white fluorescents blend well with incandescent lighting to achieve a warm, "homey" environment.

From a more practical stand-

point, Ms. Christensen says, fluorescent tubes provide three times as much light as incandescents for the same wattage and they last up to 5 to 6 years in normal usage.
