



### Fiesta del Concho Events Announced

San Angelo's Fiesta del Concho, June 18-26 is one of the most complete packages of entertainment for every taste and type, for the young and old, according to Wes Pittman, Fiesta del Concho general chairman.

The event, which requires over 1500 people to organize, takes place over a nine day period including two weekends. Activities center around San Angelo's Concho River, its elaborate park system, and historic Fort Concho where memories of General MacKenzie's raiders and the Tenth Cavalry Buffalo soldiers linger on.

Fiesta begins Saturday, June 18 with a Civic boost from the San Angelo Lions Club at 7:00 a.m. with a pancake breakfast. For Fiesta goers who do not wish to miss the parade, free shuttle-bus service will be offered from the Pancake breakfast to the downtown area. There will be floats, bands and crowds or parents with their children.

After the parade, the starting guns will signal the beginning of the horse races at Wilke Downs at 1:00 p.m. Also scattered around town will be such diverse events as a professionally sponsored water ski exhibition, tennis tournament, skateboard races, bike races and canoe races. That night everyone will get their boots on for a western dance at the San Angelo Coliseum.

If the Fiesta goer gets worried about not being able to get to all of the events, he must take in to consideration that some of the events will be repeated throughout the week. On Sunday the 19th, a special children's theater of Peter and the Wolf and Hansel and Gretel will be staged. This begins a two day run by the Dallas Theatre Center. Also on the 19th, Concho Cruises will begin on the River Area at noon.

Opening night for the River Amphitheatre is Monday night. Several other events such will have their second showing on Monday, so Fiesta goers who missed some of the events may attend them the next day.

On Tuesday, June 21, the Talent Show begins four days of discovering the finest talent of the area. So far, entrants have come from as far as Midland. This year's talent contest culminates with an appearance by Miss Texas, Carmen McCollom, who will play her saxophone. Also on the agenda is a fish rodeo for the youngsters.

Night activities include the Mellerdrummer which begins a four day run and the Ambassador's ball featuring Fiesta's young ladies who will be Fiesta del Concho hostesses. A carnival will begin Wednesday along with the continuation of the Mellerdrummer.

Thursday night will highlight historic Fort Concho. A Night at Old Fort Concho will feature games, activities, dancing, and wagon rides for the children.

On Friday, food booths spring up in the river area by Santa Fe Park featuring both traditional and ethnic foods. One of the highlights of Fiesta, the River Parade, will make the river sparkle with lights and floats. Since no one will be in a mood to go home, a street dance will follow.

Saturday's activities will go wild with the continuance of the week's events throughout the week as well as the Arts and Crafts Fair, the Free Stage for those who like to perform, the Antique Auto parade and the Fiesta del Concho International Armadillo Races.

A new event is the Fiesta Fiddler's Contest where top fiddlers from around the country will com-

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pete.

One of the exciting events for those who like thrills will be Janet Lee, The Flying Angelo, who will attempt to jump the Concho River on her motorcycle. Ms. Lee will then place herself in a coffin-like box loaded with sticks of dynamite and end her act with a bang.

For those who want to take advantage of the exotic Mexican Culture, the Baille de Fiesta dance will be held at the San Angelo

Coliseum.

Sunday will rain the skydivers with colorful parachutes. There will also be Arts and Crafts booths as well as an Art Auction.

Fiesta—the best of food, entertainment, dances, pretty ambassadors and handsome escorts, as well as the best time for the summer yet.

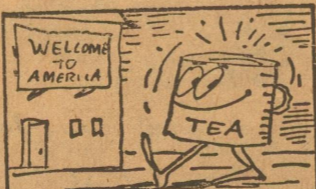
### Little League Promoters Launch New Project

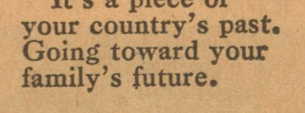

### MY HART'S IN THE HIGHLANDS

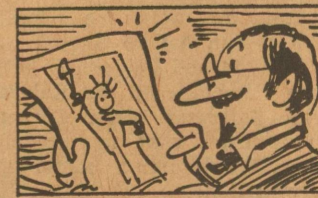
True there are tree-filled forests in Scotland, but to the sportsman the most important parts of the Highlands are the deer forests which are not really forests at all.

Most of the ground consists of bare mountainside, with a few shrubs to relieve the monotony.



Scotland is a small country, but deer forests cover more than 2 1/2 million acres. They are now the happy hunting ground of rich visitors from America, Japan, France and Germany. Their ambition is to bag a royal stag.

