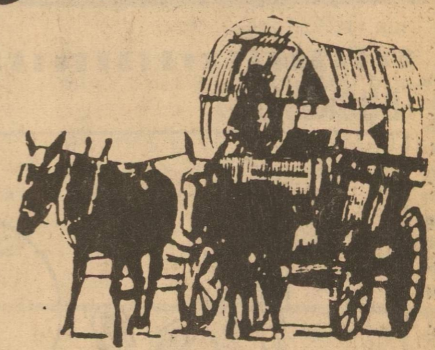

Headlines From Around The World

Prominent Democrats Fall To Republican Landslide

Washington, D.C.

In a nationwide landslide, Republican candidates swept several celebrated Democrats out of office as control of the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate as well as several Governor's Mansions swung to the Republicans in last Tuesday's General Election.

Traditionally, off-year elections go against the party which controls the White House, but Tuesday's results surprised event seasoned veterans of the process.

Speaker of the House Tom Foley fell to a virtual unknown challenger as big name Democrats across the country lost re-election bids. Among the incumbents surprised Tuesday were Mario Cuomo, Governor of New York, Ann Richards, Governor of Texas, Senator Harris Wofford of Pennsylvania, Senator Jim Sasser of Tennessee and Illinois Congressman Dan Rostenkowski.

Early predictions are that Senator Bob Dole (R) of Kansas will become Senate Majority Leader and Congressman Newt Gingrich (R) of Georgia will ascend to the Speaker of the House.

Mother To Plead Insanity In Children's Drowning Deaths

Attorneys for Susan Smith, the mother who confessed to strapping her two young sons into their car-seats before rolling the auto into a lake, indicated this week that they would plead their client not guilty by reason of temporary insanity.

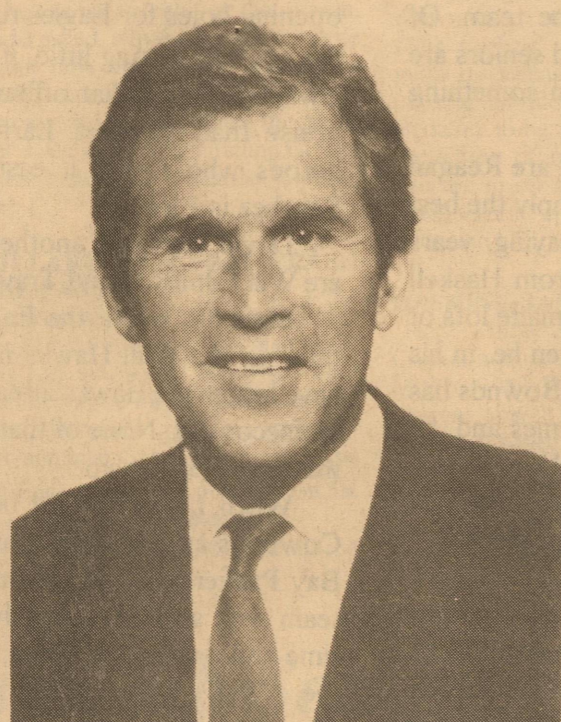
The case caught national attention when Smith claimed that her children had been kidnapped by a car-jacker. A week long search turned up no evidence of such a crime and Smith confessed to authorities after becoming the focus of the investigation.

Haitian Cabinet Seated

Port-Au-Prince, Haiti

Haitian President Jean Bertrand Aristide's cabinet ministers returned to office in the national palace this week. U.S. troops began ferrying home Haitian refugees from the Guantanamo Bay Naval Station where they have been housed. According to Clinton administration officials the move return of refugees is "the final step to normalizing the Haitian situation."

Schleicher County Goes To The Polls

Bush unseated incumbent Governor Ann Richards in Tuesday's General Election.

Voters in Schleicher County went to the polls last Tuesday as did citizens across the nation. Races for United States Senator and Representative as well as Texas Governor perhaps drew the most attention across the state and nation. But closer to home, voters decided several local races, too.

In the Schleicher County Judge's race, incumbent Judge Johnny Griffin (D) defeated challenger John Nikolauk (R) by a margin of 785 to 244. In the race for Schleicher County/District clerk, Peggy Williams (D) won over Pat Ragsdale (R) 848 to 170. The Schleicher County Justice of the Peace position was claimed by Jimmy Doyle (D) who out polled opponent Robert Parker (R) 753 to 199. Schleicher County Treasurer Karen Henderson (D) was re-elected with 855 votes. She had no opponent.

The Schleicher County Commissioner, Precinct 2 race saw incumbent Kerry Joy (D) out poll his opponents, Matt Brown (R) and

Hal Whitten (W) with 103 votes to Brown's 98 and Whitten's 41.

Schleicher County Commissioner, Precinct 4 went to incumbent Ross Whitten (D) who defeated his opponent C.R. Sproul (R) 213 to 172.

