efficiently. Cooking complete meals instead of one food item is more economical. Before turning on the oven, arrange the oven racks to accommodate the baking pans. It's easier and more economical.

Preheating is not necessary for foods that will cook at least an hour, or when broiling. However, preheating is preferred for pastries, cakes and souffles. When you do preheat, approximately ten minutes is enough.

Remember to keep the oven door closed while you are baking. Each time you open the door to take a peek, the oven temperatures can fall 25 to 75 degrees. Food takes longer to bake and the loss of heat can affect browning and baking results.

POLITICAL SYMBOLS HAVE INTERESTING ORIGIN

Whether you're a Republican or a Democrat you may be surprised to know how your political party got its symbol.



The Republican elephant first appeared in an 1874 Har-pers Weekly cartoon by Thomas Nast. But the elephant didn't become a Republican overnight. According to The World Book Encyclopedia, Nast used the elephant as a Republican symbol many times before it came to stand for the Republican party.

The donkey was first used as a political symbol by Andrew Jackson after his opponents called him a "jackass" during the 1828 election. By the 1880s Thomas Nast's cartoons had caught the public eye and es-tablished the donkey as the symbol of the Democratic





Meat with an "off" odor or slimy feel is spoiled. Beef usually spoils first on the surface. Pork spoils first at the meeting point of bone and flesh in the inner portions. To test for spoiled pork, use a pointed knife to reach the interior of the meat. An "off" odor on the knife means spoilage.
