Eldorado Railroad Committee Submits Proposition To ORIENT OFFICIALS

The railroad committee, composed of Joab Campbell, W. F. Ford, J. S. Pelt, W. W. Barbee and E. A. Nall went to San Angelo Saturday night to meet with A. M. Denney, managing town-site and right-of-way agent for the Orient road, the committee was reinforced at San Angelo by W. B. Silliman and Sol Mayer.

Some minor parts of the contract could not be agreed upon between Mr. Denney and our committee, so the contract was forwarded on to headquarters to be approved. The only difference between them as we understand it is, the Orient wants 80 acres adjoining their depot grounds in Eldorado and two 160 acres tracts some place on the line in Schleicher county, the committee offered them 80 acres some where near Eldorado and 40 acres at two townsites some where on the line in Schleicher county. The committee believes the Orient Officials will approve the proposition as submitted by them, and that it will be only a short while until actual work will start.

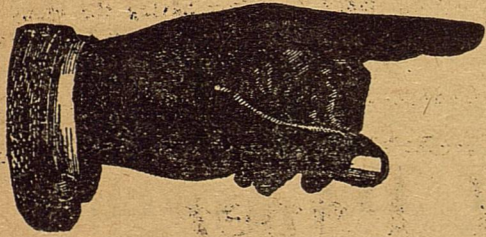
