

The Prospects For The 94th Congress

(by Congressman Bob Krueger)

Now that the elections have pased, we have a new President, and the Members of Congress are beto what sort of Congress it will be and what kind of legislation it will produce.

The new Congress reflects some pasic changes in the way our government functions. First, nearly a third of the Members will have served one term or less. Second, many of the more powerful committee chairmen are retiring, so there will be a new leadership, and newer Members will have an opportunity to participate fully in representing their constituencies.

Although the Congress will be more receptive to new ideas and innovative policies than it has been in the past few years, I would not expect to see any sweeping changes immediately. As Jefferson said, "Great innovations should not be forced on slender majorities. President-elect Carter has indicated that although he wants to lead the government in some new directions, he will move cautiously, carefully considering each move. This type of "businessman's perspective" should be a welcome change in Washington.

I will be working again in this Congress to help direct our nation toward a national energy policy which is sensible and does not depend too heavily on foreign energy sources. Similarly, I intend to pursue steadily the goal of a bal-anced budget and will, wherever possible, vote against wasteful

On the basis of the agricultural. research tour which I took in October, I will be looking for new ways to encourage and support agricultural research. My hope is that with a farmer in the White House, this will be an idea which is warmly received.

Other matters such as health care and our nationla defense will require careful consideration. The world will be looking to the United States for guidance, and I will work to see that the decisions which we in the Congress make will be in the best interests of our nation and the world.

The Congress will face a number of difficult issues in the next year, and I think all of us in Washington are committed to doing what is right, what is best for our constituencies and for our country. In achieving that worthy goal, we will need the support, advice, and guidance of the people we represent. Working together, I am optimistic that we can, in the words of our new President, have "a government as good as our people are."

Americans And Ice Cubes — Twentieth Century Love Story

Americans born in the last | half of the 20th Century take the availability of ice in their homes for granted.

But, in reality, ice for food preservation, treating hangovers, chilling liquids, and numbing aches and bruises is a fairly recent phenomenon.

Man has known about the benefits of ice for millenniums, but throughout much of recorded history only those living in cold, northern cli-mates were able to take advantage of it, and then generally only in the winter months. In warmer climes, ice at any time was almost a miracle, although not necessarily unknown to the wealthy. In the First Century A.D., for example, the Roman Emperor Nero dispatched sprinters to the tops of nearby mountains to bring back snow to help

him keep cool. In this country, in Colonial times, many homeowners developed the practice of cutting winter ice on northern lakes and storing it beneath layers of sawdust in caves, cellars or ice houses. Eventually, commercial distribution 25, 50 and 100 pound blocks of ice. door-to-door began in large cities, and as the demand escalated natural ice was supplemented early in the 20th Century by artificial ice produced in ice factories by mechanical refrigeration systems.

The iceman continued to visit most "modern" American homes right up until World War II, although his days began to be numbered a generation earlier when several manufacturers introduced small home refrigeration sys-

tems consisting of condensing units with external motors located in the basement and refrigerant lines leading to the

existing ice box in the kitchen. Household refrigeration received its biggest shot in the arm when General Electric in the late '20's introduced the famed Monitor-Top model, with a hermetically sealed

motor and compressor. Early refrigerators had tiny compartments for making one or two trays of ice cubes, a process that often took overnight. The first two-door refrigerator, with a separate zero-degree freezer compartment, was introduced in the late '40's, markedly speeding

the process of ice making.

The pace of appliance development has been rapid in the past two decades. The automatic icemaker was pioneered in 1953, and today such units are available for most refrigerator-freezers and can make upwards of 160 cubes

in a 24-hour period.

In the '60s, General Electric developed the Custom Dispenser — a feature which permits the consumer to get ice cubes, crushed ice, or ice water from a dispenser in the freezer door, without ever opening the door. Later, Hotpoint introduced a pull-down ice bucket in the freezer door which is constantly replen-ished by an automatic ice maker, and last year added a chilled water dispenser to two

such models. Ice - at one time unavailable at any price, particularly in the South — is today at the fingertips of most American homemakers for just pennies



In some markets they are trimming off part of the outside fat before packaging pork cuts. Producers are trying to grow pigs that have less fat, too. These practices are making pork better values.

Dark green color sometimes present on the outside of the yolk and white of hardcooked eggs is harmless. It is caused by heating too long or at too high a temperature.

County Extension Agent's Column

Garden Check List For November

1. The dried flowers, fruit and leaves of trees, weeds and grass are yours for the collecting. They make beautiful dried arrangements for winter time use.

2. Clean up leaves and dried fruit around trees, shrubs, and vegetable gardens as these are excellent overwintering places for insect and disease problems.

3. Check those bulbs you are chilling in the refrigerator for disease and dehydration.

5. Daffodils and Dutch iris may be planted this month. Choose only hea,thy, sound bulbs and plant in well prepared soil with good drain-

6. Time to clean and repair gar-den tools before placing in storage for the winter. Rub a light coat of oil on unpainted metal surfaces to prevent rust. Sand any rough spots on wooden handles then dress with

7. Any power equipment needing repairs should be tagged and if | possible sent to the shop now rather than waiting until the Spring

8. Mulch plantings to protect against winter cold. Pine needles, clean hay and straw make excellent insulation against the cold.

9. Plant Spring-flowering annuals and perennials, including pansies, snapdragons, pinks.

10. Still time to transplant iris, timing is due to the vegetable daylilies, shasta daisies and other growth of the leaves and bulbs. If pring-flowering perennials.

Pass your hand over the plant and in front of the light source. If ou see a sharp, clear shadow, the light is considered high in intensity. A soft diffused shadow indicates medium light while a faintly discernable shadow means a very low light intensity. 18. If you don't have enough win-

dow space for all your potted plants try growing them under one of the many fluorescent lights made especially for plants.


Onions For The Home Gardener Onions are a welcome addition to any culinary dish, and they make a welcome addition to any garden or an unused corner of your flo-


