**Increased Cotton
Planting Seen**

DALLAS, April 8. (AP)—A 15 per cent increase in cotton planting was predicted this year by Sterling Evans, president of the Federal Land Bank, Houston, but he declared Texas farmers will never again plant the 17,000,000 acres once devoted to cotton. Diminishing fertility of the soil, influx of synthetic materials, and a smaller foreign market was given as some of the reasons for the cotton acreage decline. Evans told the annual meeting of the Texas Cooperative Ginners' Association here last night that increased cotton production in foreign countries will hurt the foreign cotton market. Cooperative gins were lauded by Evans and other speakers on the program. Kemper Bruton, Texas supervisor of National Cotton Council, Dallas, told the association that cotton growers must fight the threat of synthetic materials competition. A nation-wide cotton education program should begin with the farmers he said. The farmers shouldn't wear rayon shirts while growing cotton, he declared.

**Legislature Kills
Prohibition Effort**

AUSTIN, April 8. (AP)—A resolution to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in Texas was killed last night by a 13 to 3 vote of the House committee on constitutional amendments. Another legislative committee action saw the House revenue and taxation group kill a minor revenue bill in order to avoid the possibility that a major tax proposal might be tacked on as an amendment. In the Senate, the committee on privileges and elections recommended passage of an amended secret ballot bill which would seek to insure election secrecy and honesty by use of gummed-label ballot. The prohibition resolution went down to defeat after the committee heard its proponents argue that the legal sale of liquor is contributing to increased juvenile delinquency, more divorces, more murders, more alcoholism and more traffic deaths. Opponents used the same arguments against prohibition, using statistics which they claimed were a direct refutation of statements made by the drys. Supporting the measure, Dr.

Walter H. McKenzie of Dallas, head of the United Texas Drys, told the committee: "Having had fourteen years of prohibition (1919-33) and fourteen years of legal sale (of intoxicants) I think it's time we submitted it to the people to determine which way the liquor traffic can best be handled." He urged that regardless of the individual attitudes of committee members toward prohibition the constitutional amendment should be favorably reported to the House and then passed in order that the voters of Texas could cast a direct vote on the question. Asked by Rep. Sam Hanna of Dallas whether he had appeared before a House committee in 1935 to oppose putting repeal of prohibition to a vote of the people, Dr. McKenzie said, "yes." Two former members of the House, Emmett Morse and Homer Leonard, both of Austin, spoke against the measure. Morse, attorney for the Texas Wholesale Liquor Dealers Association, emphasized the revenue which Texas has received in the form of liquor taxes and licenses. He said the state had collected \$108,883,000 since 1935, with last year's revenue from this source nearly \$18,000,000. Youth centers — not prohibition — are answer to the question of solving juvenile delinquency, he said. Leonard, general counsel for the Texas brewers institute, noted that the great majority of illicit liquor stills seized in Texas are found in dry counties. Prohibition is not the answer to today's social problems because "human nature does not change," he said. Others who spoke in support of the amendment were Mrs. Claude De Van Watts of Austin, state president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Mrs. William Rascoe of Corpus Christi, spokesman for the WCTU group in her area; and Reps. Alford H. Flanagan of Talco, sponsor of the bill; M. K. Thomas of Canton and Sterling W. Williams of Snyder. Killed by the House committee on revenue and taxation was Rep. Isom P. Hydrick's bill to levy a 1-cent tax on each 10 cents of admission charge to hotel dine-and-dance rooms. "It might open up the omnibus tax bill," said Rep. Tom Martin of Fredericksburg, chairman of the subcommittee which reported the bill unfavorably. The committee favorably reported to the House a pool hall tax bill which would levy a permit license fee ranging from \$25 in towns under 5,000 population to \$200 in cities of more than 100,000. Each operator of a "public recreation room" would pay an additional \$20 levy for each pool or billiard table.

**More Cadets
Leave Corps**

COLLEGE STATION, April 8. (AP)—Five more cadets were removed from the Texas A&M college cadet corps yesterday after hearings before military panels. The hearings against senior members of the corps on charges of disobedience resumed yesterday after a recess over the Easter holidays. They were ordered after the majority of the senior cadets failed to heed verbal and written orders to appear before commandant Col. Guy S. Meloy, Jr., to explain a "no confidence vote" in two cadet officers and other matters. Eight other cadets were assessed lighter punishment and two found innocent. To date, 32 cadets have been dismissed from the corps, 50 have received lesser punishments and 18 have been absolved. A legislative hearing today in Austin is scheduled to air troubles of the cadet corps among other matters being looked into at the college. There was little outward notice of the controversy between students and the administration when classes resumed yesterday after the Easter holidays. Cadets dismissed from the cadet corps last week have moved into non-regulation dormitories and appeared on the campus in shirts and slacks, instead of smart military uniforms.

