Nelson Wolff Makes His Congress Announcement

Nelson Wolff said today he will formally announce his candidacy for the U. S. Congress from the 21st district of Texas on August 25th. Wolff will host receptions and press conferences in four cities in the district: San Antonio, Del Rio, Fort Stockton and San Angelo.

The day's activities will begin with a coffee and doughnut reception at the San Antonio Travelodge at Courthouse Square, 100 Villita, at 8:30 a.m. The reception will be followed by a press conference at 9:00 a.m.

Wolff will then fly to Del Rio where a reception/press conference will be held in the Ground School Room at the airport at 11:30 a.m. A similar airport reception/press conference will be held in Fort Stockton at 2:30 p.m. in the CAB room. This time has been changed from the earlier announced time of 3:00 p.m.

The final event of the day will be a reception at the Saint Angelus Room of the Central National Bank in San Angelo at 4:30 p.m.

The public and press are cordially invited to attend each event.

Consumer Food News

College Station, Tex.—Home freezer "shut down" does not always mean total loss, says Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist.

"In general, if a food is safe to eat, it is safe to refreeze," she points out.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Rule of thumb: Partially or completely thawed foods are safe to refreeze if they still contain ice crystals or if they are still cold—about 40 degrees F.—and have been held no longer than one or two days at refrigerator temperature after thawing.

Exception: Thawed ice cream should not be refrozen.

Warning: Get rid of foods that have poor—or questionable—odor or color. The food may be dangerous.

Do not eat or refreeze thawed ground meats, poultry or fish with off-odor or off-color.

Quality note: Even when partial thawing and refreezing is safe, it does reduce the eating quality of foods—particularly fruits, vegetables and prepared foods. The eating quality of red meats is reduced less than that of other foods.

Care guidelines: Foods that have been frozen and thawed require the same care as non-frozen foods. Also, use refrozen foods as soon as possible to save existing eating quality.

ELDORADO SUCCESS TO MERGE WITH EXPRESS-NEWS AT THE END OF AUGUST

Following some weeks of negotiations, the Eldorado Success is selling its assets to the 14-month-old Eldorado Express-News effective the end of August.

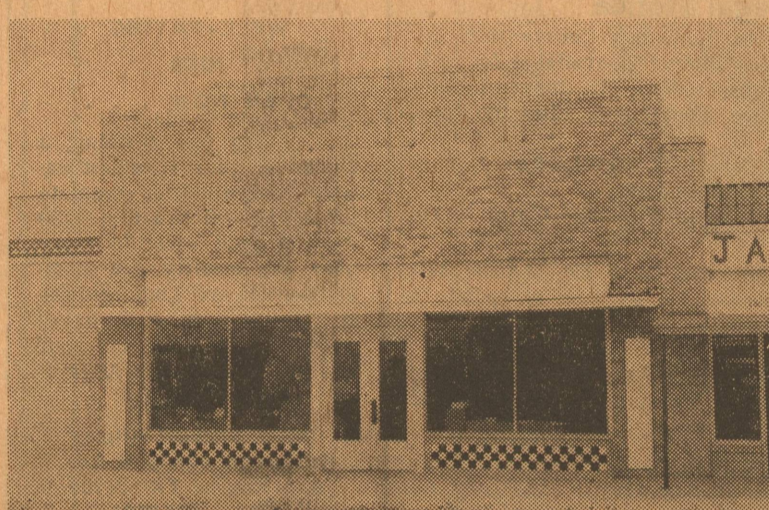
Fred Gunstead, publisher, and Bill Gunstead, editor, announced this week that terms had been agreed upon to sell the building on Main Street and the equipment in it to Ed Meador, who has been publisher of the Express News since it was started here on July 1, 1976. Lynn Meador is Executive Editor, and Jim McWilliams is Editor and Sales Manager. Bill Gunstead will serve on the staff of the combined newspaper as an Associate Editor,

and will continue to operate the job printing department in the time honored location.

The Meadors have announced plans to do renovating of the South Main Street building, and to add more equipment to complete conversion to offset of the merged papers. Each week's issue will still be taken to Big Spring each week for printing.

This week's Success issue has four pages, and the one for next week—Sept. 1st—will also be the same size and will be the final separate issue of the 76-year-old publication. It will be sent out with that week's Express-News issue.

49-Year-Old Building To Become Location Of Combined Newspaper For Schleicher County

Accounts for advertising in the four August issues, as well as any job printing done through August 31st, will be due and payable, and prompt payment will be appreciated.

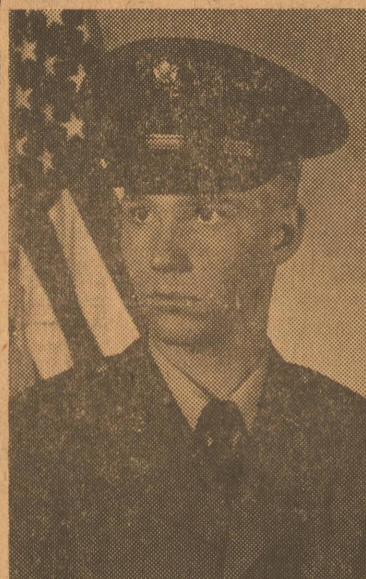
