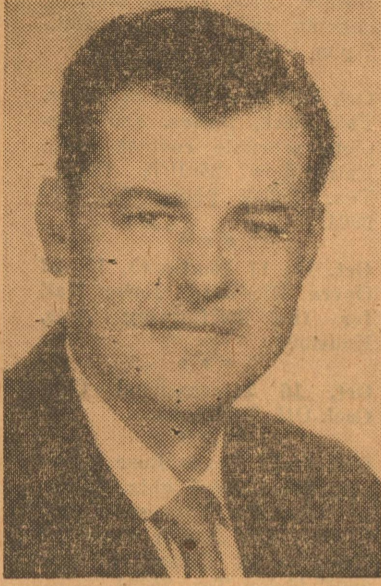

Derrick To Head Ford Committee

Former Governor John B. Connally, chairman of the President Ford Committee in Texas, has appointed local rancher Howard Derrick as the county chairman for Schleicher County.

"Howard Derrick will bring to the campaign the coordination needed to assure that all Texans understand the President's firm stand on the issues confronting our country today," Connally said.

"I believe President Ford stands for the majority of Texans in his stand on such issues as agriculture, tax laws, right to work, national defense, energy, and needless federal spending," Connally said.

"Jimmy Carter has flip-flopped so many times on the issues, that few, if any, Americans understand his position on the problems facing the Presidency," Connally added.

"Texans are becoming aware that Carter's statements on energy would destroy the tax base in Texas and lead to a state income tax," Connally said.

"They are becoming aware that Carter's agriculture policy would mean the unionization of workers on every small farm in Texas."

Absentee voting in the general election was scheduled to begin Wednesday, October 13, and continue through Friday, October 29.

This election, which includes electing a President of the United States, will be held on Tuesday, November 2.

Qualified voters may vote absentee in person or by mail. Those eligible to cast ballots between October 13 and 29 include:

—A voter of the state who expects to be absent from this county on election day.

—A voter who will be 65 years of age or older on election day.

—A voter who will be unable to attend the polls because of sickness or physical disability which includes impending childbirth.

—A voter confined to jail.

—A voter who will be unable to attend the polls because of religious beliefs.

Ballots may be cast in person or by mail at the office of Jim Thornton, County Clerk.

The ones who vote absentee by mail are mainly college students and servicemen.

Additional information may be obtained by calling or going by the County Clerk's office.

Gardeners Should Watch For Blister Beetles

Home vegetable gardeners should be on the alert for blister beetles, pests that generally make their appearance this time of the year.

Most blister beetles are about an inch long. They are elongate and cylindrical in shape. One distinctive feature of the blister beetle is a head which is larger than the prothorax.

Blister beetles secrete a substance called cantharidin which can blister skin. Therefore, they should be handled carefully. Several species will attack the home garden.

These pests appear in damaging numbers and are capable of delimiting garden plants in a short time. Carbaryl (Seven) and endosulfan (Thiodan) provide effective control of blister beetles.

Garden Check List For October

If it has been over six weeks since you last fertilized, late October or early November is an excellent time to use a complete fertilizer on lawns, trees and shrubs. The roots take up the nutrients and plants are ready to grow next

Spring.

Brown patch can really ruin the lawn if allowed to go unchecked. Treat infected areas as well as several feet beyond with teraclor (PCNB) to control and prevent continued spread of the disease.

Make your selections of Spring flowering bulbs now. Suggest storing tulip and hyacinth bulbs in the vegetable drawer at 38 to 40 F. until mid-December before planting.

Compost the leaves as they fall. Alternate layers of wet leaves, fertilizer and soil for rapid decomposition. If mower has mulching attachment, use it to chop up large leaves to speed up the process.

If you are going to attempt to save caladium tubers for another year, you should dig them in late October, and allow to dry in a well ventilated but shady area. Then store in a cool dry place.

Make plans for needed landscape improvement.

Don't let landscape chores interfere with your favorite football game. Give the wife a break, however, by doing a few chores between games. The exercise will be good for you and good for the garden.



Austin, Tex.—The general election campaign is in full swing in Texas.

