



On March 10th, the Interstate Commerce Commission issued an order authorizing Santa Fe to abandon their 65 miles of line between San Angelo and Sonora.

This culminates several years of efforts by Santa Fe. Their last train went over the tracks on Ap-

Future plans call for the rails and crossties to be removed and the right of way will be disposed

The 65 miles of line were laid by Santa Fe back in the late 1920's at a cost of three million dollars. The firm planned originally for the line to be extended on south to Del Rio, making for a through line for trains, but the effort died as the Great Depression ject that involved the line was set in in the early 1930's.

On July 1st, 1930, an excursion train was run with much fanfare Motorcycle Safety from San Angelo over the newly-completed line and a number of people living here still remember riding it. When the train stopped here, some small bottles of crude oil from the new Whitten well were distributed as souvenirs.

In subsequent years, groups of local school children, in the elementary grades, occasionally rode the train south to Sonora where they boarded buses for the trip back. This called for special ar-

### Awareness Week Is Announced

Austin, Tex.-Road compatability between motorcycles and larger vehicles is an absolute must, reports Governor Dolph Briscoe. "In times of the need for more economical travel and an expanding transportation picture, we are finding an increased number of motorrangements and has not been done cycles on our streets and highways. With this increase comes an increase of the possibility of traffic accidents. We must, as drivers of cars or trucks, be totally aware of the motorcyclist as a part of the overall traffic flow.

"In 1975, 205 motorcyclists were killed. During 1976, 192 were killed. While this is a slight reduction, the number of motorcycle registrations has begun to increase. Preliminary sales reports from dealers and statistics in Texas reveal a significant increase in the two-

wheelers registered. "Frequently at the accident site of a car-motorcycle crash, the automobile driver says he simply failed to see the motorcycle. This can best be remedied by careful observation and awareness of motorcyclists on rural roads, freeways and street intersections. We must recognize that motorcycling is an economical mode of transportation and a ple-surable ride for many. I ask simply that we increase our awareness of the traffic flow and the mixture of large vehicles and motorcycles in order to reduce the accident toll. Texans are known for cooperation and it is time to cooperate with all motorists that share our roadways," concluded

Governor Briscoe declared, by official proclamation, the week of May 1-7 as "Motorcycle Safety Awareness Week" in Texas. mass media effort is supporting the proclamation.

Dear Miss Bowman: How can I make the actual move into my new home easier? Ms. G. P., Atlanta, Georgia.

Answer: Here are a few tips for making the job easier. Be sure the house is ready before the van arrives. It's much easier to clean an empty house than a full one. Decide ahead of time where you want the furniture to be placed. Make sure boxes are pushed into corners of the appropriate rooms; keep them out of the doorways. One last tip, set up your cooking and eating area early, but leave permanent shelf arrangements for a more leisurely

Dear Miss Bowman: Are Americans really the most mobile people in the world? Mr. T. H., Providence, Rhode Island

Answer: Citizens of the United States, Canada and Australia average 12 moves in a lifetime, making them the most mobile nationalities. This mobility rate compares with an average of eight moves in a lifetime for a Briton, seven for a Japanese citizen, six for a resident of Taiwan and three or four for a person living in Ireland. Although the level of industrialization and urban development in a nation is be-lieved to contribute to the degree of geographic mobility, Census Bureau researchers offer three additional reasons for the high mobility rates in the United States, Canada and Australia. All three countries are nations of immigrants, and people who have moved once find it easier to move again. Each of the three nations also had a frontier. Their governments developed programs to en-courage settlement and thus created waves of internal movement. Now each country has widely scattered urban centers that compete for industry, migrants and national pre-eminence.



HITTING THE MARK

Robin Hood and his Merry Men of Sherwood Forest have always been considered top archers. But their descendants nowadays are defeated in most bow and arrow contests by a group of Scottish bowmen.



These are one of Scotland's most prestigious groups-the Royal Company of Archers. Their dark green uniform was designed by Sir Walter Scott, one of the first Archers, and they wear a bonnet with an eagle's feather and carry bows

six feet long.
The Royal Company of Archers is the Queen's Bodyguard in Scotland. When Elizabeth II visits they parade and take ceremonial duties, especially when she is in residence at her Palace of Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh.

The Royal Company take their archery seriously and hold many competitions. Every year they meet the Sherwood Foresters (who claim descent from Robin Hood) in a contest. Far be it from Teacher's Scotch Information Centre to boast, but the Scottish archers usually win.