In statewide races, U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R) won easy reelection to a full term over challenger Richard Fisher (D) while George W. Bush (R) unseated Ann Richards (D) in the race for Texas Governor.

In other races of local interest, U.S. Representative Lamar Smith (R) easily outdistanced his challenger Kenny L. Lowry (I). Texas Ag. Commissioner (R) easily won reelection over Marvin Gregory (D) and Clyde L. Garland (L).

State Senator, District 25 was won handily by Jeff Wentworth (R) over Jim Saunders (D). State Representative, District 73 was again claimed by Robert Turner (D) over challengers John Brelsford (R) and Lester Dahlberg (I).

Williams won election in Tuesday's General Election, winning over challenger Pat Ragsdale.

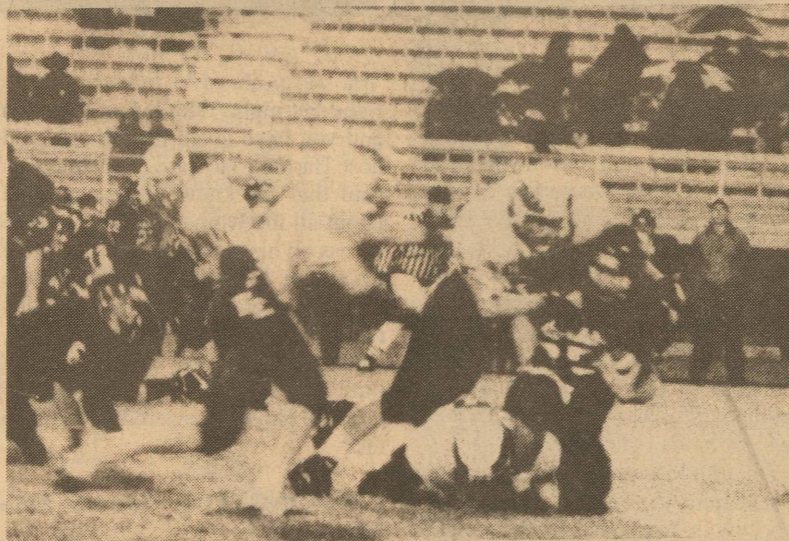
Eagles Bounce Braves Advance To Play-Offs

The Eldorado Eagles traveled to Iraan last Friday to take on the Iraan Braves. The Eagles ended the Braves season while securing a play-off berth for themselves with a 40-0 win.

The game began in a downpour with the Eagles winning the coin toss and electing to defer choice until the second half. In a puzzling move, Iraan chose to kick, giving the Eagles the ball and the wind in the first quarter. Eldorado capitalized on the situation quickly. Reagan Bownds carried the ball for 49 yards and a touchdown on the first play from the line of scrimmage. From that point on, the game was never in doubt. Eldorado piled up three first quarter touchdowns to put the game out of reach early.

Running back Reagan Bownds returned to action in the game testing his ankle after two games of inactivity. During his second touchdown run in the first quarter, Bownds reported soreness in the ankle and saw only limited action after that and then only on defense. "We didn't want to take a chance and get him hurt again," said Head Coach Doug Kuhlmann. "Reagan is an outstanding running back and we're going to need him in the play-offs, but we've proven against McCamey, Van Horn and now Iraan that there are others on this team who can step up and do the job."

"Michael O'Daniel had a superb game running the ball as did Landon Neal and Clay Butler. We are blessed this year with depth at running back but the real credit goes to the offensive line, the big guys up front who have consistently opened holes for our

backs all year," continued Kuhlmann.

The big guys up front that Kuhlmann referred to are, Larry Sanchez, Jason Corbell, Will Edmiston, Leon Fuentes, Shylowe Middleton, David Wilson, Austin Hunter, & Ty Williams.

Defensively, the Eagles recorded their 7th shut-out of the season allowing the Braves a mere 57 yards of total offense. "We had a tremendous game on defense," said Coach Kuhlmann. "Our kids worked hard all week and were prepared for this game. We kept putting pressure on their quarterback and forced turnovers which our offense quickly took advantage of."

Offensive leaders on the team were: Michael O'Daniel who carried 13 times for 129 yards and 2 TDs; Reagan Bownds rushed for 89 yards and 2 touchdowns on 5 carries; Travis Whitten carried 9 times for 38 yards and a touchdown; Whitten also

connected on a pass for 13 yards; Landon Neal carried 9 times for 24 yards and a score; Clay Butler picked up 8 yards on 2 carries; Brian Jones caught a pass for 20 yards; Pepper Nix hauled in another for 13 yards and Cory Edmiston caught a ball for 6 yards; Zane Bruce tossed 2 passes for 26 yards and rushed 3 times for another 6 yards.

