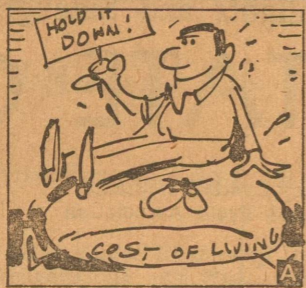
According to the United States Department of Agriculture, an American family with 2 children between the ages of six and eleven spent, on the average, over \$60 on food alone, every week. The same sort of family back in 1965 spent only \$34. Altogether, the Department of Labor Statistics reports, the average suburban American family of four spends over \$18,000 a year.

Fortunately, there are some things you can do to overcome the rising cost of living.

To save on fuel bills, cover your exposed water heater tank. You can use insulation, a glossy paint or wrap it with aluminum foil.

When buying an appliance, make sure you're getting your money's worth. Look for easy-to-read controls and smooth edges and corners.

One thing many people are doing to fight inflation is protesting against common situs picketing. This means that each union working on a construction site could keep all the others from working when just that one felt it had to strike. 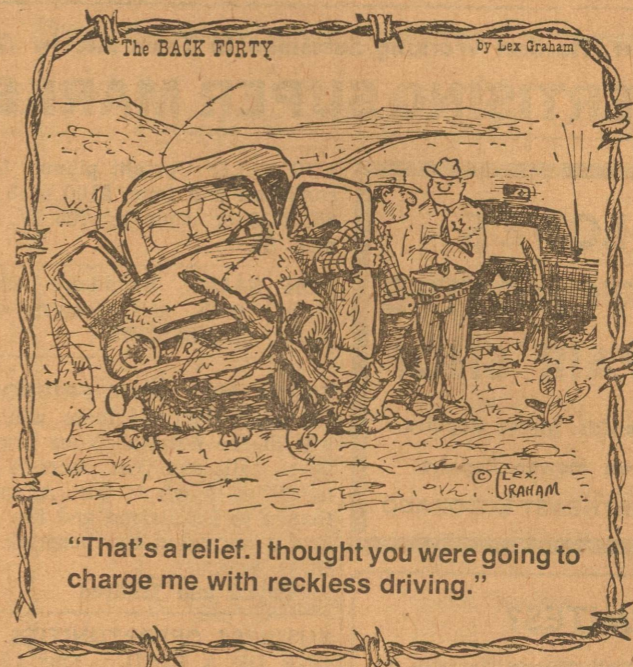

Foods An Event At State Arts & Crafts Fair

Kerrville, Tex.—The Texas State Arts and Crafts Fair, May 28-29-30 in Kerrville, is nationally known for quality arts and crafts. But recently, the foods served during the Fair have become an outstanding attraction. Set in the atmosphere of an old fashioned country fair, much of the food recalls the aromas and tastes of an earlier Texas.

German sausage on a stick and beef jerky are featured. Then, in the next booth, ice cream freezers turn out old receipt treats. Fair visitors who feast on catfish, hush puppies and fried chicken may have Hill Country peaches with cream for dessert. Mexican foods include tacos, fajitas, chili con queso and chalupas. Traditional fair treats of hamburgers, hot dogs and popcorn are served with plenty of ice cold drinks. Sweets are everywhere, too, with homemade cakes and baked-on-the-grounds donuts.

Adequate shade areas are provided for visitors to sit and eat, either in the covered dining area or on hay bales set under ancient oak trees. 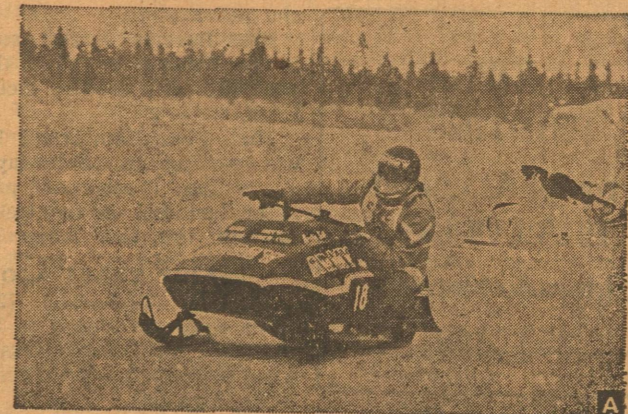

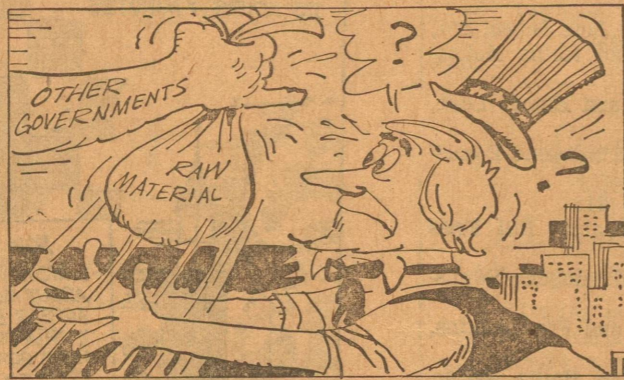

WE LIVE IN A NEW WORLD



THE ALARMING TREND of governments of other countries to take over raw materials is worldwide.

