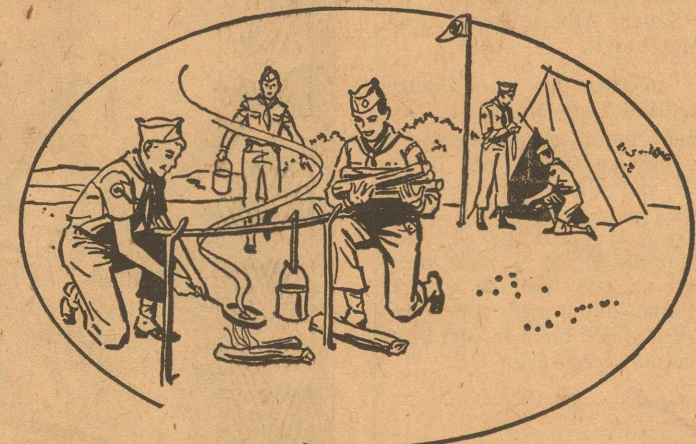

## Gas Plant Completed

CRA, Inc., has completed construction of two cryogenic-type gas processing plants in southwest Texas and both are now operating.

The 30-million-cubic-foot-per-day "grass roots" facility built near Eldorado also included the construction of 100 miles of gas gathering lines, according to Ken Harland, director, Gas Plant Operations.

A similar cryogenic plant was installed at CRA's gas products plant in Mertzon.

Each of the plants, when operating as designed capacity, will recover some 120,000 gallons per day of liquefied petroleum products.

"These two new cryogenic plants will provide a 30% increase in CRA's LP-gas supply, a big step toward becoming basic in propane and other natural gas liquids," said Harland.

Eldorado is about 45 miles south of San Angelo and Mertzon is located about 40 miles southwest of San Angelo.

CRA operates refineries at Coffeyville and Phillipsburg, Kan., and Scottsbluff, Nebr.; as well as gas products plants at Gillette, Wyo.; Lamont, Okla., and Quitman, Tex. (CRA, the refining subsidiary of Farmland Industries, Inc., is headquartered in Kansas City, Mo.)

Farmland is a manufacturing and wholesaling farm supply cooperative and serves 2,231 local associations in 15 Midwest and Southwest states.

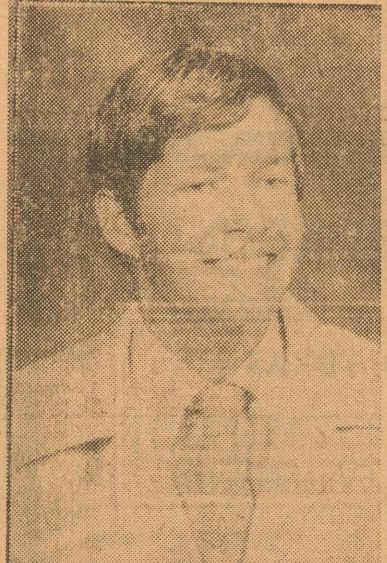

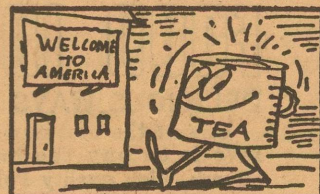

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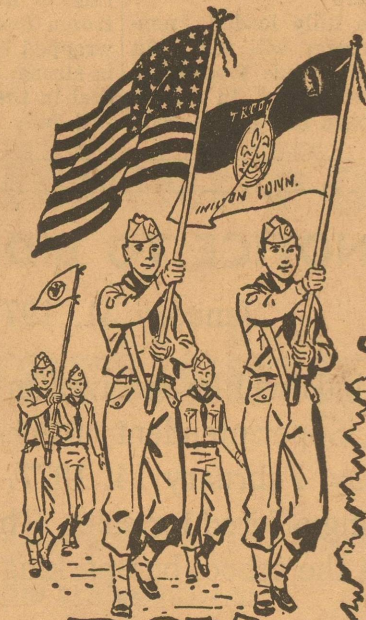