Defensively the Eagles were led by: Eric McGinnes with 8 tackles, a fumble recovery and 3 sacks; Cody McCravery with 9 tackles, a fumble recovery, a sack and a forced fumble; Ty Williams with 10 tackles and a forced fumble; Will Edmiston with 6 tackles, a fumble recovery and a sack; Michael O'Daniel with an interception; and Austin Hunter with a sack and a blocked punt.

After viewing game films, the Eagles coaching staff named Michael O'Daniel and Eric

City Council Meets

The Eldorado City Council met in regular session at 5:30 p.m. Monday night. Mayor John Nikolauk called the meeting to order with Councilmembers Dora Bosmans, Jeri Whitten, Randy Mankin, David Hill and Tommy Minor in attendance.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo presented the minutes of the previous meeting and they were approved by the council. The council then studied and authorized the paying of October bills. The council also reviewed the

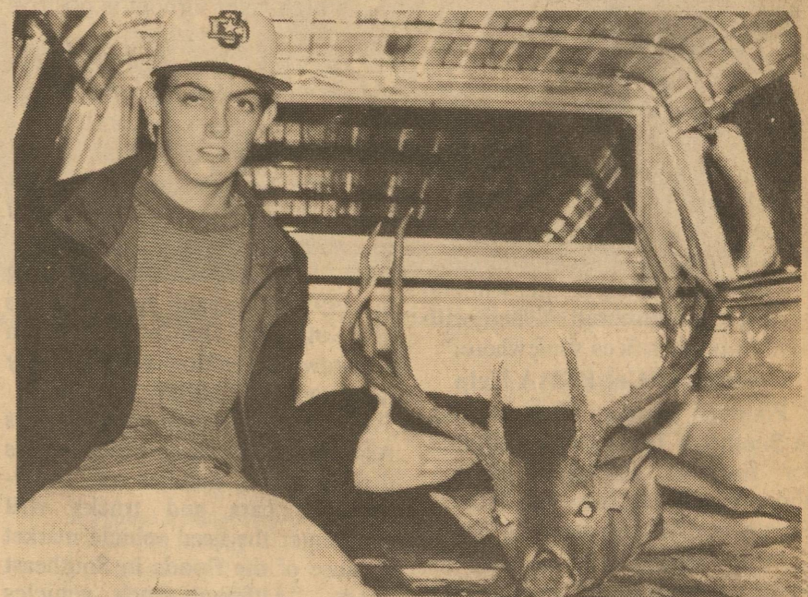
City Superintendent Jack Dean reported to the council concerning the Main Street sidewalk project and other ongoing projects around town. Dean also updated the council on new Railroad Commission rules relating to the City's gas department employees and drug and alcohol testing requirements.

The council heard an update

from Mayor Nikolauk concerning the landfill and engineers studies relating to property acquisition for a new landfill. Grant Administrator, Kay Howard then updated the council on the status of the City's grant to upgrade the wastewater treatment plant.

Bill Sudduth met with the council and requested modifications to City Ordinance #106-91. That ordinance prohibits livestock within the city limits of Eldorado. Sudduth asked that the ordinance be changed to allow 4-H and FFA project animals to be penned within the city, under the supervision of an Ag teacher or County Agent. The council discussed his proposal but no action was taken.

The council then went into a brief executive session to discuss personnel matters and returned from executive session, taking no action before adjourning at 8:00 pm.