President Ford, his Democratic opponent Jimmy Carter, and Carter's vice presidential running mate, Sen. Walter Mondale, were all Texas visitors during the last week. They will be back, and Mondale and GOP vice presidential nominee Sen. Robert Dole, scheduled their October 15 debate in Houston.

Polls purportedly show Ford closing the gap on Carter, though Democrats claim they are still ahead and plan to stay there with help from all major statewide Democratic officials and organizations in most of the 254 counties.

Former Gov. John Connally is leading the Ford state organization. Gov. Dolph Briscoe is head of Carter's statewide steering committee, while Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong and State Democratic Chairman Calvin Guest are campaign co-chairmen. Doug Lewis and Peter O'Donnell Jr. aid Connally in the Ford Committee's Austin headquarters.

U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen is challenged by U. S. Rep. Alan Steelman, a Dallas Republican, but Steelman is having serious money problems which he said may keep him from meeting his advertising budget and which already has forced a staff reduction.

Steelman is attacking Bentsen for sponsoring "tax loopholes" that he claims benefitted special interests who contributed substantially to the senator's campaign. He also contends Bentsen ignored his Senate campaign promises to Texans when he was a Democratic presidential candidate.

Bentsen assails Steelman for absenteeism from the House during his campaign and criticizes the Republican's record on such issues as land use planning legislation.

Democrat Jon Newton and Republican Walter Wendlandt are warming up their Railroad Commission race.

Controversial Democratic State Supreme Court nominee Don Yarbrough has two write-in opponents, Sam Houston of Denton and Tom Lorraine of Houston.

Homemaking At A Glance

by Nancy Lester

When In Doubt—Throw It Out

Prevent foodborne illness—throw out food of "questionable" safety.

Homemakers can be alert to possible spoiled foods by learning some signs of spoilage in canned vegetables, meats, fish and poultry.

These signs of spoilage include:

- Swelled top of jar
- Dents along side seams of cans
- Foam
- Milkiness of juice
- Leaks
- "Off" odor

Some spoilage, however, does not have an "off" odor. Home-canned food should be cooked for 10-20 minutes for added safety. Do not taste before cooking.

Spoiled fish will have an "off" odor. Gills will be gray or greenish and eyes sunken. The flesh will be easily pulled away from the bones and the flesh will not be rigid.

Pink color on the upper fins and near the tail of shrimp denotes spoilage, as does an "off" odor similar to ammonia. Some types of shrimp are naturally pink. Cooked shrimp are pink, and both are wholesome if the odor is normal.

Meat with an "off" odor or slimy feel is spoiled. Beef usually spoils first on the surface. Pork spoils first at the meeting point of bone and flesh in the inner portions. To test for spoiled pork, use a pointed knife to reach the interior of the meat. An "off" odor on the knife means spoilage.

Consumer Food News . . .

College Station, Tex.—This will be a big year for cranberries, a good growing season will provide about 9% more than last year—and the second largest crop on record, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, says.

"Specials on cranberries are already showing up in some stores and consumers can buy this short-season fruit now to use fresh, then freeze for later use," she suggested.

Mrs. Clyatt is consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Apples, pears, bananas, oranges and cantaloupes are seasonal fruits in best supply and good prices.

"Cabbage is abundant now and most prices are low. Also, for menu variety, try eggplant and squash, both of which are in heavy supply. Carrots, green peppers, dry onions and potatoes are other economical vegetable choices."

Some pork prices are down, with emphasis on Boston butt roasts, shoulder steaks, end and loin chops and pork lives. Prices may be lower on semi-boneless hams, picnics, some brands of bacon and frankfurters, also.

"Beef prices are about the same as last week. Cooler weather makes chuck cuts in greater demand, which may bid prices up a bit. But careful shopping can result in attractive prices on chuck roasts, ground beef, boneless roll roasts and liver," she advised.

Fryer chickens carry special price tags at some markets—usually the whole bird and mixed parts are the most economical choices, she added.

"Egg prices are slightly higher and are likely to stay there a while."

CONSUMER WATCHWORDS:

Compare egg prices by the pound with cost of other protein foods. A dozen large eggs—minimum of 24 ounces—weighs 1½ pounds.

Consider the value of eggs in nutritious menus.