Is The Subject of Nancy Lester's H. D. Column

**Council To Hold Meeting**  
The Home Demonstration Club Council will meet Thursday, Feb. 3, at the Country Store in the Reynolds Community at 1:30 p.m. At this time we will elect delegates to the District meeting which will be held in Coleman on March 15.  
Geneva Wade, Patsy Kellogg and I will be going to Sweetwater on February 8 to attend the District Home Demonstration Association planning meeting for this area. Geneva is our county T. H. D. A. chairman. Patsy is our county home demonstration council chairman.  
One problem that people face throughout the year is "What to do when your home freezer stops?" I thought you might like some information on this.  
**Refreezing Food**  
You may safely refreeze foods that have thawed if they still contain ice crystals or if they are still cold—about 40 F.—and have been held no longer than 1 or 2 days at refrigeration temperature after thawing. In general, if a food is safe to eat, it is safe to refreeze. If the odor or color of any food is poor or questionable, dispose of it. The food may be dangerous.  
Foods that have been frozen and thawed require the same care as foods that have not been frozen.  
**Meat, Poultry & Fish.** Meat, including ground meat and poultry, that has any off-odor or off-color should not be refrozen and should not be eaten.  
**Shellfish, Vegetables, Cooked Foods.** Bacteria multiply rapidly in shellfish, vegetables and cooked foods and often spoilage in these foods cannot be detected by odor. Do not refreeze any of these foods when they have completely thawed. If ice crystals are still in the food, refreeze immediately. Even partial thawing and refreezing reduces the eating quality of these foods. If the condition of these foods is questionable, dispose of them.  
**Ice Cream:** Thawed ice cream should not be refrozen.  
**Fruits:** Fruits usually ferment when they start to spoil. A little fermentation will not make fruits dangerous to eat, but it may spoil their flavor. You can refreeze thawed fruits if they still taste and smell good. Or you can use them in cooking and baking or for making jams, jellies and prepared foods.  
**Emergency Care**  
Generally, a fully loaded, non-functioning freezer will stay cold enough to keep foods frozen for two days if not opened. In a freezer with less than half a load, food will remain frozen for about one day.  
If power fails or the freezer stops due to mechanical failure, keep the freezer closed except when adding dry ice. If normal operation cannot be resumed before the foods start to thaw, use dry ice or more foods to a locker plant.  
Dry Ice. If dry ice is placed in the freezer soon after the power goes off, 25 pounds should keep the temperature below freezing for 2 or 3 days in a 10-cubic-foot cabinet with half a load; 3 to 4 days in a loaded cabinet.  
Place the dry ice on cardboard or small boards on top of packages and do not open freezer again except to put in more dry ice or to remove it when normal operation is resumed.  
**Locker Plant.** If it is necessary to move food to a locker plant, use insulated boxes, blankets or thick layers of paper to prevent thawing. Food which has been moved to the locker plant should be chilled to 0 F. before moving again after your food freezer is operating normally.  
**Refreeze Food Quickly.** Clean your freezer before refilling. Freeze thawed foods quickly. Use refrozen foods as soon as possible.  
To refreeze food at home, turn the adjustable temperature control if your freezer has one, to its coldest position. When the current comes on again, the freezer will run continuously and food will refreeze quicker. Place the warmer packages against the refrigerated surface if possible, but place them so air will circulate around them.  
After the food is well frozen, turn the temperature control to its usual setting. If the freezer is too full, move some of the colder packages to the refrigerator, and return them gradually to the freezer.  
**When The Odor Remains**  
If the food spoils in the freezer, stubborn odors may result. Wash the interior surface of the freezer with soda water, using 1 teaspoon baking soda to a quart of warm water. If the odor persists try vinegar using 1 cup vinegar to a gallon water.  
If neither of these suggestions work, don't give up. Try using an electric fan for several hours to circulate air inside the freezer. Place a pan of activated charcoal into the freezer overnight to absorb odors. Then try another washing of the interior with soda water.  
If traces of the odor still remain, this is not likely to affect the frozen foods which are securely wrapped in the freezer. If the odor is strong, sometimes leaving charcoal in the freezer for a long time will help.

