**New Ride And Show To Open At Six Flags In Upcoming '77 Season**

Arlington, Texas.—A whirling, stomach-churning new thrill ride and a unique pirate puppet show will highlight a \$2 million expansion program in 1977 at Six Flags Over Texas. And, changes are being made to add thrills to the Texas Chute Out parachute ride.

The new ride and show are being built on Skull Island to give that section, in the heart of the park, a total "new look." Skull Island was one of the original features in the park when it opened 17 seasons ago.

The new ride, the Spinnaker, consists of a giant wheel resting on its side with 21 gondolas dangling from the rim.

Each gondola can hold two persons securely locked inside. As the wheel begins to spin and pick up speed, the gondolas are flung outward and passengers suddenly

find themselves on their sides whirling parallel to the ground.

Then a massive hydraulic system tilts the wheel to a vertical position and literally slings riders upside down with each revolution. Finally, the wheel begins to slow down and again lays on its side. The gondolas return to their original position before the ride comes to a stop.

The Spinnaker ride is being fabricated in Munsterhausen, Germany and parts will be shipped to the United States for assembly in the theme park. Work has begun on clearing the land where the new ride will be assembled and extensively tested before Six Flags Over Texas opens March 12.

Also to premiere when the park begins its new season is a one-of-a-kind puppet show called Captain LeFect's Flagship Follies, staged on a 30-foot pirate ship.

Characters that pop in and out of the unique ship include Captain LeFect, whose feet are as big as his oversized pirate's hat, and a troupe of singing cannonballs led by a banjo-playing character called Wabash.

The pirate ship will be docked in a lagoon with the audience watching the 30-minute comedy from Skull Island.

Six Flags General Manager Dan Howells said the new attractions on Skull Island carry out a trend of preserving the quality of existing sections in its theme park.

"While we continue to add new features to the park each season, we also believe in preserving traditions. Skull Island's brand-new look in 1977 is an example of taking one of the favorite areas of the park and turning it into an exciting new experience."

Howells noted that many thousands of dollars are being spent throughout the park for changes that will be undetected by a majority of guests.

The entrance mall with its lavish fountains and landscape displays is being expanded and two major buildings are being added to the area.

New twists are being added to the popular Texas Chute Out parachute ride that opened in April, 1976.

For an added sensation, half of the 12 chutes will have new, stand-up metal baskets allowing thrill seekers to take a 175-foot "standing jump" on the lowering ride.

Another new feature on the stand-up baskets is a spinning device that will rotate riders as they are hoisted in the air and then released for a breath-taking descent.

Major new shows will open at the Southern Palace, Crazy Horse Saloon, Good Time Theater and other show areas throughout the park. Big-name entertainers are being booked for concerts in the Music Mill Theater.

**Sen. Snelson Named To Committee**

Senator Pete Snelson of Midland was appointed Chairman of the Senate Intergovernmental Relations Committee, the committee which primarily functions to study and report on legislation regulating the affairs of the various political subdivisions of state and local government in Texas.

Other members of the committee include Senator Carl Parker, vice-chairman, and Senators Betty Andujar, Ron Clower, Glenn Kothmann, Frank Lombardino, Raul Longoria, Jack Ogg, and Lindon Williams.

The work load of this committee is one of the heaviest in the Senate due to the large number of legislative proposals referred to it. Last session 375 pieces of legislation were handled by the committee.

One of the principal items which will confront the committee this year will be the matter of determining various types of new courts.

Another item will be that of proposals to grant ordinance-making power to counties.

Also, legislation creating hospital districts, water districts, and other special districts are referred to this committee.

Senator Snelson is also on the Finance and the Education Committees.

