The IRS has scheduled extra tel-ephone service all this week, too. Beginning Monday, April 11, thru Thursday, April 14, taxpayers will be able to call toll-free between 8:00 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. And on Friday, April 15, telephone assistance will be available between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. For toll-free tax assistance, dial 112-800-492-4830.



for a postage stamp? That price was paid at a 1970 auc-tion for the most valuable stamp in the world. Philately, stamp collecting,


is a popular hobby. It started in 1840 when the first postage stamp, a picture of Queen Victoria, was issued in Britain. Some stamps used today

are the same size as the original, 3/4 inch x 7/8 inch. Perforations, added in 1854, eliminated the need for scissors to ship the printed blocks apart.

Today, stamps are collected by category (geography or date) and topic (type of picture). While licking your way through your stamp album, try


Baked yeast rolls and bread freeze well. Use a recipe with a fairly large amount of fat and sugar. Prepare and bake as usual: cool; wrap in moisture-proof material; seal and freeze. Thaw frozen bread in the wrappings at room temperature.

Rolls are better if thawed and heated in a 250 to 300 F. oven for 15-20 minutes depending on size of rolis. Baked yeast breads lose quality gradually. Store up to 2 months.

Partially baked yeast breads are prepared as usual. Small rolls freeze best. Boke in a slow oven, 275 F., about 20 minutes. Cool quickly. Wrap and freeze. Thaw in wrappings 10-15 minutes. Bake in a hot oven, 425 F., for 5-10 minutes or until lightly browned. If the undercrust of the rolls is too moist, bake on a cooling rack instead of a baking sheet. Store 6-8 months.