Teacher's Scotch Information Centre explains that a stag doesn't have to belong to Queen Elizabeth to be royal. The term royal stag is applied to animals which carry 12 points on their horns. You can see them in Victorian paintings of "The Monarch of the Glen," but you can seldom see them in a deer forest.

**New Strike Finaled  
Northeast Of Eldorado**

Canyon reef gas production was opened in the Jan-Jerrye multipay field of Scheicher County with reclassification of Cabana Oil Corp. No. 2 Tisdale Estate. Canyon reef oil opener and lone producer from that pay, eight miles northeast of Eldorado, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 13 million cubic feet of g.s. daily, with g.s-liquid ratio of 87,000-1.

Production was through perforations at 5,304-310 feet.

It was finaled Sept. 5, 1974 for 130 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1,009-1, through the above perforations.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,879 feet from the west lines of 30-M-GH&SA.

The field also has one Strawn gas and one Har'ey gas producer.

The bride is a 1975 graduate of

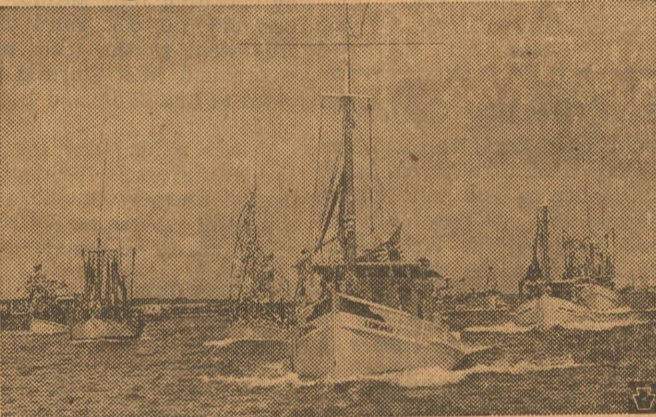

**Blessing of Biloxi Fleet . . .  
Highlights Colorful Festival**

BILOXI, MS.—Hundreds of colorfully decorated shrimp boats and other crafts of all sizes gather every June in Biloxi, Miss. to be blessed in a religious ceremony that traces its origins to the ancient coastal villages of western Europe. At 2 P.M. on June 5, the Mississippi Gulf Coast will keep alive the traditional "Blessing of the Fleet" as boats file past Catholic Priests who will ask God to grant the fishermen and their boats a safe voyage, a bountiful catch and a peaceful harbor.

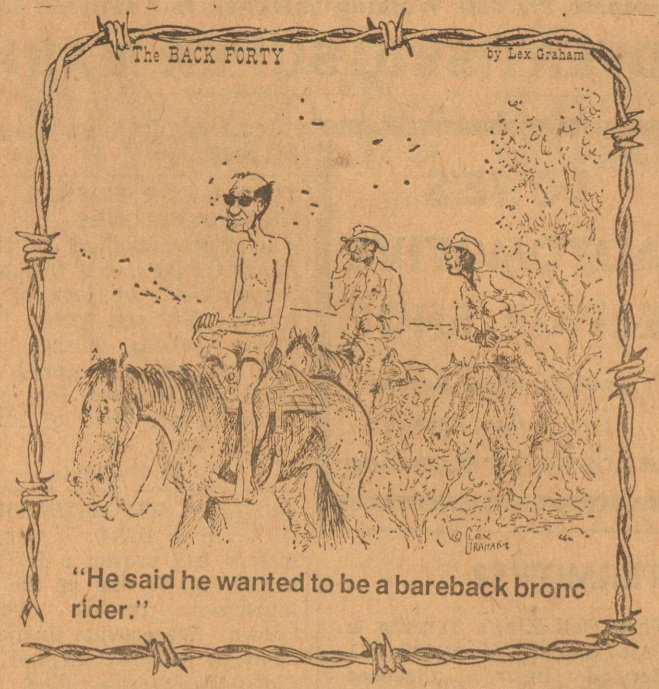
The ceremony began over 300 years ago as the "Ritual of the Sea" and was held on the coasts of Normandy and Portugal as well as on the shores of the Adriatic.

As the climax of the annual Biloxi Shrimp Festival, June 4-5, the Blessing of the Fleet attracts fishermen from neighboring cities and nearby states, as well as Biloxi's fishing fleet. This huge marine parade draws thousands of people to the shore to watch the boats—decorated with brightly colored flags, streamers, pennants and flowers—file past the Blessing Boat. As the boats go by, they are individually blessed by the Priests of St. Michael's Catholic Church of Biloxi.