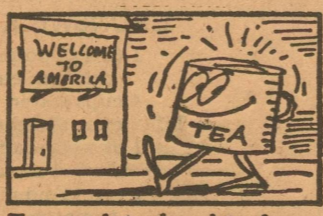

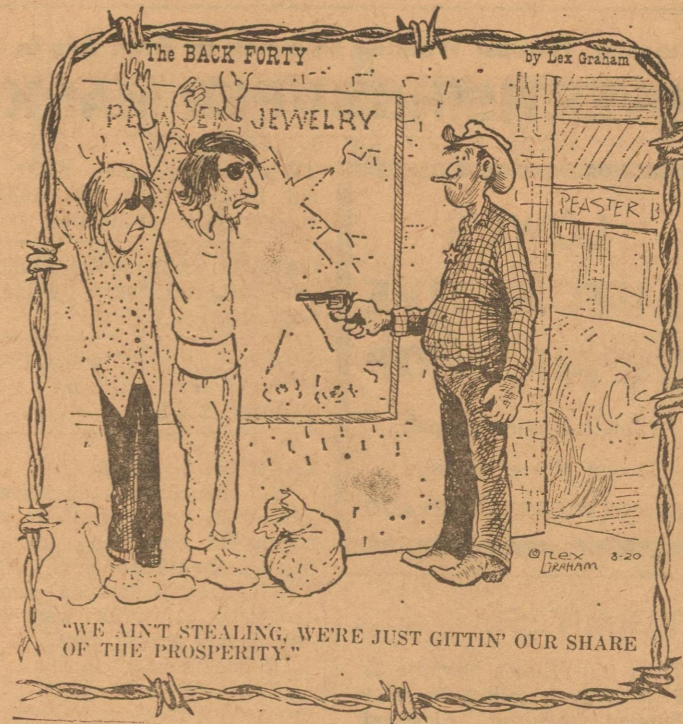

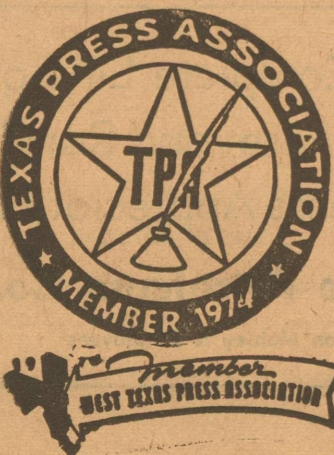

Brunswick Stew Is An Old-Fashioned Southern Favorite

Both Virginia and Georgia claim the origination of Brunswick Stew—Virginians saying it was named after Caroline of Brunswick, wife of King George IV; Georgians claiming it was named after the town Brunswick, Ga.

BRUNSWICK STEW

1 (2-1/2 pound) frying chicken, cut up 4 cups water 1-1/2 cups sliced onion 1 can (17-ounce) whole kernel corn in liquid 1 can (1-pound) tomatoes 1 package (10-ounce) frozen Fordhook lima beans 2 cloves garlic, crushed

THE BICENTENNIAL KITCHEN

Three centuries ago, ladies of Williamsburg, Virginia, entertained graciously, elegantly, imaginatively. The most important, and most elegant, meal of the day was dinner, served at two or three o'clock in the afternoon.

In true colonial Williamsburg tradition, dinner was a splendid affair. It included several large cuts of meat, fowl and fish, plus game birds, seafood dishes and meat casseroles, boiled puddings, vegetables and a variety of desserts.

Chicken 'n' Ham Bake was one of the popular items on the dinner menu. It combines two of Virginians' favorite meats in one dish. In this Williamsburg-inspired recipe, the cubed chicken and ham are mixed with a sage-flavored cream sauce, then topped with bread cubes and baked.

1/2 teaspoon rubbed sage 3 cups cooked cubed chicken 2 cups (about 1/2-pound) cubed cooked ham Melt 3 tablespoons Blue Bonnet Margarine; toss in dry bread cubes. Set aside. In a large saucenpan melt remaining 5 tablespoons Blue Bonnet Margarine. Add chopped onion and saute until tender. Remove pan from heat; 6 to 8 servings.

