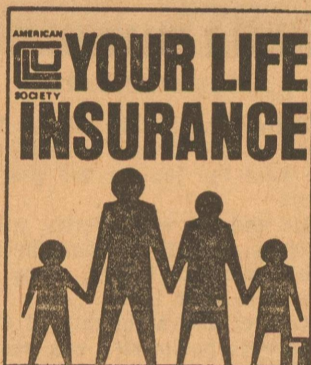

Q. I'm the worrying type. I'm the guy who's always at the airport two hours before the plane is due to leave. I worry about my family's protection should something happen to me. That's why I bought life insurance. Now I have another worry. What if I get into some financial difficulty and can't pay the premiums?

A. All right, suppose you do get into difficulty and can't pay a premium. First of all, all life insurance companies have a grace period of 30 days. In other words, your insurance company will still cover you for that period even if you haven't paid the premium.

If you have term insurance and don't pay a premium, when the grace period is over, the policy lapses — you are no longer covered. In effect, you were paying for your protection at cost, and you've stopped paying.

But, if you have whole life insurance, the policy has been building up cash value as you paid premiums. One way you can use this cash value is to pay premiums that you otherwise couldn't pay. If you decide you can't or don't want to pay any more premiums, but still want to be covered, there are still a couple of options open to you:

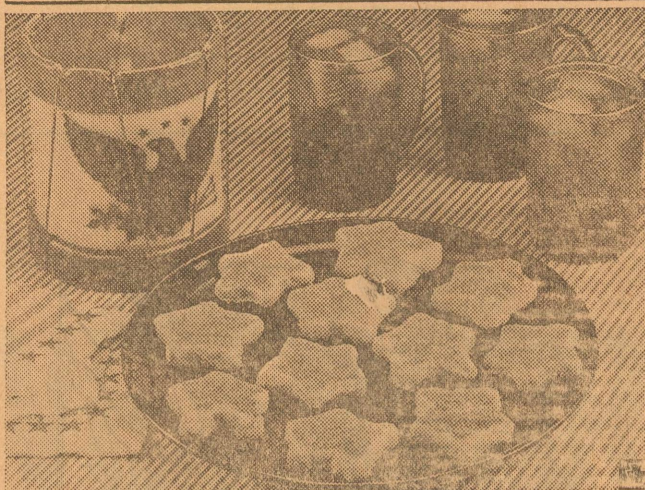
*You can have reduced paid-up insurance. You pay no more premiums but you're covered for the rest of your life — for a smaller amount than originally.

*You can have the full coverage continued for a period of time. If you die within that time, your beneficiary still receives the whole amount, even though you stopped paying premiums.

Fourth Of July Stars

Note Independence Day in your kitchen with tried-and-true shortbread cookies. Fourth of July Stars fit right in with traditional parades, fireworks and reunions. It's a rich recipe with a past, made tastier with quick or old fashioned oats. Patriotically enough, it yields 50 stars, one for every state. Each twinkles with a sprinkling of red sugar crystals. And the stellar reputation goes to their maker as the family offers "declarations" of goodness.

FOURTH OF JULY STARS

Makes 50 cookies

- 3/4 cup shortening, soft
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked

Beat together shortening, butter and sugar until creamy. Add egg and vanilla; beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture. Stir in oats. Cover and chill several hours or overnight.

Shape dough to form 1-inch balls. Place on greased cookie sheets. Flatten each and pinch to form 5 points in the shape of a star. Sprinkle with red sugar crystals. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Remove from cookie sheets to cool.

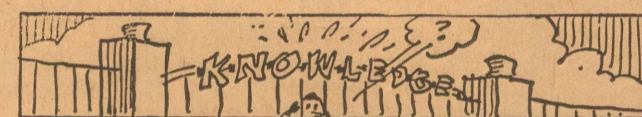

Workshops were held in Public Education, Public Information, Service and Rehabilitation and Crusade. Mrs. Dacy attended the Crusade session and Mrs. Pfluger and Mrs. Thomas attended the Public Education, Public Information session.