The historic pageantry of the two-day Shrimp Festival also includes parades, balls, the coronation of the Festival's king and queen and other events that combine to make it one of the Mississippi Gulf Coast's most popular attractions for residents and visitors.

Now, consumer aluminum can recycling centers have increased by 60 percent during the past year, from about 1,300 to 2,100 in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

In 1976 over four billion cans were reclaimed at these centers and can collectors were paid over \$30 million for their efforts. More than \$100 million has been paid out since the program started in 1970.

Recycling aluminum cans not only reduces litter and generates money for all who participate, but it helps America conserve energy and resources. Recycling aluminum back to molten metal saves 95 percent of the energy required to produce it in the first place. To make it even more

convenient for more Americans to participate in this activity that really pays off in many ways, a directory of Aluminum Can Recycling Centers is now available from the Aluminum Association.

**Consumer Food News**

College Station, Tex.—A fast-approaching new crop season will see fresh changes in grocery market choices—and that is causing shoppers to take a sharp look at current storage stock supplies in the meantime, one expert says.

**Vegetables—**  
Eggplant supplies are increasing with prices moderate, and potato prices are steady or slightly lower. Rutabagas, hard-shell squash, sweet potato supplies smaller, so compare prices with quality carefully. Other economical choices are cabbage, carrots, broccoli, collards, mustard greens and turnip and greens.

**Fruits—**  
Avocados in good supply, more pineapples in markets from Mexico and Hawaii (Hawaiian pineapples usually fine in quality, large in size, though prices may be higher than pineapples from other areas), and strawberries have moderate prices with very good quality. Valencia and navel oranges in good supply, but grapefruit declining seasonally, except for good supply of 23 and 36 sizes at featured prices. Anjou pears in good supply with reasonable prices. Honeydews, cantaloupes and watermelons available mostly at high-price levels.

**Poultry—**  
Steady prices on fryer chickens—with some markets offering specials on whole and cut-up fryers and on turkey parts. Eggs have attractive prices.

**Pork—**  
Pork prices continue attractive—especially good values on Boston butt roasts, center and end chops and quarter-loins cut into chops. Smoked features include ham portions and bacon.

**Beef—**  
Plentiful supplies with special emphasis on chuck roasts and steaks, round, sirloin and T-bone steaks, ground beef and liver. Take advantage of current prices for the food freezer.

**Grocery Market Aisles—**  
Features are a variety of canned vegetables—along with pork and beans, rice and peanut butter. In frozen food chests, features may include vegetables, orange juice, strawberries and dinner entrees.

**Consumer Watchwords:** Prices on pre-package apples are similar to prices of recent weeks—but prices for bulk apples are creeping upward as the season progresses.

**Senator Bentsen Praises Committee O.K. On Drought Relief**

May is Older Americans Month by proclamation of President Carter, and social security representatives in San Angelo are available to talk to groups and organizations interested in senior citizens programs, according to Franklin Upp, social security manager.

We have accurate, up-to-date, free information about social security, Medicare, and supplemental security income, Upp said. All of these programs affect senior citizens. If your group or organization wants to know more about them, you can make arrangements for a speaker by calling or writing any social security office.

Social security pays monthly benefits to almost 17 million retired workers. Over 22 million people 65 and over have Medicare. The supplemental security income program makes monthly payments to almost 2 million people 65 and over who have little or no income and limited resources.

**Older Americans Month Is Proclaimed**

Washington, D. C.— Sen. Lloyd Bentsen Wednesday said legislation approved by the Senate Public Works Committee offers needed assistance to drought stricken areas of Texas and other Western states.

The drought has placed a crushing burden on the people of West Texas and this bill will help ease the burden, Bentsen said.

Senator Bentsen, a member of the Public Works Committee, said the measure provides \$225 million to help communities improve emergency water systems.

One hundred fifty million dollars of that amount would be available for 40 year loans at 5% interest and \$75 million for 50/50 matching grants.

"The drought has the gravest potential, not only for the affected communities, but also for the nation as a whole. I am pleased that the President has requested passage of this legislation and that the Committee has acted favorably on his request.

"The money it provides can be used for projects to improve, expand or construct water supply systems and it can be used for the purchase or transportation of water.

"The people in drought areas of Texas need this money and I am hopeful that Congress will act swiftly in giving final approval to the drought relief bill," Senator Bentsen said.

**County Extension Agent's Column**

**Pesticide Applicator Certification**

Eighty-three individuals attended the Pesticide Applicator Training April 27 at 2:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. The program consisted of Slide presentation of Laws; Labels; Safety; Calibration; Pest and Pest Damage; Weed, Brush, and Vertebrate Pest. All 83 attending were certified as Private Applicators and have requested certification from The Texas Department of Agriculture.