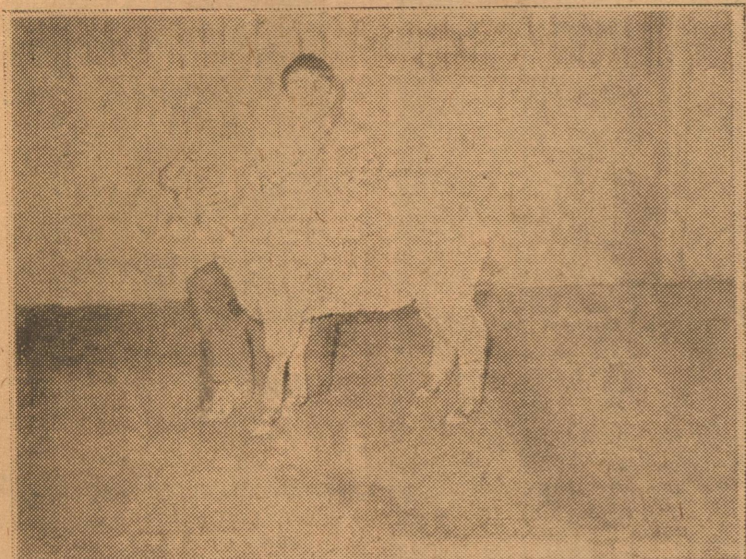

1 chicken bouillon cube 1 tablespoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) softened Blue Bonnet Margarine 3 tablespoons flour move chicken from broth. Cool. 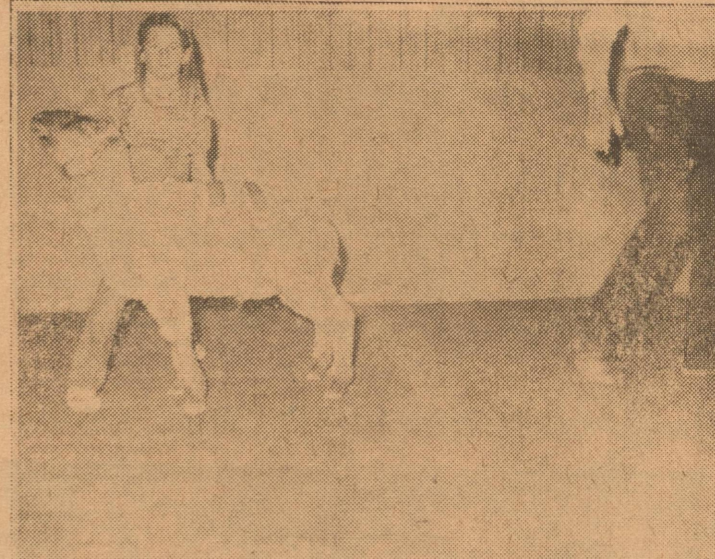