Chopped parsley  
Drain sauerkraut. Pour boiling water over sauerkraut and drain. In saucpan cook onion in butter until tender. Add flour and cook, stirring constantly, until bubbling and smooth. Remove from heat and stir in broth and sauerkraut juice. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and smooth. Stir in sour cream and caraway seeds. Arrange ham and sauerkraut mixture in 1 1/2-quart shallow baking dish. Cover and bake in 350°F oven about 45 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Garnish with parsley. Makes 8 servings.

2 cans (1 pound each) yams or sweet potatoes

4 tablespoons melted butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons sherry  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1 can (4 ounces) sliced mushrooms, undrained  
1/2 cup quartered stuffed olives  
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup  
2 cups cubed ham  
Drain yams and whip with nutmeg, allspice, salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter and sherry. Use to line a 9-inch pie plate building up edges about 1/2-inch on sides. In saucpan, cook onion in remaining butter until tender. Stir in remaining ingredients; heat, stirring occasionally. Spoon into prepared pie plate. Bake at 350°F for 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Men are to have short hair. Women's hair is her covering, men if you have long hair you dishonoreth your head as in I Cor. 11-4. The word says also I Cor. 11-14. Doth not even nature itself teach you, that if a man have long hair, it is a shame unto him. Sometimes we hear men say I sure need a hair cut. That is nature talking to him which is controlled by the

Lord. I Cor. 11-16. But if any man seem to be contentious, we have no such custom, neither the churches of God.

Notice contentious meaning quarrelsome.

The Churches of God has a plan that has been on the Rock Jesus. Long hair for women, short hair for men.

It will serve us well read again the command given in Deuteronomy 22:5. The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, neither shall a man put on a woman's garment; for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God. All these things tell us it is wrong for women to appear masculine, and that it is equally wrong for men to appear effeminate. In the New Testament the sin of being effeminate is named as one of the sins that will prevent men from inheriting the kingdom of God. I Cor. 6-9-10.

Paul preached it and we are to preach it and live it. After reading the Word of God how can a man say the outward don't count?

Austin, Texas.—Atty. Gen. John Hill is setting up a new unit to investigate white-collar crime which costs Texans an estimated \$840 million a year.

Hill will rely on the Deceptive Trade Practices Act, the State Securities Act and other laws to crack down on so-called "Corporate crime committed with a fountain pen."

Since Hill has only civil powers, he must cooperate with district attorneys and federal officials where criminal violations are suspected.

A unit director, three investigators and two attorneys will be financed by a \$235,000 federal grant extending over an 18-month period.

Investigations already under way include South Texas banking irregularities spotlighted by collapses of banks at Carrizo Springs and Rio Grande City, disappearance of a Wichita Falls grain dealer and possible misapplication of state funds by a state highway employee.

A three year old Chamber of Commerce study classifies as white collar crimes deceptive trade practices, embezzlement and pilferage, securities theft and fraud, receiving stolen property, bribery, pay-offs, kickbacks and various other forms of fraud.

### Attorneys Dominate

As in most other states and Congress, lawyers dominate other professional groups in the Texas legislature.

Of the 150 House members, 38% are attorneys.

And 21 of 31 Senate places are now held by lawyers.

The House includes 30 businessmen, 11 ranchers and farmers, 15 insurance or real estate men, six school teachers, three homemakers and six who classify themselves as full-time professional legislators.

The Senate includes three insurance men, a housewife and five in business fields.

Speaker Bill Clayton is a farmer and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby is a newspaper and television executive.

### Two Named To Committee Posts

Austin, Tex.—Rep. James Nugent of Kerrville and Rep. Jimmy Mankins of Austin have been named to the Transportation Committee of National Conference of State Legislatures by House Speaker Bill Clayton.

Clayton said the two representatives were named to the task force because of their interest and involvement in the national policies considered by this committee. Nugent is Chairman of the House Committee on Transportation and Mankins serves as the Vice Chairman of the Committee. Nugent also served on the Transportation task force last year.
