

#### New History Book Will Finance Reconstruction Of Fort Mason

The Mason County Historical Commission and the Mason County Historical Society have undertaken publishing a county history and reconstructing the Officers' Quarters at Fort Mason as Bicentennial projects. Kurt Zesch is chairman of the reconstruction and book committee chairman is Wilburn Shear-

Mr. Shearer said, "We want to include family data on each generation that lives or has ever lived in Mason County." Families are requested to send histories of not more than 500 words per generation and pictures (which will be returned) to Mrs. Oliver Langehennig, Box 702, Mason, Texas 76856 or write her for additional informa-

The book will contain memorial pages; prices on the various sizes are available on request. Feature stories and pictures on churches, schools, organizations, rural communities, business, etc., will also be included in the book.

Since the cost of printing must be paid in advance, a pre-sale of the books is under way. Copies will be \$15 each plus \$1 if they are to be mailed. Books may also be ordered from Mrs. Langehennig.

The deadline for submitting famly histories and ordering the historical book is September 1, 1975.

Proceeds from the book will be used for the reconstruction, which is already well under way. When construction started, only the foundation of the building was found, but walls are up now and much interest in the project has been shown. Work thus far has been financed by private donations of money, materials, and labor.

Fort Mason was among the forts which protected early day settlers from Indians. It was established in 1851 and was used intermittently until 1869. After it was abandoned, the buildings were dismantled and materials used for private construc-

#### Mohair Directors To Meet August 14th

The summer directors' meeting of the Mohair Council of America will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday, August 14, at the Inn of the Hills Motor Inn in Kerrville.

James T. Hunt of Sonora, Council president, said the meeting will be one of the most important sessions this year. He said the meeting is open to all mohair growers and he urges them to attend.

"We have some very important matters to discuss and we need the thinking of our members on the proposed mohair referendum and on the development of new promo-tion programs for mohair." Hunt

The Council, which will celebrate ts 10th birthday later this year, is the official promotion and advertising organization for mohair growers in the United States. Its new budget, recently approved by the U. S. Department of Agrculture, calls for expenditures of \$300,000 for mohair promotion during fis-

#### Easter Seal Society Provides Services

The Texas Easter Seal Society, a voluntary health agency operating in the state of Texas since 1929, helps to provide direct services for physically handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved, and who are not eligible for help from any other resource—public or private.

According to such sources as the United State Public Health Service, the American Speech and Hearing Association and the Texas State Deparmtent of Public Welfare, the physically handicapped in each 1,000 population is estimated to be 135 persons. By definition, physically handicapped includes orthopedic handicaps, arthritis. speech and hearing handicaps, strokes, cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, cleft lip, palate or both, muscular dystrophy and Parkinson's Disease. Such a broad range of possible disabilities undercores the need for supporting an agency such as the Texas Easter Seal Society which provides direct services in these

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### **Eating On The Run**

Do you anticipate a good deal of "eating on the run" for your family this summer?

Here is a series of tips from the Tupperware Family Foods Council that could help make vacation mealtimes more fun, and more nutritious, too -

#### Before You Start

1. Consult your state maps for the location of roadside rest areas, and for state or even national parks along the general direction of your route. A few minutes of checking the maps could assure you of a cool and inviting roadside haven for your picnic lunch or dinner.

2. Consider other routes than interstate and super highways. With a national speed limit of 55 you'll not lose much time, and some of the less traveled routes can turn up some welcome surprises in scenic vistas, interesting landmarks, and some unusual opportunities for good eating. Remember, at least a sub-theme of the trip is probably to "relax and see the coun-

3. Plan ahead for food breaks. Besides complete meals this would include the all-too-frequent snacks that mark vacationtime automotive travel. Don't permit the trip to become an opportunity for family members to load up on non-nutritive foods which curb the appetite at the expense of furnishing a caloric overload.

Fruits, for instance, curb the cravings for sweets. Hard boiled eggs furnish protein and occupy little space for the traveling family. Carrot sticks, an excellent source of Vitamin A, are a lot less expensive than candy

4. Plan for food storage. A portable cooler can be a great

idea, and it doesn't occupy much space, but all-too-often it becomes the repository for canned drinks only. Be sure to insist it also carry some fruits and milk to provide some balance to the inevitable snacking.

For easy handling of items not requiring refrigeration — such as sugar, bread, flour for pancakes, and cereal — take some sealable plastic containers. They can be fitted into a car's nooks and crannies, and thev'll help keep the foods fresh over the trip. They are ideal for premixed fruit and other drinks, too, because they can be washed quickly and returned to their place in the car so easily.

#### On The Road

1. "Eating off the land" was routine to travelers just a generation or two ago. Stopping at a farmhouse for tomatoes, corn, or even a frying chicken was routine. People didn't travel as fast, partly because that super fresh food was so delicious.

But consider this route to some exceptional eating experiences as well as an opportunity for your family to observe the farming lifestyle. Biting into a

warm, vine-ripened tomato could prove a rewarding experience for a youngster and possibly have a worthwhile effect on his nutritional future.

2. While "eating on the run" is a familiar routine for Americans who want to cover as many miles as possible on a given day, try to ease the tension for your family with at least one combined meal and rest stop. The old cliche that the food. will digest better is true enough, and if the food is prepared by you, chances are it will be better for your family, too.

3. There's a tendency to eat all the time while driving, but the Family Foods Council suggests that homemaker vacationers not worry about it-particularly if the snacking can be limited to food groups that are relatively low in calories and high in nutritive content. Fruits, fresh or dried, nuts, cheeses, cold chicken - even pretzels will probably take the edge off appetites, particularly for the youngsters, but because this type of snack food is in itself. nutritious the eater has not been deprived of worthwhile food.





One of the most talented and successful forces in the music industry, Sedaka has sold over 20 million records as a composer-performer. Of the over 500 songs he has written, more than 100 have been hit songs. As a performer who writes his own material, he was a forerunner of the trend that dominates the music scene today.

In 1971 Sedaka decided to record and perform his own songs and released the album "Emergence," which immediately won rave reviews. The LP soon re-established Neil Sedaka as one of the top recording artists in the world.

Today he is in even greater demand. His most recent hits include "Laughter In The Rain," "The Immigrants," and the current tune, 'That's Where The Music Takes



### How's Your Child's Eye-Q?



You may not know it. but poor vision is frequently the cause of reading problems, lower school achievement, and in some cases leads to anti-social behavior and even serious delinquency. That's why a child's vision should be tested frequently-with a professional eye examination before age 3 and annual eye examinations between the ages of 6 and 20. Many eye problems, if detected early, can be corrected either with lenses or exercises, so it's impor-tant that children have professional eye tests. In fact, 1 in 100 children between 3 and 5 has amblyopia,. sometimes called lazy eye, which can be corrected if detected in time.

Eye tests conducted at school are not at all sufficient. They only measure a child's ability to read an eye chart 20 feet away. Vision at reading range is not measured nor are co-ordination of both eyes, focus, astigmatism and eye

Sometimes eye problems lead to school or social problems, so be alert. If your child is having trouble with school, arrange for an eye check-up. It may not lead to the answer. But there's a pretty good about 1900. pretty good chance it will.



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