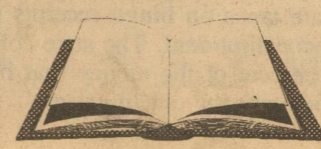

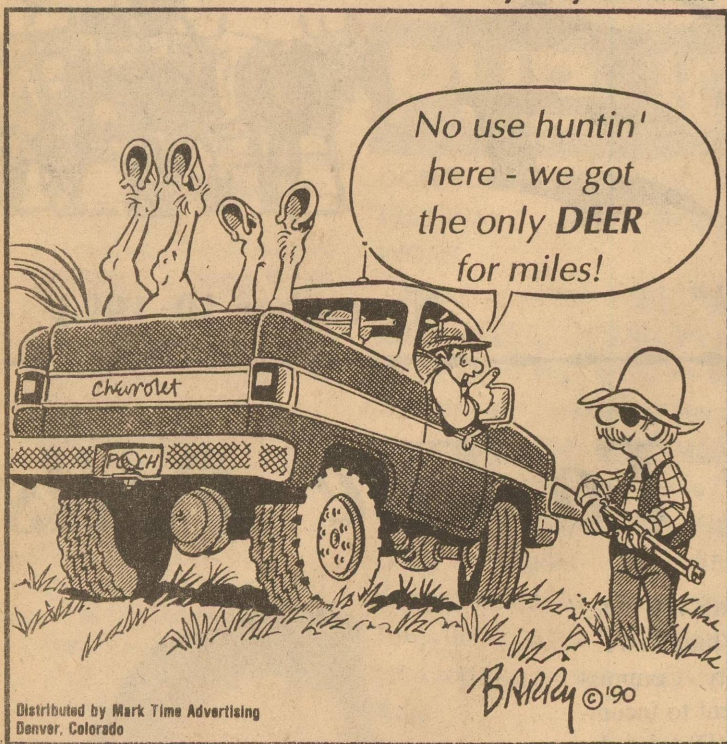

AUSTIN — Texas faces a multibillion dollar budget shortfall in the next biennium, but state House and Senate leaders say there are ways to deal with the projected deficit without slapping citizens with new taxes to cover it.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman John Montford, D-Lubbock, said, "There's a lot of wailing and gnashing of the teeth. There always is. But I think this discipline is important. We simply must contain our growth and live within our means."

In a report by The Associated Press, Montford estimated a \$2.7 billion gap between projected spending growth and new money available in the 1996-97 biennium and stipulated that the gap estimate does not include the cost of juvenile justice reforms — if implemented. He said about \$4 billion in new revenue will be available, but the projected need for spending increases is about \$6.7 billion.

House Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert Junell estimated the budget deficit would be even higher — \$3.5 billion. Junell, D-San Angelo, like Montford, thinks the Legislature can ratchet down on spending to avoid a tax increase. "We did it last session. We'll do it again this session," he said.

Federally mandated state spending may force some programs, such as higher education, to be cut, Junell added.

House Speaker Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, while agreeing that the state can make a budget without raising taxes, also said, "There will have to be sacrifices somewhere."

Counties to Get FEMA Help

Fourteen flood-stricken counties in Southeast Texas will be eligible for financial assistance totaling about \$9 million from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

FEMA funds will be used to repair sewer lines, roads and buildings and will help local government agencies with overtime charges for emergency response crews, said FEMA director James Lee Witt last week.

The 14 counties are Fayette, Grimes, Harris, Jackson, Lavaca, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Trinity, Walker, Waller and Wharton.

FEMA is still working on damage estimates in 23 other counties that Gov. Ann Richards requested

to be eligible for individual assistance.

FEMA funds are critical so local taxpayers will not be overwhelmed, Ed Schaefer, assistant coordinator for operations for the Texas Division of Emergency Management, told the *Houston Chronicle*.

Flood victims still have until Nov. 15 to apply for food stamps under special procedures set up to address their immediate needs, according to a report in the *Chronicle*.

Inmates Work on Flood Relief

Inmates from at least six state prison units worked on flood relief in the recent Southeast Texas floods, doing everything from searching for drowning victims to doing laundry for a local hospital to filling sand bags.

Some 30 to 40 inmates are still on the job and expected to work another week in cleaning up debris in Montgomery County, according to Glen Castlebury, director of communications for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

"As is routine with the prison system, we offered this help to local authorities when the rains started.

"We use volunteer inmates with good records; we provide heavy security during the operations and we never charge the local authorities or public for the manpower or equipment," Castlebury said.

High Turnout Expected

Texans do care who the next governor will be, according to projections by Secretary of State Ron Kirk.

He said 55 percent of registered voters are expected to make it to the polls, which would be the highest voter turnout in a gubernatorial election since 1974, when the term of office was increased to four years.

Spokesmen for Democratic Gov. Ann Richards and her Republican opponent George W. Bush both said a high voter turnout is positive news.

Last week, it looked like anybody's win, with Bush and Richards locked in a statistical dead heat.

Other Highlights

State Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, said last week he will sponsor a proposal for "first-class, first-rate" casino gambling in 1995. He said he wants to give voters the chance to decide in a statewide election whether they favor casino gambling.

The Texas Automobile Dealers Association is warning consumers that a large number of flood-damaged cars and trucks will soon enter the used vehicle market because of the floods in Southeast Texas. "Although such vehicles may show few signs of vehicle damage, they may have serious problems even after they are cleaned," a spokesman said.

Texas has a constitutional right to tax gross bingo receipts, the 3rd Court of Appeals ruled last week. Two bingo operators filed a lawsuit in 1992 alleging that state taxes on bingo receipts were unconstitutional. The state collects 5 percent of the money that bingo operators pay out in prizes.

Well folks, the Eagles are in the Play-offs for the first time in a few years. Much credit will be given to Coach Doug Kuhlmann and his staff for the accomplishment and rightly so. Coaching high school athletics has to be one of the most challenging jobs around. But, especially so in a small town where coaches are faced with a limited number of athletes with which to build a team and an unlimited number of parents and fans who know just how it ought to be done.

But, the real story here are the young men who week in and week out strap on the pads and get the job done on the field. I've been around a few football teams in my time but I can't recall ever seeing so many leaders on one team. Of course, there are a lot of seniors on this team and seniors are usually the ones who rise to the occasion when something extra is called for.

