# County Ag. Agent's Column

Subject: Toxic Plants—Fall Fore-

Numerous reports, field surveys and discussions leaves the impression that potentially toxic plants may be a problem this fall and winter. The variable growing season rainfall, the dense growth of annual and perennial broomweed, short forage supply, a lower quality forage and fall moisture may result in poisonous plant problems. This material is a reminder of some things that could happen.

Things to look for and be aware of:

—Prussic acid poisoning from sorghums and Johnsongrass is a real possibility about this time of the year—usually after frost.

—Nitrates will accumulate in small grains, coastal bermuda, and many forbs, especially those shortly grazed, on cold, cloudy mornings. This is true on pertilized pastures, around corrals, or bed grounds. A good practice on pastures is to keep the animals off of small grains until mid-morning when temperatures increase and the sun comes out. Don't place hungry animals in corrals filled with weeds, especially carelessweed.

Grain tetany is posible primarily on mother animals from small grain or winter growing native grasses. Again, this condition is worse under cool, cloudy weather when magnesium becomes limiting. Providing supplemental magnesium may be necessary.

—Threadleaf groundsels have increased greatly the past couple of years in response to the fall moisture. Animals usually graze this plant mostly in February and March when the plant first starts to green. Eating excessive amounts will result in acute (immediate) livestock poisoning while small amounts of plant material will result in a chronic (lingering) condition. This lingering effect is a result of severe and permanent damage to the liver. Animals may actually do rather well, get fat and then die as a result of low levels of toxins which could not affect a healthy

animal. Supplying adequate levels of supplemental protein, energy and phosphorus will lessen the chance of annials eating these plants. Cattle are most susceptible to this plant. Affected animals may stand around looking drooping and srain to void frequently small amounts of foul smelling droppings. —Silverleaf nightshade and threadsalve (potato weed) are common weeds around barns and corrals. This plant has been increasing on farms and rangelands. All parts of the plants are poisonous but animals more readily eat the tomatolike fruit, especially in February

and March.

Toxicity symptoms include incoordination, especially in the rear end, slobbering and a grunt to exhale breath. Supplemental feeding will assist in preventing this problem also.

—Twinleaf senna (or rattleweed) is another common range plant that has recently been found to cause animal losses. Animals are usually found dead but an autopsy shows hemorrhages throughout the digestive tract. Animals may have a red urine before death.

—Bitterweed will respond to the fall rains and could become a problem to sheep in the near future. Last year's bumper crop of bitterweed probably left an adequate seed source. The closely grazed pastures resulting from abundant broomweed and widely spaced rains should offer an ideal spot for this winter hazard.

Be sure to provide: Adequate water, mineral, good quality forage or adequate supplement, and recognize potentially toxic plants.