The United States is—or is rapidly becoming—a haven nation for a growing list of basic materials absolutely essential to our way of life. It is time to say, "Wake up, America!"

Past generations of Americans were led to believe that the United States was the richest and most powerful nation in the world, in part because of the abundance of its natural resources—resources so cheap in fact that the nation wasted many of them. And even now the public is encouraged to believe that the U.S. can become self-sufficient in almost anything.

Two or three decades ago there may have been some justification for this attitude, but certainly not today.

Although the U.S. never had all the raw materials needed by a great modern industrial society, it did have complementary raw materials readily accessible in other friendly countries throughout the world. In many cases these foreign deposits were found and developed by American ingenuity, capitalistic know-how and risk-taking investment capital in countries that welcomed companies from the United States with open arms.

But now things are different. Things have changed. We live in a new world.

For example, in the last 20 years imports of non-fuel natural resources have increased to over 37 percent of domestic consumption requirements.

The United States, which used to be completely self-sufficient in oil, now imports more than 40 percent of its needs and the import volume is rising at a horrendous rate. And look at aluminum—

economic freedom they will eventually have no other freedoms.

As believers and defenders of freedom in this Bicentennial year we should speak up in defense of our free enterprise system and explain why it works in the best interest of everyone.

We must communicate the idea that profits are needed as part of the wealth creation process upon which capital formation and our future growth depend. We believe that those concerned should have an opportunity to share in the profits. But not all of the profits can be redistributed. Some must be saved and reinvested to create more productive capacity and more jobs for the future.

Tax reform is absolutely essential to encourage the savings needed to make possible the capital formation required for future growth. This is not the place to attempt to outline all the changes needed in the crazy-quilt-work of local, state and federal tax structures which has been patched together over the past 200 years. But one reform is obviously in the best interests of all. This is to eliminate the unfair double taxation of corporate dividends. How many of America's 30 million stockholders have written to their Congressmen on this subject?

We can build a better world in which all of the people—including the majority now living at a mere survival level—can enjoy a better way of life. Let's all resolve to speak up and fight for the opportunity to make it happen!

PROTECTING YOUR HEART

A Guide To Sensible Eating

Entertaining can pose problems to people on a modified fat diet. This type of diet involves reducing one's intake of cholesterol and saturated fat. Many questions arise as to which foods to serve.

I'm having an open house and am looking for low cholesterol hors d'oeuvres and canapes. What can I serve?

How about a platter of fruit kebabs? Thread fresh fruit on skewers in interesting combinations—orange segments and banana slices, peaches and grapes, strawberries and melon balls. Dip the kebabs into an orange shell filled with yogurt, orange marmalade and a dash of curry powder. Try open faced sandwiches. Spread rye thins with a savory mixture of corn oil margarine, minced garlic and toasted sesame seed. Top with a slice of turkey or chicken. Bite-sized mushroom caps can be stuffed with a piquant mixture of cottage cheese, 100% corn oil margarine, chopped parsley, onion and thyme.

I like to serve beef to my guests. Is there any way to lower the fat content of meat?

The saturated fat content of meat dishes can be lowered to some extent by following these rules. Select lean cuts of meat and always trim off all visible fat. Roast and broil meats on a rack so meat won't sit in drippings. Chill drippings by adding ice cubes before making gravy. Fat will harden and can thus be removed. Do the same with braised meats (soup, stew, pot roast). If fat is needed for gravy, use Fleischmann's Corn Oil Margarine. It is low in saturated fat, high in



polyunsaturates, but has no cholesterol.

What about holiday meals?

A lean lamb roast would be a nice choice (lean shoulder for Passover, rack or leg for Easter). Prepare lamb in the same manner as the beef roast described above. Serve with parsleyed new potatoes and dilled carrots. Summertime holidays like Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day often call for a picnic. Try Crusty Herbed Chicken. Dip chicken pieces in melted corn oil margarine and then into a savory crumb mixture. Bake until golden. It's delicious hot or cold. Turkey is traditional for Thanksgiving and Christmas. There is very little change in the cooking method for poultry. Simply bake the stuffing separately. A lot of the poultry fat is trapped by the dressing when it is in the bird. Moisten the stuffing with chicken bouillon. Fill the turkey cavity with carrots, onions and celery to add flavor.

Any other advice?

To be the best host or hostess, really care about your guests. Don't push food and drink. There are healthier ways of welcoming people to your home. Provide a tasty buffet where guests can help themselves. Your guests will find that sensible eating can be delicious.