Two young men who come quickly to mind are Reagan Bownds and Eric McGinnes. Bownds is quite simply the best running back I've seen in years. When I was playing, years ago, no...decades ago, there was a sensation from Haskell named Charlie Franklin. He was big and fast and made lots of defenders, including myself, look foolish, but even he, in his prime, couldn't hold a candle to Bownds. Reagan Bownds has savvy. He knows where he is on the field at all times and, he appears to know where everyone else is, too. Yet, he is a quiet, modest young man who never forgets his manners. He seems to shun the spotlight, preferring to "Do it on the field."

Eric McGinnes is an excellent Tight End and Defensive Lineman. He seems to have a knack for being in the right place at the right time, getting into the opposing quarterbacks face and totally disrupting things. He is also a fine clutch receiver. Yet, he also seems to possess a depth of character that is rare these days.

Don't get me wrong, I certainly don't intend to single these two out for praise. There are many others like Pepper Nix, Landon Neal, Cory Edmiston, David Wilson, Cody McCravery, Larry Sanchez, Travis Whitten, Will Edmiston, Shylowe

Middleton, Leon Fuentes, Jason Porter, Austin Hunter and Brian Jones. Each brings something to the team, and each contributes on the field. But, what I'm talking about is more than gaining yards or sacking a quarterback. What I'm referring to is leadership.

Early in the season, when Pepper Nix was injured and missed a few games, I watched him on the sidelines encouraging his teammates. Cheering them on when they did well...chewing them out when they didn't. Never doubting he'd heal in time to return and contribute. Pepper Nix is a leader.

Every week, Larry Sanchez quietly goes about his job of opening holes for Eagles runners, doing the "dirty work" on the line and getting little, if any, credit for his trouble. I have always believed that offensive linemen deserve much more praise than they get. Larry Sanchez is one of the unsung heroes who makes it easier for the running backs. Larry Sanchez is a leader.

David Wilson is another who "Proves it on the field." So are Will Edmiston and Travis Whitten. They are leaders, too.

Saturday night, the Eagles will travel to San Angelo to take on the Wall Hawks in Lakeview Stadium. The Eagles have beaten the Hawks already this year, 17-0 in Wall at their Homecoming. None of that matters this week, though. What matters is leadership.

When I was a small boy, I watched the upstart Dallas Cowboys as they tried year after year to dislodge the Green Bay Packers as NFL champs. I couldn't understand how a team with so many offensive weapons could come up short time and time again. Then, my old Granddad explained it to me, "Boy, Offense may win games, but Defense wins championships... and the cream always comes to the top."

Look for the Eagles' Defense to rise to the occasion against Wall this week, just as it has done all year. Having given up only 30 points the entire season, Defense is the reason Eldorado is in the play-offs. Defense...and the leadership of some fine, young men we can all be proud of.

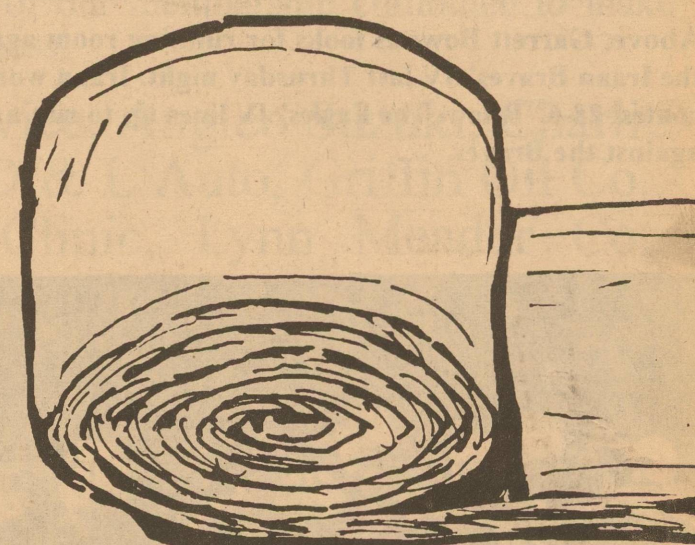
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Book Fair

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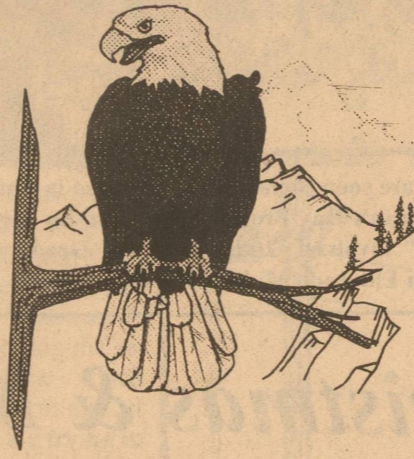