Only Certified Private Applicators will be able to buy restricted pesticides effective October 1.

The question has been asked—when or if there is going to be another Training Meeting, or is there another way to be certified. There is a self-study option and we do plan to have another Training session in September.

**State 4-H Roping School Is Planned For June**

4-H youth in Schleicher County interested in sharpening their skills as a roper and in teaching others about roping will want to attend the 1977 State 4-H Roping School at Stephenville, June 20-24, announces Jerry Swift, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Gardeners often purchase a combination of fertilizer and herbicide (weed killer) because it is so easy to use and saves extra work. But such a mixture can also cause lawn and garden problems if not used properly.

The problem with a fertilizer-herbicide mix is that the user often applies the material without regarding the fact that a weed

killer must be used much more carefully than fertilizer. Weed killers can be especially damaging if misused since they will kill trees, shrubs and vines as well as weeds.

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**Motorcycle Safety Awareness Week Is Announced**

Austin, Tex.—Road compatibility between motorcycles and larger vehicles is an absolute must, reports Governor Dolph Briscoe. "In times of the need for more economical travel and an expanding transportation picture, we are finding an increased number of motorcycles on our streets and highways. With this increase comes an increase of the possibility of traffic accidents. We must, as drivers of cars or trucks, be totally aware of the motorcyclist as a part of the overall traffic flow.

"In 1975, 205 motorcyclists were killed. During 1976, 192 were killed. While this is a slight reduction, the number of motorcycle registrations has begun to increase. Preliminary sales reports from dealers and statistics in Texas reveal a significant increase in the two-wheelers registered.

"Frequently at the accident site of a car-motorcycle crash, the automobile driver says he simply failed to see the motorcycle. This can best be remedied by careful observation and awareness of motorcyclists on rural roads, freeways

and street intersections. We must recognize that motorcycling is an economical mode of transportation and a pleasurable ride for many. I ask simply that we increase our awareness of the traffic flow and the mixture of large vehicles and motorcycles in order to reduce the accident toll. Texans are known for cooperation and it is time to cooperate with all motorists that share our roadways," concluded Briscoe.

Governor Briscoe declared, by official proclamation, the week of May 1-7 as "Motorcycle Safety Awareness Week" in Texas. A mass media effort is supporting the proclamation.

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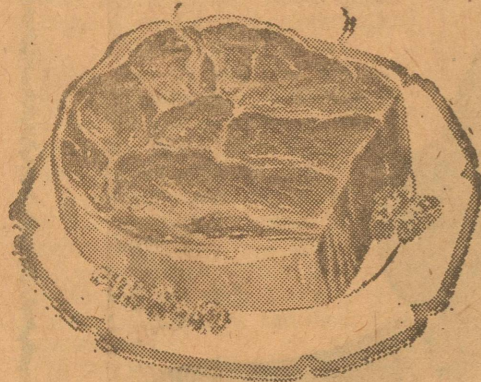

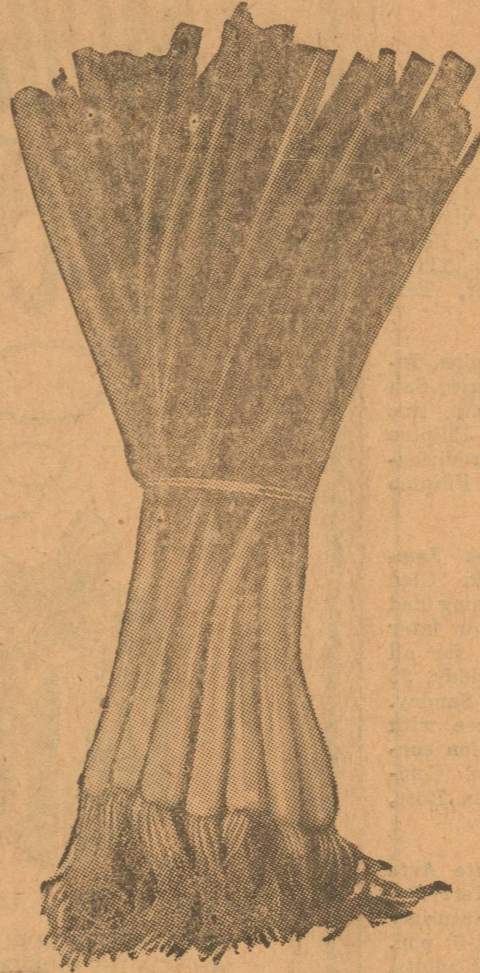
