Austin, Tex.-State health programs for the needy may have to be cut back after January 1 unless the State Welfare budget can be altered.

While the department may have \$100 million or more in unspent state and federal funds for 1976-77, the money apparently cannot be transferred from other programs to health services.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell said a health program deficit in fiscal 1977 may run as high as \$76 million.

T. R. Spence Dies At The Age Of 80

> Thomas Reese Spence, age 80. civil engineer and rancher of Eldorado, Texas, died in the Schleicher County Medical Center here on Friday, November 28, 1975, following several weeks of illness.

Mr. Spence had a long career in Texas as a civil engineer with the State Highway Department, independent highway and bridge contractor, college administrator, and rancher. He was born September 11, 1895, at College Station, Texas, to Dean and Mrs. David W. Spence, of the College of Engineering of the (then) Texas A&M College. He was graduated from A&M at age 17 in the Class of 1913 and later studied for and was awarded the professional degree of Civil Engineer at Cornell University at Ithaca, New York, in 1917.

Ht was a First Lieutenant in the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers in World War I, subsequently joining the Texas State Highway Department as a Civil Engineer. He served. as District Engineer at San Antonio, Corpus Christi, and Ft. Worth. In 1921, he was married to Miss Fay Baugh, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George E. Baugh, pioneer Schleicher County ranchers. They had two sons, David W. (Bill) Spence, of Round Rock, Texas, and George B. Spence of Berea, Ohio.

In 1926, Mr. Spence left the Highway Department to join the R. W. Briggs organization as a highway and bridge contractor. In 1938, he joined the Texas A&M College and served briefly as vicedirector of the Engineering Experment Station; then he served for many years as the Manager of Physical Plants, presiding over many of the "building booms" on the various campuses of the Texas A&M College system.

In 1953 he retired and he and Mrs. Spence moved to Eldorado, becoming active in the management of the ranch which Mrs. Spence had inherited from her par-

ents. Mrs. Spence died in 1967. He served as a member of the county Democratic executive committee, and was in the Eldorado Lions Club, serving for a while as secretary. He was a member of







#### **Check For Stored Grain Pests**

Stored grain pests can eat away at your stockpile of grain and make frequent inspections of stor-

Even if the bin was cleaned beidea to make frequent bin inspec-

Insect pests damage grain by eataging the seed kernel which prevents it from germinating after

Primary stored grain pests attack whole kernel grain and develop in-side the kernel. These include corn or rice weevils, lessor grain borers and Angoumois grain moths.

Because they develop inside the grain kernel, these pests can be easily overlooked. That's why seeds should always be split open when inspecting for pests.

Secondary pests include the rice moth, Indian meal moth, flat grain beetle, confused flour beetle and sawtoothed grain beetle. These

When inspecting for pests, take grain samples of each lot of grain and at various depths throughout the bin. If you find one rice weevil or one lesser grain borer or up to five of any other pest per ment is needed.

Fumigants can be used to treat the grain; however, extreme caution is necessary as the fumigants are toxic and highly flammable.





## LEMON STICKY BUNS

Here's an all-purpose recipe for busy cooks who like to plan ahead. It makes 4 1/2 dozen Lemon Sticky Buns and they offer a rare treat for weekend breakfasts, brunches or even a dessert for dinner. The buns are frozen before baking and may be held in a freezer for up to 4 weeks.

Many cooks have discovered that not all yeast doughs freeze well. This recipe is developed for freezing-it is higher in yeast, shortening and sugar than other bread recipes. The buns are completely prepared and placed in a baking pan with lemon flavored syrup and chopped almonds. They are frozen in the pan, ready to thaw, rise and bake before serving. Be sure to allow plenty

of time for thawing and rising, about three hours at room temperature. The dough doesn't start to rise until it is thawed, so another 2 hours should be allowed for the buns to double in size. If the time seems long, just remember, the cook's work is done. The buns need no further attention except for timing the rising and baking. **LEMON STICKY BUNS**



Makes one 9-inch pie.