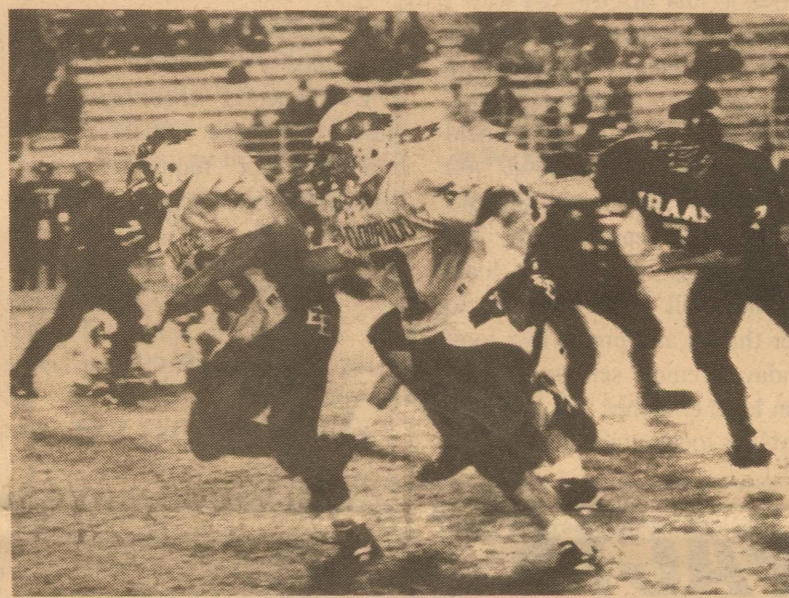

urday night.

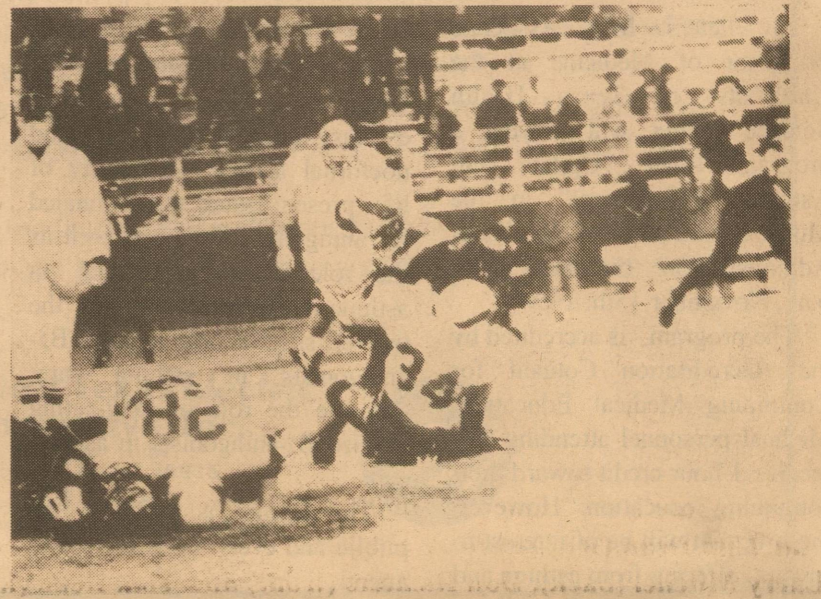

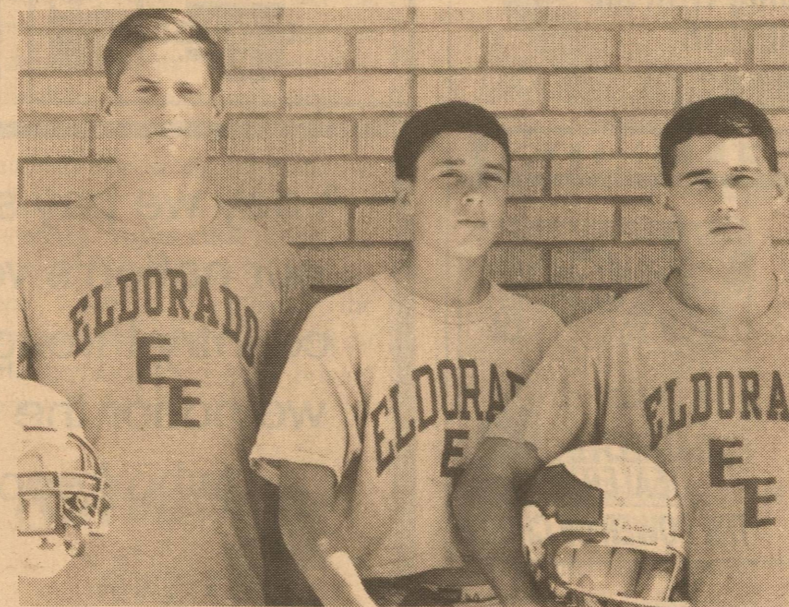
In the second half, Lance Mitchel carried the ball in for a score and Michael Mayo caught a two point conversion pass from Mitchel to close out the scoring.

