Lee Brothers' Upper Ranch, on the Middle Concho, about seven miles south of San Angelo, is on the market for sale at \$125 to \$200 an acre, and the big tract is to be cut up into small farms to suit purchasers.

John B. Lee will handle the sales, and it is expected that when the prospective come down into this country from the north of the county the fall fair, that some good sales will be made.

About 90 per cent of the land is good for cultivation, and it is, with the farming lands with the Middle Concho running through it for four miles. The line of the Grand railroad also runs through the ranch and the town of Tankerville affords an ideal shipping point.

At the average price of \$15 per acre the land would go for \$1,350,000.

Lee Brothers will not sell the land, containing 3,000 acres, and that farm will be retained by them for their own use. The feed stuff growing on the Upper Ranch is doing better this year, thought has been raised by dry farming, with no irrigation at all. —San Angelo Standard.

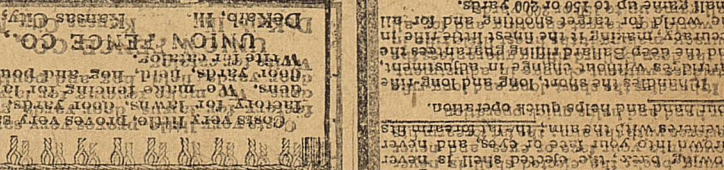
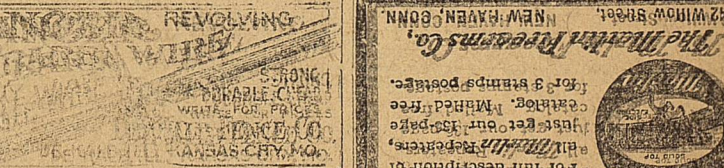

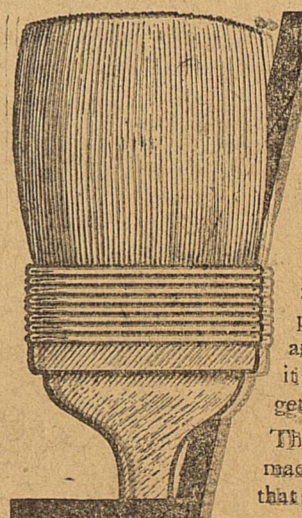
