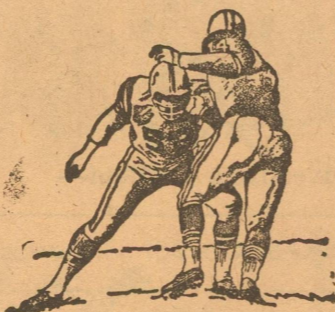

Family Film To Be Shown August 31st

TIME TO RUN, a film that is a mixture of problems and solutions, will be shown at the Eldorado High School Auditorium by the First Baptist Church on Sunday, Aug. 31. The feature, filmed in Eastmancolor by World Wide Pictures, will be shown once beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Filmed on location in the Southern California area, TIME TO RUN stars Ed Nelson, Randall Carver, Barbara Sigel, Joan Winmill and Gordon Rigsby. Nelson plays Warren Cole, a hard driving success-oriented industrial and scientific engineer who, because of over-involvement with his work, has failed to communicate with his wife Fran, played by Joan Winmill, or their son Jeff, played by screen newcomer Randall Carver.

TIME TO RUN allows the viewer to become involved on any or more of the three different levels. Viewed purely as entertainment, it's the suspenseful story of Jeff's attempts as sabotage in the nuclear generating plant conceived, designed and managed by his father. Jeff strongly feels that the plant is a threat to the environment, and he puts his feelings in action.

Viewed on an emotional level, TIME TO RUN is the deeply moving drama of the conflicts that are tearing a family apart—conflicts that develop between husband and wife, and between father and son. In an attempt to find freedom from the ever-growing hostilities, Jeff takes to the road, hoping to discover some meaning in his confused life.

Approached from a religious perspective, TIME TO RUN is also a story of friction between Jeff and his girlfriend, Michelle, played by Barbara Sigel, who is a familiar face to television viewers. Michelle has discovered a spiritual dimension in her life, and this aspect is very confusing to Jeff, who has little time for "a God who would allow war, hatred, and suffering on earth." But his life is shattered by an avalanche of personal problems, and he finds himself at a Jesus people gathering with Michelle, where he glimpses the possibility of a new life-style based on love and understanding.

TIME TO RUN is a film that can help strengthen love relationships between people. It's a film that was made for families to attend—together.

Following the movie, all junior high and high school students are invited to the First Baptist Church for refreshments and discussion in the church fellowship hall. This will be the first meeting of the Union Youth Fellowship, sponsored by the Eldorado Ministerial Alliance, for the 1975-76 school year.

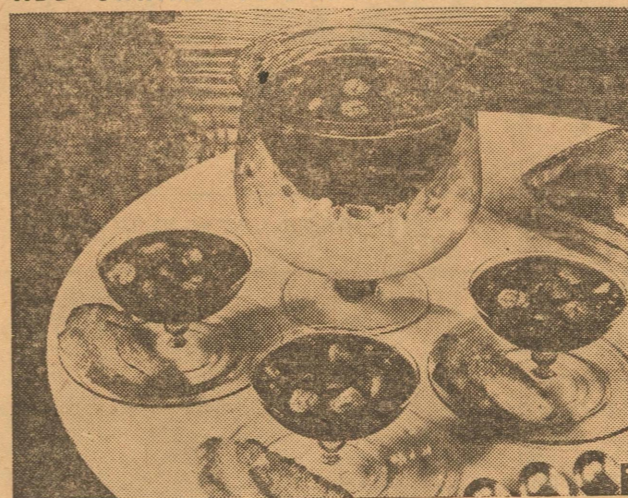

ADD SHRIMP TO POPULAR COLD SOUP



If you are already devoted to Gazpacho, that cold, sparkling, fresh vegetable soup of Spanish origin, try adding shrimp the next time you make it. Or add shrimp the first time. It's witchcraft. It is also suddenly a soup of substance, beautiful and refreshing as ever but more appetite appealing. Gazpacho is a very successful cold soup to serve outdoors because, traditionally, it is spooned into the plate or bowl over ice. By all means serve it with crusty bread well laced with garlic butter, well sprinkled with Parmesan cheese and lightly toasted.

BLENDER SHRIMP GAZPACHO

- 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) shrimp
- 1 medium cucumber, unpeeled, sliced
- 1 green pepper, sliced
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 garlic clove
- 4 sprigs fresh parsley
- 4 cups tomato juice
- Juice of 1 average lemon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon vinegar (optional)

Have shrimp and other main ingredients chilled. Place cucumber, pepper, onion, garlic, parsley in a blender. Set on "chop" speed, if available, or turn blender quickly on and off for chopping action, stopping before mixture becomes pureed. Combine with tomato juice, lemon juice, seasonings, olive oil, shrimp and shrimp liquid. Serve well chilled. 5 servings.

Travelers Checks — High Value, Low Cost

Once you have saved, borrowed or otherwise acquired the money to pay for a long-dreamed-of vacation, the question arises: How will you carry it? Cash is too dangerous, credit cards not useful in all circumstances and personal checks almost useless — especially in a foreign country.

Obviously, you want a means of exchange that will provide both wide international acceptance and protection against loss, and nothing fits that bill better than travelers checks. Available to vacationers since the end of the 19th century, these self-identifying money orders are widely accepted by hotels, merchants and restaurants because they include a guarantee that they will be honored by the issuer if proper cashing procedures have been followed.

Protection against loss is provided by the bank or issuing company itself, provided that you have agreed to and met certain conditions stated at the time of purchase. Specifically, you must be able to provide positive identification of yourself and supply the receipt or the numbers of the lost or stolen checks, or at the very least the name and address of the bank or place where you bought them and the date on which they were purchased.

Then too, you must strictly follow the signature identification system. When you purchase travelers checks, you will sign them once in the presence of

the seller and leave behind a sample of your signature for the files. When you cash one of the checks, you sign it again in the presence of the person accepting it so that the two signatures can be compared. Normally, this is the only identification required.

Travelers checks may be obtained in various denominations, usually \$10, \$20, \$50 or \$100. In recent years, they have also become available in the U.S. in some foreign currencies. The fee to purchase them is nominal — normally about one per cent of face value, or \$1 for \$100 worth of checks. In some cases, they are free to bank customers.

Some final tips for safety and quick refunds when checks are lost or stolen:

- Carry your checks in an inside pocket or money belt and keep them in your possession at all times.
- Keep the purchase receipt in locked luggage or the hotel safe, but do not keep it with your checks. If they are lost or stolen, the receipt would also be gone. You might even want to keep a list of the check numbers at home.
- Keep a record of the numbers of the checks you cash, when and where you cashed them and the amount involved so you will know which ones were lost or stolen. And finally,
- Do not sign the checks the second time until the moment you are ready to cash them. If your lost or stolen checks have been signed twice, you will probably have difficulty in obtaining a refund.