Elizabeth Perkins) and Betty (Rosie O'Donnell) are their devoted yet ditzzy wives. The story revolves around an evil entrepreneur, Cliff Vandercave (Kyle Maclachalan) and his accomplice, the slinky Miss Stone (Hallie Berry) and their rotten scheme to steal a fortune. They need a stooge to take the fall and who better than Fred?

It was a fun-filled review for all ages, featuring good music, songs and comedians. The food was good, too.

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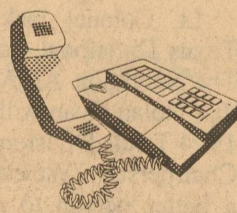

Property Rights Petition

According to Kathleen St. Clair, a Property Rights petition is available for signing at Eldorado Wool Company, First National Bank of Eldorado, The Eldorado Success and the Schleicher County Tax Appraisal District office.

The petition states "...the right to hold and enjoy private property is as fundamental to ordered liberty as any right enumerated in the United States and Texas Constitutions. the right to property is a civil right, no less than the rights to freedom of speech and worship, and the rights to due process and equal protection under the law...We the People recognize that certain legislative enactments and regulatory measures regarding environmental, water quality and use, public and private land use, food safety, animal welfare and other related issues will continue to burden the agriculture industry...these issues affect the property rights of producers and have the potential of undermining the ability of producers to realize a livelihood...We the People will actively oppose any legislative or regulatory action dealing with property rights that adversely impacts agricultural production and actively oppose the governments' relentless assault on the guaranteed rights of private property owners."


Salvation Army Names Ryan



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

Chief Buthelezi's hold over the Zulu nation. It seems that King Zwelethini will end up as titular monarch of the township Zulus only--less than a quarter of the nation [Zwelethini had been persuaded somehow to support the overthrow of Buthelezi in favor of a cousin who is Communist-backed].

By crying for his mother at a meeting, Zwelethini behaved in a manner unsuited to a king. More disturbing is the massacre in which unarmed Zulus were gunned down from ANC headquarters [Mandela's Communist-backed political party] in Johannesburg. It is only a matter of time before Buthelezi leaves a government that acts openly against its own people.

UNITA members who reluctantly accepted Mandela's peace settlement may be watching Buthelezi's struggle to maintain his U.S.-friendly influence over his nearly nine-million Zulus. The Communist-backed rivals have launched a shrewdly orchestrated propaganda campaign against Buthelezi and have succeeded in shaking the confidence of many Buthelezi followers.

COMING OFF HOLLAND'S HIGH

The enlightened glow is fading on Holland's liberalized drug law experiment. Holland now has over 20,000 registered heroin addicts which is five times greater proportionally than Britain has.

The 300+ coffee shops (the number has doubled in ten years and they have names like "The Green House" and "No Problem") attract flocks of teenage tourists where they can order marijuana from the menu and roll their own at their booth.

Police departments are being cor-

rupted by powerful drug dealers who wish to violate the restrictions on imports. The cost of supporting the addicts in social programs and crime loss is growing.

Despite the fact that most of the citizen's have lost their "open-minded" view of decriminalization, they are now having trouble reversing the societal deterioration. The unanticipated dilemma: Competing with a wealthy and powerful "drug lobby".

KEEP IT A SECRET

The press have their heroes and their scapegoats. They LOVE Gore Vidal. Vidal had dinner with Hillary Clinton last week then the following day, he spoke at the National Press Club. During the speech, he chided the American press for being unfair to foreign countries.

He said that every time the American press does a story about another country's successes, they always have to add something about how the U.S. is better, because this or that reason. Vidal asked, why can't you ever write about how much better Sweden's health care is, etc.? [Now, what do you say, we secretly watch the press. Let's see if they begin telling us how much better other countries are than us.]

HILLARY AND SAM CRASH THE PARTY

If the Democrat National Convention is held in Chicago as planned in '96, do you know what the BIG switch will be for the First Lady and her husband's failed ambassador-nominee Sam Brown, Jr.? The difference is this time they'll be on the inside instead of the outside!

That's right in 1968 during the

violent and infamous Chicago Seven protests, Hillary was a member of the crowd that sought to "change" the Democrat Party. (US News 6-6-94) And Sam? Well, he recently lost the fight to be an ambassador to the CSCE (European security council) --he would have help decide how to "protect" 75 countries from Russian aggression.

Time's Margaret Carlson couldn't have been more outraged at the vindictive Republicans who blocked the nomination. In the June 6, 1994 issue she listed a few of the concerns that Brown's opposition had, "...dropping a requirement that Peace Corps volunteers be instructed in the menace of communism...[Brown acknowledges this and Carlson considered the instruction archaic anyway] and whether...he had thrown any objects...at the 1968 Democrat Convention" [he denies and Carlson claims he was inside the building].

