**Governor Endorses Beef Referendum**

Austin, Tex.— Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe today easily slipped into his role as a leading cattleman as he announced his support of a National Beef Referendum.

"This self-help program for cattlemen is the most bold and far-reaching program in my memory and possibly in the history of the cattle industry. I plan to register and vote Yes in the upcoming Beef Referendum. Furthermore, I urge all cattlemen in Texas to inform themselves on the merits of this program, then register in June and Vote Yes in July."

Briscoe pointed out in a special capitol news conference that the national program would raise an estimated \$30-\$40 million annually for research, education and promotion of beef. The funds would come from cattle producers themselves and would be voluntary. He said that cattle producers should go to their local ASCS office to register between June 6 and June 16 and then go back between July 5 and July 15 to vote.

**County Extension Agent's Column**

**Cattlemen To Vote On Referendum**

Cattlemen in Texas and throughout the nation will soon have an opportunity to register and then vote on whether or not they want a new research and promotion program for the beef industry. Producers interested in voting on the referendum must first register during June 6-17 at their local ASCS offices. They will then be able to vote, also at the ASCS offices, between July 5-15.

At least 50% of the cattle owners who register must vote in order for the referendum to be valid, and two-thirds of those voting must vote affirmatively for the program to carry.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, along with the Extension Service in each of the other states, has been assisting with educational meetings on the upcoming referendum as it is charged with the educational responsibility to present facts about the proposed program.

**Farm Accident Survey Under Way**

A statewide farm accident survey in progress shows that farm machinery and recent winter weather have taken their toll. The survey involves some 300 volunteers who are collecting facts about accidents on a sample of 3,000 Texas farms and ranches. Early returns of accident descriptions indicate that 30% have involved slips and falls, with the majority involving falls on ice. Other falls included those from ladders and slips and falls on mud.

Another 30% of the reported accidents involved machinery, with tractors leading the list.

Other accidents involved the mishandling of animals, inadequate lifting of materials, and misuse of handtools, points out a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

**Post Planting Care Of Young Trees**

Summer is a critical period for recently planted shade and ornamental trees, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Water is the prime need since trees lose a great deal of moisture from the leaves and stems. Also, young, transplanted trees have a limited root system so they can only use water that is close by.

Trees should be watered regularly, once a week on sandy soil and 10 days to two weeks on clay or loam soil. The soil should be moist to 12 to 18 inches after watering.

**Give Your Coffee A Break**

Give your coffee a break. Replace it with more nutritious snacks and beverages throughout the day, a foods and nutrition specialist suggests.

Instead of a coffee break, have a snack break and try a glass of fruit juice, an orange, apple or other fruit in season, says Mrs. Sally Coble, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

These snacks are low in calories and high in nutrients. Fresh fruits also supply fiber—which most Americans need in larger amounts.

Also, milk and cheese foods make good snacks. A glass of skim milk supplies only 90 calories and is packed with nutrients. Cheese cubes with fresh fruit are good choices, too, she said.

Other ideas that may require a bit more preparation time are celery and carrot sticks, green pepper rings, cucumber slices and radishes. If calories are not a problem, other tasty items are nuts or peanut butter and crackers, Mrs. Coble added.

Finally, try drinking just a glass of plain cool water. This is refreshing and thirst-quenching with the least cost and calories.

This week I have some information for you on puffy omelets.

Aptly described as A Most Heavenly Bit of Air, a puffy omelet should be moist and with fine regular air cells throughout. The crust should be tender and light golden brown.

Overcooking or cooking at too high a temperature may cause a heavy, tough bottom crust or the omelet may fall and become tough and dry.

Pan requirements for a puffy omelet are the same as for a plain or French omelet. In addition, it should have a heat-proof or removable handle, since part of the cooking is done in the oven.

**How To Make a Puffy Omelet**

Equipment and ingredients:  
 —A seasoned 10-inch omelet pan or skillet with a heat-proof or removable handle.

- Two bowls.
- Rotary beater.
- Warm platter or plate.
- Four high quality Eggs.
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 1/4 cup water.

1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.
2. Separate eggs.
3. Add pepper to yolks and beat until thick and lemon-colored.
4. Add salt and water to whites and beat until stiff and shiny and whites have peaks when beater is withdrawn.
5. Fold yolks carefully into the whites.
6. Heat butter in omelet pan which is hot enough to sizzle a drop of water.
7. Pour in omelet mixture; level surface gently.
8. Cook slowly on top of range until puffy and lightly browned on bottom, about 5 minutes. Lift omelet at edge to judge color.
9. Bake 12 to 15 minutes in 325 degrees F. oven until knife inserted in center comes out clean.
10. To serve, score omelet down

the center with a spatula, fold in half and serve on warm plate or platter. Or, tear gently into pie-shaped pieces, using two forks. Serves two or three.

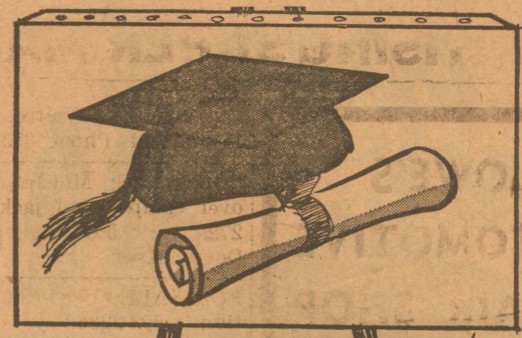

**STATE CAPITOL**

Austin, Tex.—The 65th legislature is winding down, with most of its major finance chores unfinished but with significant legislation clearing both houses at a fast clip.