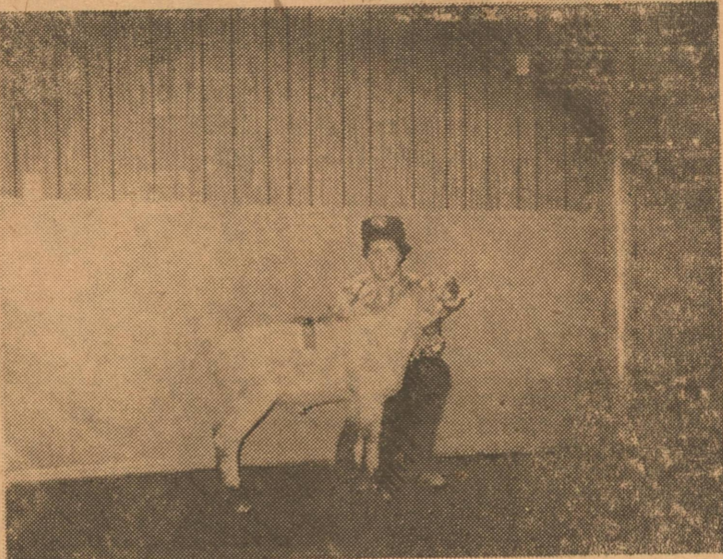

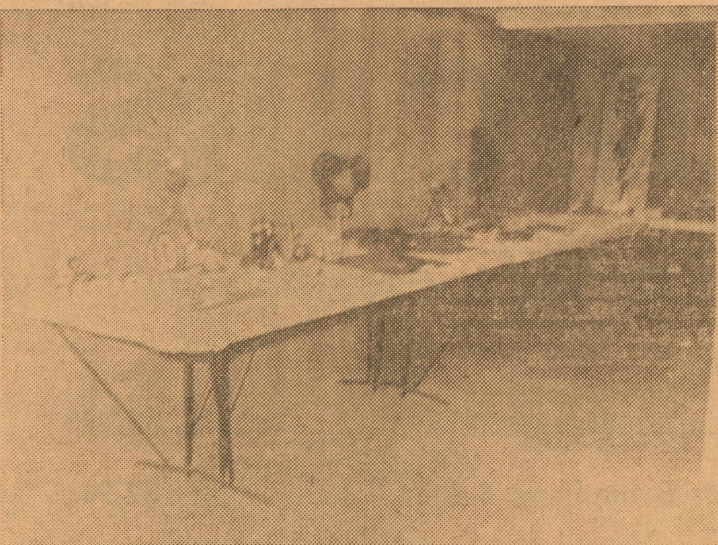

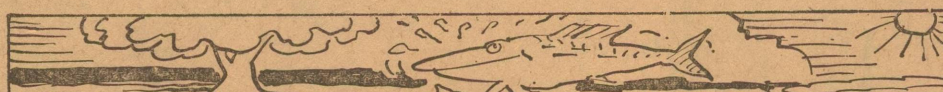

**Fiber Crafts Meeting Is Set In Kerrville**

Many of Texas' finest talents in fiber crafts will be in Kerrville on February 19 & 20 for a special seminar and show sponsored by the Texas Arts and Crafts Foundation. The two day program will be held in the Medallion Room Convention Center of The Inn of The Hills. All sessions will be open to the general public, according to Audie Hamilton, Foundation Executive Director.

Weaving, macrame, batik, basketry and needlepoint will be featured in special teaching sessions. Both beginning and advanced instruction in weaving and macrame will be offered. Other demonstrations in spinning, carding, natural dyes and other fiber crafts will be offered informally during the two day event.

Marketing of handmade arts and crafts will be the topic of a panel discussion on Sunday, February 20. The development of new markets and tips on spotting fraudulent promoters and situations will be discussed.

A special fiber crafts display of gallery and museum quality arts from the Houston area will be presented by Jana Vanderlee. The display contains prize-winning massive wall hangings, basketry and clothing design. Mr. Vanderlee, a fiber crafts instructor from San Jacinto College in Houston, also writes for several crafts oriented magazines.

Approximately 30 sales booths will offer excellent handmade fiber crafts for sale. Booth exhibitors are chosen by invitation only from those previously juried by the Foundation. Consistent, high quality materials and fine workmanship will be featured in items offered for sale.

**Label On Return Speeds Up Refund**

Taxpayers can receive their refunds faster by using the pre-addressed peel-off label on their returns, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The label, which appears on the cover of the tax package mailed to taxpayers, lists name, address and social security number.

The IRS emphasized that if any information on the label is incorrect, the taxpayer should make corrections right on the label.

Married taxpayers filing a joint return should check to see that two social security numbers appear on the label. If only one social security number is shown, the other spouse's number should be entered on the appropriate line.

According to the IRS, taxpayers can also ensure a faster refund by mailing their return in the coded envelope also included with the tax package.
