Dolph Briscoe today easily slipped into his role as a leading cattleman c as he announced his support of a National Beef Referendum.



Cattlemen To Vote On Referendum

Cattlemen in Texas and through out the nation will soon have an opportunity to register and then vote on whether or not they want a new research and promotion program for the beef industry. Producers interested in voting on the reflerendum must first register during June 6-17 at their local ASCS offices. They will then be able to vote, also at the ASCS offices, between July 5-15.

At least 50% of the cattle owners who register must vote in order for the referendum to be valid, and two-thirds of those voting must vote affirmatively for the program to carry.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, along with the Extension Service in each of the other states, has been assisting with educational meetings on the upcoming referendum as it is charged with the educational responsibility to present facts about the proposed

-1/8 teaspoon pepper.

-1/2 teaspoon salt. —¼ cup water.

2. Separate eggs.

3. Add pepper to yolks and beat until thick and lemon-colored. and beat until stiff and shiny and

whites have peaks when beater is withdrawn. 5. Fold yolks carefully into the whites

6. Heat butter in omelet pan which is hot enough to sizzle a drop of water.

7. Pour in omelet mixture: level surfoce gently.

8. Cook slowly on top of range until puffy and lightly browned on bottom, about 5 minutes. Lift omelet at edge to judge color.

9. Bake 12 to 15 minutes in 325 degrees F. oven until knife inserted in center comes out clean. 10. To serve, score omelet down





Once you know what you can afford, how do you select a home? The most important consideration is location. Here are some things to ask yourself.

& Schools: Are they convenient? Is there transportation? Do they have a good reputation?

• Taxes: What are the current rates for property, school, sewer and other taxes?
Are they likely to go up?

• Zoning: Is the surround-ing area restricted to residential zoning? Are there plans to develop industry, roads or other facilities?

• Transportation: How long will it take to travel to work or shop? Is public transportation convenient? • Property values: How much have homes in the

area sold for in recent months? Are values going up or down? Overall: Is the area attractive? Have neighbors improved their homes? Is there excessive noise or air pol-

lution? A realtor can help you answer these questions. You might also want to contact the local zoning or planning board. But, do take the time. If you ask the important questions before you buy -