As the last week of the session began, lawmakers had still to accept a conference committee's version of a \$15.4 billion 1978-79 state budget.

They also had yet to resolve differences between the House's \$700 million school finance bill and \$373 million teacher pay raise measure and the Senate's \$820 million wrap-up of both subjects.

Among issues on which both houses came to terms were the bill to bring Texas unemployment compensation laws in line with federal statutes. The measure also increases maximum unemployment benefits from \$63 to \$84 a week (with an escalator feature to cope with inflation.)

Its passage assures Texas employers of retaining \$600 million a year in federal unemployment program tax credits and retains \$60 million in administrative aid to Texas Employment Commission.

The legislature has also passed and sent to the governor a bill to grant Texas motorists an exemption from insurance and driver's license penalties for speeding violations in the 55-70 miles per hour category.

Major casualties of the legislative session may be bills dealing with property tax reform and the medical malpractice crisis.

A variety of law and order compromise bills are finding their way through the legislative maze to Gov. Dolph Briscoe's desk.

**Agencies Merged**

Merger of three major state water agencies has legislative approval.

The consolidation act (SB 1139) combines the Water Development Board, Water Rights Commission and Water Quality Board under a new three-member State Department of Water Resources.

The six-member Water Development Board, effective September 1, will exercise legislative functions of the merged department. An executive director will handle administrative functions.

A three-member Texas Water Commission will exercise judicial functions of the department.

Veteran Texas Water Quality Board Executive Director Hugh Yantis Jr. acknowledges an interest in heading the big new agency.

**Mrs. Rose Lyon Dies In Minnesota**

Fred Gunstead was notified Saturday that his sister, Mrs. Rose Lyon, had died Friday in a Minnesota hospital where she had been confined for some time. She was 76.

Funeral services were held Monday in Forest Lake, Minnesota, her former home with burial there. She was a member of the Methodist Church and Eastern Star.

Mrs. Lyon spent the winter here in Eldorado about 10 years ago visiting local relatives.

Her immediate survivors in addition to the brother, Fred Gunstead, are a number of nieces and nephews.

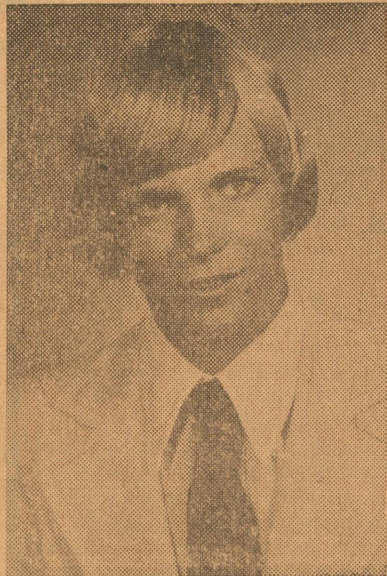

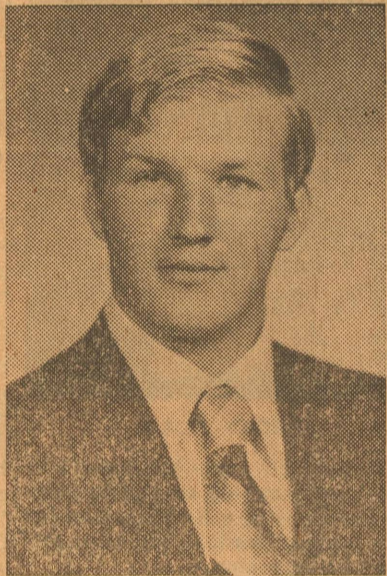

### For '77 Homebuyers--A Few Timely Tips

Spring is bringing good news for house hunters. Builders are starting more new homes than we've seen for some time. And there's plenty of mortgage money available.

In addition, interest rates on conventional mortgages continue their slight decline, now averaging 8.98% for new homes; 9% for existing ones.

And finally, as in previous years, homes continue to be a good investment -- rising in value at a pace comfortably ahead of the rate of inflation.

If you decide to take advantage of these facts to do some spring shopping, here's a tip worth considering before you begin: the well-known rule of thumb that you can generally afford a home two and a half times your income may no longer be accurate. With today's taxes, interest and mortgage costs; as well as increased deductions for social security, federal and local income taxes; and increased food and transportation costs, it might add up to a monthly payment that consumes too much of your salary.

Your best bet is to check with your local banker for help in calculating the monthly payments for homes whose prices are roughly twice your

annual income.

Once you know what you can afford, how do you select a home? The most important consideration is location. Here are some things to ask yourself.

• **Schools:** Are they convenient? Is there transportation? Do they have a good reputation?

• **Public Facilities:** Are parks, playgrounds and swimming pools nearby? Is there a fee to use them?

• **Taxes:** What are the current rates for property, school, sewer and other taxes? Are they likely to go up?

• **Zoning:** Is the surrounding area restricted to residential zoning? Are there plans to develop industry, roads or other facilities?

• **Transportation:** How long will it take to travel to work or shop? Is public transportation convenient?

• **Property values:** How much have homes in the area sold for in recent months? Are values going up or down?

• **Overall:** Is the area attractive? Have neighbors improved their homes? Is there excessive noise or air pollution?

A realtor can help you answer these questions. You might also want to contact the local zoning or planning board. But, do take the time. If you ask the important questions before you buy -- you won't be sorry later.