Schleicher County was recognized as being one of several counties gaining the Golden Achievement Award in fund raising. Mrs. Ruthie Dacy and Mrs. Helen Pfluger are Crusade Chairmen.

NEWS OF HEALTH

Test Your Child's Vision

The figures are surprising: one in four school age children needs eye care. One in 23 children has a vision problem. It's just possible that your son or daughter may be one of these children. And poor eyesight can cause related problems.

If your child trips over objects and appears clumsy,



complaints of headaches, has trouble reading, blinks, frowns, squints, or rubs his eyes, has inflamed, swollen or watery eyes or even has a behavior problem in school, it is just possible he is suffering from troubled vision. It's important (even if your child doesn't have any unusual symptoms) for him to have a thorough eye examination by a professional before he reaches age 3, and between the years of 6 and 20, an annual eye examination is recommended.

An eye examination has various aspects. The doctor will test for eye disease by looking closely into the eyes. Then he'll use a strange-looking apparatus to do a "refraction," which tells how the eye handles incoming light rays. He can tell from this whether a child is near-sighted or far-sighted.

Only by a professional test—not the simplified screening tests conducted at school—can the real cause of eye trouble be detected. Then, with all the facts, the doctor can work out the perfect prescription, or recommend the right exercises for visual training.

MANAGING YOUR FAMILY'S FINANCES

By Dr. Carl F. Hawver

Q. How can I tell when I should use credit and when I should not?

A. A good question — and the answer may surprise you. You can only use credit safely when you are currently spending less than you take home. Remember, you have to keep on paying all those regular bills, plus making the monthly payments on the new credit.

You don't use credit just because you've spent all your cash. Credit is a budgeting tool, it isn't extra income. What credit can do is allow you to purchase something which costs too much to take out of any one paycheck, and spread the payments over several paychecks so you can handle it. That way you can get it when you need it and have the use of it while you pay for it. Don't forget, however, that credit costs money. You should always know exactly how much, and be sure having the thing now is worth what it costs.

Patriotic Ameri-Cran Flag Cake



America's very own native cranberry is a perfect choice to create a cake that colorfully sparkles with both patriotism and goodness for a July 4th barbecue party.

Along with your cake serve a Cranberry Rocket Punch, easily prepared for twelve with two quarts of Ocean Spray cranberry juice cocktail, chilled, 1/4 cup of grenadine syrup and 2 quarts of club soda. Simply add ruby-red cranberry rocks to keep cold. Make your berry-colored cubes by pouring undiluted cranberry juice right into your ice trays instead of water. This punch is a super thirst-quencher that will go along with your barbecued foods and your fabulous dessert.

AMERI-CRAN FLAG CAKE
 (Makes 1 - 9 x 13 x 2 inch cake)

- 1 package (18 1/2 ounces) yellow cake mix
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 3 squares (3 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate, grated
- 1 package (9 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 can (1 pound) Ocean Spray jellied cranberry sauce
- 1/2 cup fresh or frozen dry-pack blueberries

Prepare cake mix according to package directions adding nutmeg and grated chocolate to cake batter. Pour batter into a greased and floured 9 x 13 x 2 inch baking pan. Bake as directed on package. Remove from pan and cool on a rack. Place on a serving platter. Spread top and sides with whipped topping. Chill until ready to serve. Just before serving cut jellied cranberry sauce lengthwise into 1/2 inch thick slices. Cut slices lengthwise into strips 1 inch wide. Drain strips well on absorbent paper. Place blueberries in rows in upper left hand corner of the cake to resemble the stars on the flag. Place cranberry strips across cake to resemble stripes on the flag. It will be necessary to piece cranberry strips to make stripes long enough for cake. Place strips close together to hide joining.

