BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF EX-SENATOR A. S. HAWKINS.

Candidate For Lieutenant Governor of Texas.

Born at Ladonia, Fannin county, Texas, March 31, 1868. Nephew of ex-Governor Alvin Hawkins of Tennessee; son of Reverend S. J. Hawkins, deceased of the North Texas Conference of the M. E. Church South, and Mrs. E. M. Hawkins, who now resides at Dallas, Texas. Was raised in North-east Texas; lived in Marion, Upshur, Cass, Hunt and Camp counties, where his father preached for years. Attended Southwestern University at Georgetown; taught school in Wood, Rains and Johnson counties, was licensed to practice law at Gatesville, before Honorable C. K. Bell. Has lived at Midland for the past twenty years, except three years at Abilene, and throughout West Texas is well known as an attorney. Is prominently connected with the Live Stock Industry and owns a horse and cow ranch at Pyote, Ward county, Texas.

A. S. Hawkins was a member of the House of Representatives in 1893, representing Midland and twenty-nine others counties. Later on in 1893 was appointed District Attorney of the 32nd Judicial District by Governor Hogg, to fill out the unexpired term of S. H. Cowan, Esq. of Fort worth, who had resigned. In 1901 was again elected a member of the House of Representatives. In 1905 was elected to the senate from the Abilene District, composed of thirty-two counties.

In 1893 was the author of the law creating the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas in 1901 of the School Land law, which opened up west Texas to the settlers; in 1905 was the author of the law providing for State and County depositories. The state depository law yields more than enough revenue to support the whole Treasury department of the state, and the county depository law yields a handsome revenue to almost every county in Texas, was more or less prominently connected with the passage of others important legislation in the various legislatures above referred to.

POLITICAL VIEWS

I think the anti-pass law should be amended so as to permit the exchange of newspaper space for transportation at the usual rates, where the transaction is bona fide as to all parties. My past record in the Legislature is in harmony with this position.

I resigned from the senate rather than substitute my personal judgment for the instructions of my people on a question then pending. For my action in this matter I have been praised by some and ridiculed by others; but I am still of the opinion that a Democratic Representative should resign his position rather than violate the instruction of his party.

In this connection, will say that the Democrats of Texas have already instructed in favor of submission, and if elected Lieutenant Governor of Texas I will so construe their action, and act accordingly, unless instructed to the contrary.

PROCEEDINGS OF COMMISSIONERS COURT.

The commissioners met Monday in regular session, with all members of the court present and the following business was transacted. The court ordered that the new bond of the Eldorado State Bank for the handling of the county school funds be approved as amended.

The court ordered that here after the voting place for precinct No. 7, will be at the Elder school house instead of the old Strothers place.

The court ordered that the bounty be put back on wild cats, Lobo and Coyote scalps, as follows, \$5 Lobo, \$1 Coyote and 50c for Cats, and those who follow trapping for a business must have proof from the ranchmen on which the animals are caught that they are caught within Schleicher Co.

The court ordered that W. H. Finley be advanced \$200 on 1909 tax roll.

All officers report approved. The court set aside \$150 to the credit of John Rae for the improvement of the Eldorado and Sonora road.

The court set a side \$150 to the credit of Lee Williams for the improvement of the Eldorado and San Angelo public road.

The court granted A. H. Schuessler permission as road overseer to work the road hands of his precinct on road now traveled and County Clerk was ordered to notify Mr. Schuessler of the change.

The court ordered that all parties who have bought Schleicher county school land, and who's interest was due Aug. 1st, and has not been paid, until Sept. 1st to pay same, but require the parties owning same to pay 10 per cent interest for all extended time.

The court ordered that Judge Whitten have the Johnson grass cut out of court yard and work the trees.

Saturday, Judge J. A. Whitten, sold at auction to the highest bidder, 10 head of Jersey cows, for W. L. Rose at Christoval for \$127. The cattle were mortgaged for \$90 and some interest to the State Bank. Mr. Rose did not appear at the sale.

THE COMING RAILROADS.

That San Antonio must eventually become the chief railroad center of Texas admits of scarcely a doubt in view of the development now in progress and the prospects for the future. It is not at all surprising, therefore, to learn that the Orient Railroad contemplates the extension of its line from San Angelo to San Antonio.

That the Frisco is coming very shortly is now regarded as a settled fact, surveyors having lately been in the field locating a line southward from Brady. Both the Orient and the Frisco will pass through virgin territory that is susceptible of the highest development and that promises abundant traffic, but the objective point is San Antonio, where the greater volume of traffic will originate.

From San Antonio it will be only natural to suppose that both the Frisco and the Orient will desire to move southward to the border or to the Gulf, especially after there is a seaport directly south of this city that will be inviting. Such a port is developing and will shortly be claiming the attention of shippers and of steamship line. A short time ago it was only a question of a deep-water channel and improved harbor. Now it is mainly a question of docks and wharfage facilities which must be provided as soon as the work on the jetties has been fully accomplished.

The railroad from Kansas City will seek to connect up with its lines in Mexico. The St. Louis road will seek to connect up with the Rio Grande Valley line, and both will probably have the gulf port in mind as an ultimate destination, though they may realize that San Antonio is ever to be the great distributing point for the gulf port as well as for the vast section of territory of which it is the geographical or commercial center. In the meantime other trunk lines are looking somewhat covetously in this direction, and one of them is supposed to be halting only temporarily at Abilene.

But San Antonio must not take too much for granted an relax her own efforts to make assurance doubly sure. The Fredericksburg railroad will clinch the matter, and the coming of one of the trunk lines may prove to be a greater magnet for drawing one of the others than would be a bonus of far more than usual attractiveness. San Antonio is now at the turning point of a great future when no mistake should be made in the matter of pushing her advantage with her own shoulder at the wheel.—San Antonio Express.

If Mr. Bryan should become a citizen of Texas, he would be accorded the consideration that is due and he would wield a potent influence with a large number of Texas people, just as Bailey does, just as Culberson does just as many other eminent men do and have done. But Mr. Bryan would not move his citizenship to Texas expecting to become political boss, nor would he deem it proper, wise or promising to undertake any political revolutions here.

Texas conditions, just as conditions in Nebraska or other States, are the logical result of years of growth and development. They change, as all things do, with the passing of time, and they will continue to change. But great convulsions are out of the question in Texas. If Mr. Bryan should come to Texas as he would come to participate in the great work of developing a great and expanding civilization, not to upset what has been wrought in the more than seventy years of Texas history.

There are many men in Texas; there is room for many more. There is a welcome here for any who may desire to come and more than welcome to Mr. Bryan.

But regardless of all who come or go, Texas will remain Texas—the creation of mighty men, an empire peopled by a race that is strong and self-reliant, a people who know and do, who think and act and who may be depended upon to meet courageously all the emergencies which the fates may place in their pathway.—Houston Post.
