

Make Tree Show Change Of Pace

To depart from a traditional Christmas tree, some families like to try a new theme or let children make ornaments.

Cookies, gingerbread men, and popcorn or candy strings are traditional tree decorations, but dried corn kernels and gumdrops can be used. Painted nuts or decorated blown eggshells will add an unusual touch, along with different shapes of uncooked mac-aroni gilded and glued to a foam

A tree decorated with miniature packages wrapped in velvet or brocade and tied with brightly colored ribbon can be a tree

Cut-outs of animals, toy soldiers, dolls or sleds from foam rubber sheeting or plastic foam can be decorated by gluing sequins on them.

It's Not Christmas Without The Tree

The pagans thought that woodland spirits reside in trees. So, to please the spirit gods, they decorated the trees. Particularly evergreens. The Druids of Ancient England tied gilded apples onto tree branches. During Saturmalia, The Romans decorated small trees with toys, small masks of Bacchus, and candles. Centuries passed before anyone actually took a tree inside the house and decorated it. Finally in 1605, an Austrian did. Then, the idea began to spread very slowly until it reached Germany. In 1832, a German was the first to decorate a tree in America. It was not until the Teddy Roosevelt years that Christmas trees gained a strong foothold in American tradition.



Producers Urged To Reduce Cow Numbers

The current economic crisis in which cattlemen find themselves is a clear-cut case of too many cows. rood cow numbers must be reduced if cattlemen are to get back on their feet and run a profitable operation.

One thing that cattlemen need to look at in anlyzing their operations is a "cow month of feed"—a term that has a definite bearing on the income derived from cattle. It refers to the total number of cows maintained in the herd annually divided by the number of calves weaned. For example, if a producer has maintained 100 cows for the past year and weaned 90 calves, then 1200 cow months of feed are divided by 90, resulting in 14.2 cow months of feed per calf weaned. As this figure increases, production efficiency per cow-calf weaned drops and this is money down the drain.

The number of calves actually weaned becomes an especially critical factor when calculating the cost of keeping open cows. Current total costs per cow per year run about \$204. This is a large investment if there is no return in the

form of a calf weaned. Using the total cow maintenance cost of \$204 per year, the cost per pound of calf with a 100% calf crop weaned at 450 pounds per calf 45 cents. creases drastically as the number of calves weaned drops. With only 50 calves weaned from 100-cow herd, the cost per pound of calf jumps to 91 cents.

So, as the winter approaches and cattlemen start planning their feeding program, we advise giving close attention to culling those cows that are open. It doesn't make dollars and cents to feed them through the winter.

Insects Moving Indoors

Insects will soon be looking for warmer place of residence, and it will probably be your home. Insects likely to be moving indoors include cockroaches, elm leaf beetles, boxelder bugs, fall webworms, crickets, clover mites, house flies, cluster flies and spiders.

The best way to halt the insect invasion is to spray the outside fourdation of your home.

We advise spraying walls, porches, steps, baseboards, doorways and vindow ledges with an approved insecticide to control crawling in-


The best way to keep cockroaches out of the house is to keep it clean. If they do get in, spray or dust window and door frames, drainboards, under the sink, in cracks and holes, around pipes and in cup-

If ants are a problem in your home, try to find their nest and spray it. You may have to remove some flooring or carpeting to find it. Crickets sometimes cause dam-

age to fabrics and foods and can be controlled by spraying on the ground and around the foundation of the house and the edges of sidewalks, patios and curbs.

When spraying, keep rooms wellventilated and keep people out of the spraying area for several hours efter application or until the spray dries. As always, pay close attention to the manufacturer's instructions when using any insecticide.

District 8—Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan. District 9—Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the referendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P. O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.