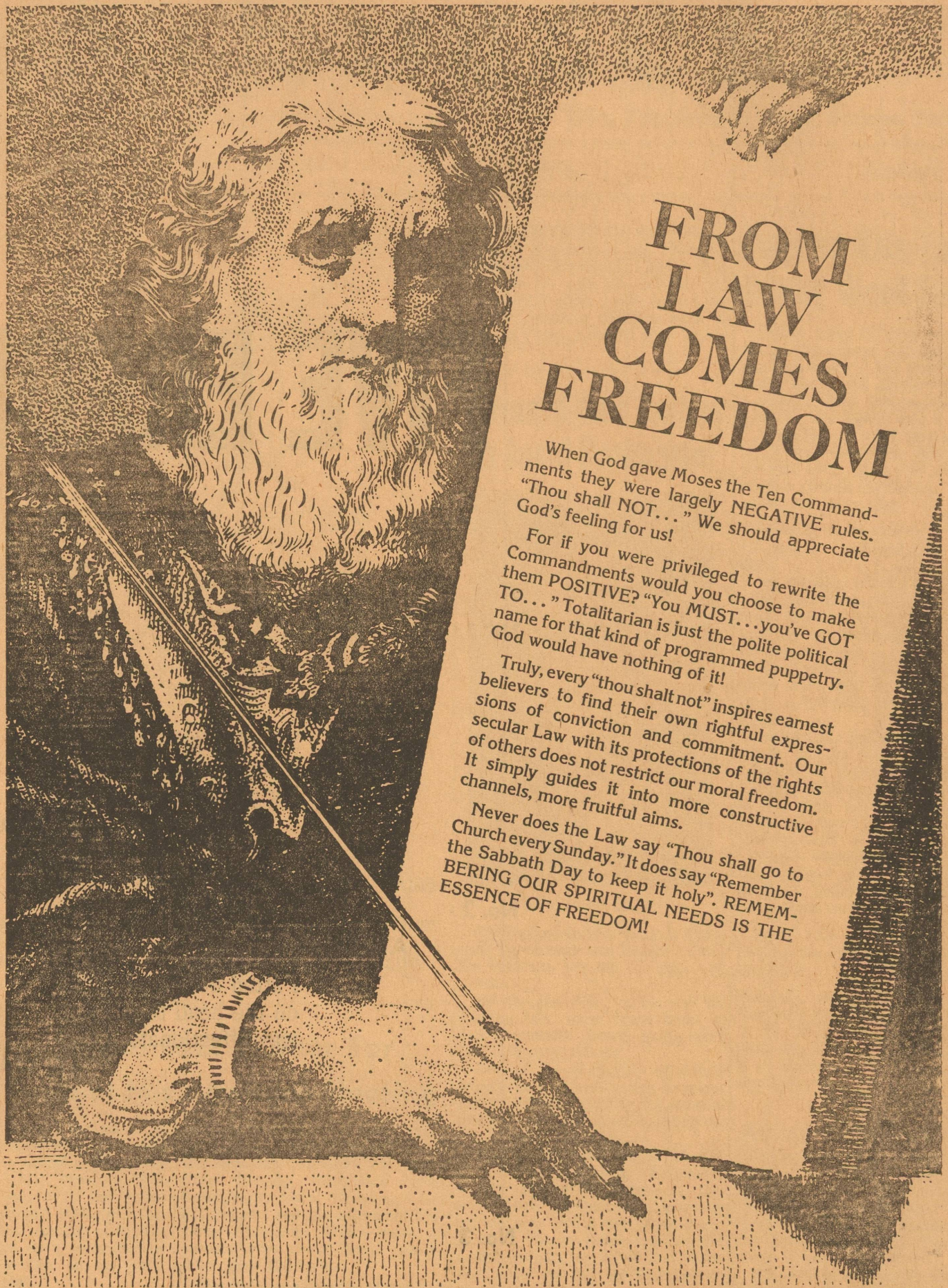