The rest of Carlson's piece is oblivious to undisputed historical facts. Carlson's column decries Republicans stalling the nomination, thus causing the sale of Brown's home in Berkeley to be in limbo. [Is this not the silliest of superficial reasoning? We are to set aside concerns about world security when Brown's house is in the lurch?]

DASHING SAM

Here's how Newsweek described Clinton-nominee, Sam Brown Jr. on May 16, 1983: "led the Vietnam Moratorium march on Washington in 1969 and created a furor with his New Left reforms in [the Peace Corps]..." On March 30, 1978, in a Wall Street Journal article, "...The liberal---some would say radical---Mr. Brown... saw

how difficult it was to change a national policy... In an unheard of voluntary surrender of sovereignty, he's backed a plan to turn the Peace Corps... over to a new international development agency...

And in Jan, '79 shortly after taking over ACTION this front page article on Sam Brown said, "Mr. Brown confirms rumors that ACTION officials visited Cuba, too. He says they went there on vacation time. 'But', he says 'they went there on their own hook. I'm not too smart, but I'm not dumb enough to send an official party to Cuba'."

FOOTNOTE

In the 1968 primary campaign, Eugene McCarthy called Lyndon Johnson's questions about his patriotism, "McCarthyism". Just days ago, a tribute to Eugene McCarthy was broadcast by C-SPAN. The event was called the 25th Anniversary of the Vietnam Moratorium. As McCarthy was brought to the microphone, the man giving the introduction said: It was you and you alone who had the courage to stand up and fight the "Imperial Dragon". [Folks, he was talking about America.]

HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

To give a quick historical perspective to the above story here is what was happening in the world at the time Carter appointed Sam Brown to head the Peace Corps according to WJSJ news stories:

2700 Vietnamese refugees boarded a freighter off Hong Kong and threatened to jump overboard unless they were given sanctuary (the refugees were refused sanctuary).

And this article, "Ever since April when Afghanistan's Russian-trained armed forces brought to power the Afghanistan People's Democratic Party, the country's leaders have staunchly denied that they are Communists or that they are under Mos-

cow's thumb...' Are you Communist or not? Marxist-Leninist or not?' the foreign minister says, mimicking this reporter's questions. Such questions, he says calmly, are a medieval style of inquisition into the ideas of the people." The front-page story says, as Foreign Minister Amin spoke, the reporter lifted his eyes to the photo hanging behind the man---it was Fidel Castro.

FOOTNOTE

Two weeks ago, CNN did a five-minute story on today's Communist Party USA, calling it a benign organization. As the reporter stood in the headquarters and spoke, on the wall behind her, hung a picture of Fidel Castro.

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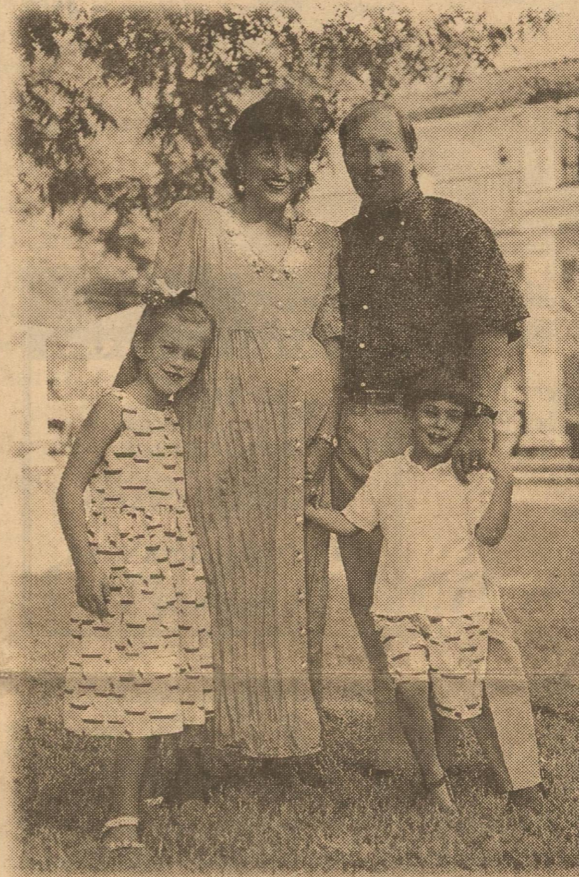

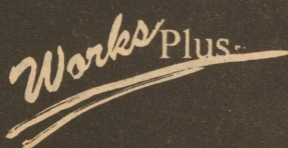

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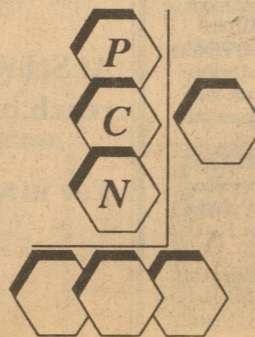
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
