Survivors include a son, Lyndon Isaacs of Billings, Mont.; one sister, grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.



**PUBLIC NOTICE** OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1975

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT** 

Revising the separation of powers, legislative and executive provisions of the Texas Con-stitution. Article II, Separation of Powers, is amended to:

Provide that the pow-ers of government of the State of Texas are divided among three dis-tinct branches: legislative, executive, and judicial. Except as otherwise authorized by the constitution, members of one branch may not exercise any power properly at-tached to either of the others.

Article III, The Legislature, is amended to:

Continue the present structure of the legisla-ture consisting of a senate with 31 members and a house of represen-tatives with 150 members. The present organization and procedure of the legislature are con-tinued except that the provision allowing closed executive sessions of the senate is omitted. Provisions on the conflict of interest of members of the legislature are continued, as is the governor's power to veto bills or line items in appropriation bills. The article provides for single-member senatorial, representative, and congressional districts. A compensation commis-sion is created to recommend the compensation and allowances to be received by members of the legislature. The legislative compensation, set by law, may not exceed this recommendation and does not take effect until after an intervening general election. The article provides for annual sessions of 140 days in odd-numbered years and 90 days in evennumbered years, and a veto session of 15 days upon request of threefifths of the membership of each house. The legislature may meet in organizational sessions prior to the convening of the legislature in regular sessions.

> **PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

> > Revising the education provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article Education, is VII. amended to:

Provide that the Permanent and Available School Funds and the county public school funds are continued for the support of the free public schools. The State Board of Education is retained and the Permanent and Available University Funds are continued for the benefit of The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. A new Higher Education Fund for Texas is established for the benefit of colleges and universities outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M Systems. The state ad valorem tax tax may be changed by law within the ten cent maximum. The legislature may allocate by law a portion of the Higher Education Fund to certain state vocational and technical institutes. The article provides that the public education system must furnish each individual an equal educational opportunity, but a school district may provide local enrichment of educational programs exceeding the level provided by the state consistent with general law. Authority to issue Per-manent University Bonds is continued but the bonds may not exceed 30% of the Permanent University Fund. The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will apear on the ballot is as follows:

personal property must betaxed equally and uniformly in proportion to market value. Existing exemptions from ad valorem taxation are continued. The present dedication of motor fuel taxes for highway purposes and the Available School Fund is retained. The 'pay-as-you-go" principle for the operation of state government is retained. The legislature shall establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of open-space land devoted to farm or ranch purposes and may establish separate formulas for appraising land to promote the preservation of forest land devoted to timber pro-duction. The \$3000 exemption from state ad valorem taxation for residential homesteads is continued and the legis-lature by law may increase this amount. A separate \$3000 exemption from ad valorem taxation by political subdivisions is provided for the residential homestead of persons at least 65 years of age and the political subdivision may increase this amount. The legislature by law may exempt from ad valorem taxation certain property owned by veterans' organizations, nonprofit water corporations, and persons in need because of age or disability, and economic circumstance. The legislature may also exempt property to preserve historical, cultural or natur-

### **PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Revising the local gov-ernment provisions of the Texas Constitution. Article IX, Local Gov-ernment, is amended to: Provide that the counties of the state are those that exist on the date of adoption of the local government article and that county boundaries may be changed if approved by a majority of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. Counties may be merged or county seats relocated if approved by two-thirds of the qualified voters in each affected county who vote on the question. The present elected constitutional county offices are retained and four year terms of office are pro-vided. The voters of a county may create addi-tional offices, eliminate offices, or combine the duties and functions of offices. The voters may also grant ordinance making power to the governing body of the county. Cities and towns having more than 1,500 inhabitants may become home-rule cities. Tax limitations are established for operating purposes for cities and counties and the legislature is required to fix debt limits for cities, towns, counties, and school and community junior college districts. The wording of the

proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising

tribute more than 10%. A policy that the quality of the environment of the State of Texas is to be protected is established, and the legislature is required to implement and enforce this policy. No state funds may be used to remove surface water from the river basin of origin if the surface water is necessary to supply the reasonably forseeable water requirements of the basin for the ensuing 50 years, unless the removal of water is sufficiently roplaced to the point of re moval from outside the state or is on a tempor ary, interim basis. Th seaward beaches of th Gulf of Mexico and coastal submerged land belonging to the state ar held by the state in per petual trust for the pec-ple, and subject to reasonable limitations prescribed by law, the public has the free and unrestricted right of use and benefit of the beaches. The provision is continued that, except as otherwise provided by law, a rate of interest in excess of ten percent a year is usurious, and that if a contract does not specify a rate of interest, the rate under the contract may not exceed six percent a year. Discrimination against handicapped persons is prohibited, and a goal of the state is established to provide every resident access to adequate, com-prehensive health care.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

sion of the American Dental Association reported in a recent. issue of Geriatrics. A problem such as gradual changes in proper bite, if not detected early, can lead to faulty jaw movements and cause straining of the muscles in the neck and shoulders, he said.

Other unrelated reports have indicated that dental hypersensitivity, a condition in which teeth respond with pain to stimuli such as heat and cold, may occur as tooth enamel wears away over the years or as a result of periodontal work, exposing the layers of dentin and cementum underneath. The dentist can detect super-sensitive teeth during a routine exam-ination with a jet of cold air or water. The condition can be treated by simple office procedures, or substitution of a therapeutic dentifrice such as Sensodyne for the regular home toothpaste.

Regular dental examination also allows early detection of oral cancer and systemic disorders that frequently are manifested in the oral tissues, Dr. Elfenbaum said. He also advised dentists to include nutritional counseling when older patients visit. Studies indicate that persons in their late 70s may have a very destructive type of dental decay, that may be due either to change in the protective capacity of saliva, or to an increase in the consumption of sweets.
