The figures are surprising: one in four school age children needs eye care. One in 23 children has a vision problem. It's just possible that your son or daughter may be one of these children. And poor eyesight can cause related problems.

If your child trips over objects and appears clumsy,




complains of headaches, has trouble reading, blinks, frowns, squints, or rubs his eyes, has inflamed, swollen or watery eyes or even has a behavior problem in school, it is just possible he is suffering from troubled vision. It's important (even if your child doesn't have any unusual symptoms) for him to have a thorough eye examination by a professional before he reaches age 3, and between the years of 6 and 20, an annual eye examination is recommended.

An eye examination has various aspects. The doctor will test for eye disease by looking closely into the eyes. Then he'll use a strange-looking apparatus to do a "refrac-tion," which tells how the eye handles incoming light rays. He can tell from this whether a child is near-sighted or far-sighted.

Only by a professional testnot the simplified screening tests conducted at schoolcan the real cause of eye trouble be detected. Then, with all the facts, the doctor can work out the perfect prescription, or recommend the right exercises for visual training.








The modern barbecue chef, with his battery of salt and seasonings may seem to be a product of suburbia, but "sword-cooking," as it's called in the Middle East, is one of the very oldest culinary arts. Today's barbecuing, however, is made easier with conveniences such as Worcestershire sauce, which adds a spice shelf of flavor at a single dash.

HONEY-LEMON BARBECUED CHICKEN

- 2-1/2 lb. chicken, quartered
 - 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
 - 2 tablespoons original Worcestershire
 - sauce, divided
 - 1 teaspoon salt, divided 1/4 cup honey
 - 1 tablespoon onion powder
 - 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

Place chicken in a tight fitting bowl or double plastic bag. Combine lemon juice, 1-1/2 tablespoons of the Worces-tershire sauce and 3/4 teaspoon of the salt. Pour over chicken. Cover or seal and refrigerate 3 to 4 hours. Remove chicken from marinade, reserving marinade. Place chicken, skin side down, on a rack over slow burning charcoal. Grill for 15 minutes. Turn and broil 15 minutes longer. Meanwhile, combine reserved marinade (about 1/4 cup) with honey, onion powder, garlic powder, remaining 1-1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce and 1/4 teaspoon salt; blend well. Use to brush over both sides of chicken. Continue grilling, brushing and turning frequently, until chicken is tender, about 20 minutes longer. If desired, place chicken on a rack under a preheated moderate broiler. Cook following preceding instructions. YIELD: 4 portions.

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


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
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Patriotic Ameri-Cran Flag Cake

1 can (1 pound) Ocean Spray jellied cranberry sauce 1/2 cup fresh or frozen dry-pack blueberries

Prepare cake mix according to package directions adding nutmeg and grated chocolate to cake batter. Pour batter into a greased and floured $9 \times 13 \times 2$ inch baking pan.
