





The Time is Now

No-fault auto insurance might soon prove to be an idea whose time has come—and gone—with only a fraction of its potential realized for the public.

This fate could await the no-fault concept unless Congress acts favorably on one of two bills-S. 354 in the Senate, H. R. 9650 in the House—that would set federal standards for no-fault laws and push states to adopt them within a specified time.

In the late 1960s proponents hailed no-fault as a tool for meaningful reform of the automobile insurance system ... a way to compensate accident victims more rapidly and more equitably than before. They hoped that within a few years, every state would adopt a strong, workable no-fault

Unfortunately, it hasn't worked out that way. Since Massachusetts led the way in 1970, only 16 states have enacted true no-fault laws-and most of these aren't as effective as they could be. Eight other states have passed pseudo-no-fault laws, and the other 26 states still bank entirely on the fault system.


This is why federal standards are needed. The bills now pending in Congress would require states to meet such standards. They would do this by enacting laws to provide for adequate benefit levels and put limits on lawsuits that now clog the auto insurance mechanism. No new federal bureaucracy would be needed to enforce the standards. Each state would be free to tailor a no-fault law to its own needs as long as it met the minimum requirements of the federal law.

Under no-fault, accident victims recover their medical and hospital expenses and lost income from their own insurance company—regardless of who was at fault in the accident. By limiting lawsuits to cases involving serious injury, it makes more dollars available to pay for broader benefits that are easier to obtain.

No-fault affects only the personal injury portion of the motorist's insurance premium; property damage coverages—the larger part of the premium—aren't touched by it. Potential premium increases or decreases under nofault are so small they're insignificant. The true test is one of value . . . and no-fault gets an "A" on that test. Best estimates are that 60 to 75 per cent more people would be paid for their losses under no-fault.

The no-fault concept is endorsed by virtually every segment of society—business and labor leaders, public officials, consumer organizations, educators, the press and others. The significant exceptions are personal injury lawyers—who would have to seek new sources of income under a no-fault system—and a segment of the insurance industry. Their opposition has been effective in slowing the drive for reform.

If you feel, as we do, that the motoring public has waited long enough for insurance legislation so clearly in its best interest, now is the time to let your representative know about it.










Shown Above are views of the Buck Horn Ranch house in southwestern part of Schleicher County



HIGHLIGHTS OF AMERICAN HISTORY WASHINGTON'S FAREWELL TO HIS OFFICERS



By Joan Russo At Fraunces Tavern, still standing near New York's Wall Street, an emotional General Washington said goodbye to the commanding officers of the Continental Army who had fought with him for America's independence. Only nine days earlier the last British army units had evacuated New York under the terms of the Treaty of Paris which had ended the long

war.
"With a heart full of love and gratitude" Washington said, "I now take leave of you. I most devoutly wish that your later days may be as prosperous and happy as your former ones have been glorious and honorable." As the officers raised their glasses, Washington continued: ". . . I shall feel

obliged if each of you will come and take me by the

Like the first man to do so, Henry Knox, Washington's commander of artillery, the rest that followed were weeping. This historic event was painted by Frederick Coffay Yohn, part of the collection of paintings owned by The Continental Insurance Companies.





Faraway Places



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
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