**House Group
To Start A&M
Probe Tonight**

AUSTIN, April 8. (AP)—A joint House Investigating Committee tonight begins a probe of Texas A&M College, torn by dissension for years. The chairman of the probing group has declared that he'll try to stop the investigation if it's determined that the dissension does not involve the legislature. The chairman, Sen. Fred (Red) Harris, Dallas lawyer, is a graduate of Baylor University and attended school when hazing—which college President Gib Gilchrist says is the root of the current unrest—was rife and rought at Baylor. Called before the committee tonight are eight A&M students. They are student and military cadet leaders whose organizations have made various charges against the college administration. Trouble at the college began in August of 1943 when President T. O. Walton resigned, giving as the reason ill health. In the same month, H. H. Williamson, director of the extension service, was dismissed after he refused to resign. A Senate committee investigated but did not make public its findings.

59th wedding anniversary next Friday.

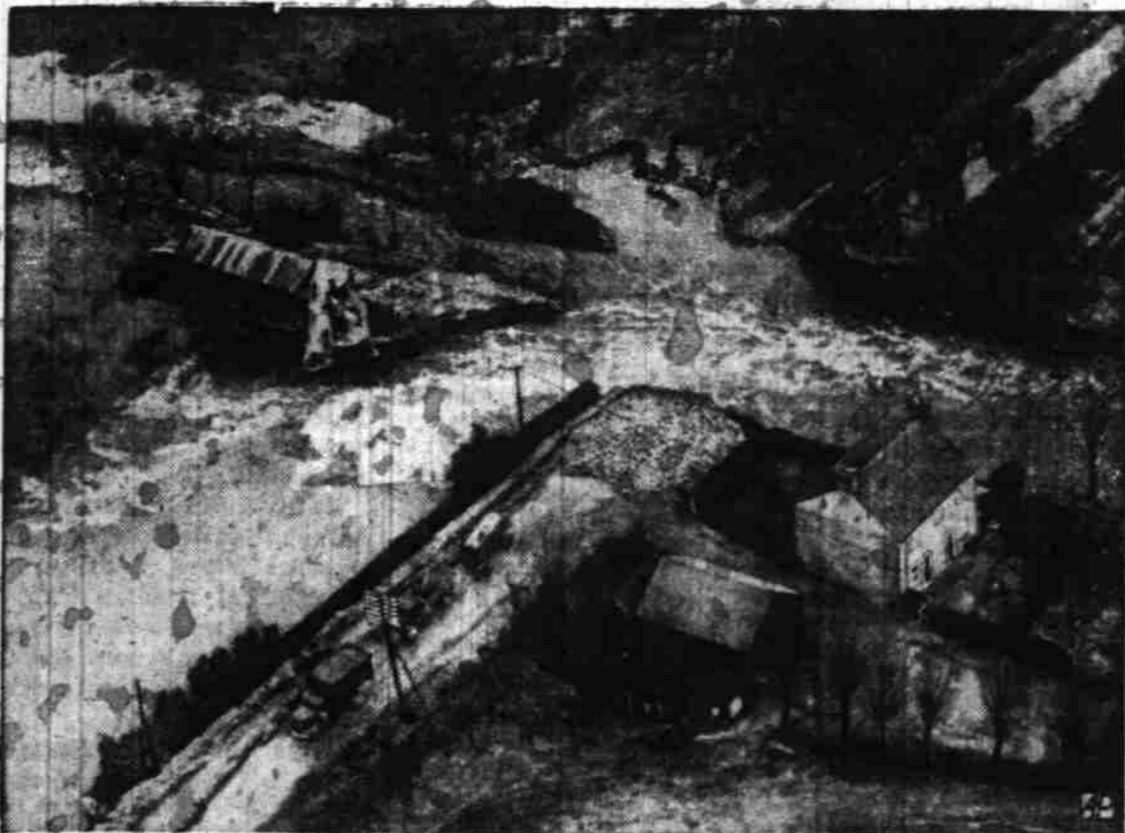
The passing of the elder Ford ended a career that had many facets. He was an ardent pacifist, a prohibitionist, deeply interested in sociology and in the development of agriculture as an adjunct to industry.

Ford, who abhorred war, once tried to stop the first world conflict with a peace ship expedition to Europe, designed to "get the boys out of the trenches by Christmas." It was a failure that cost Ford \$400,000.

For a long time in World War II he refused to believe the German invasion of Poland meant a real war; he often referred to the conflict in its early stages as a "phony war."

Once it engulfed the United States, however, Ford entered wholly into the production of war weapons. "I want peace," he said, "and I'm fighting like hell to get it."

The surviving members of the family, in addition to the widow, are Mrs. Edsel B. (Eleanor) Ford, and her children, Henry II, Benson, William and Josephine Ford. Edsel Ford, only son of the noted manufacturer, died in May, 1943.

Texas Power Gets Denison Electricity

TULSA, Okla., April 8 (AP)—Douglas G. Wright, administrator of the Southwestern Power Administration, announced today the SPA and the Texas Power and Light Co. had signed a 20-year contract under which approximately half the power from the government's hydro-electric plant at Denison dam will be distributed and sold.

Denison dam is located on the Red River, border between Texas and Oklahoma.

Under the agreement, the announcement said, electric power from the Denison project will be fed into the distribution system of T. P. and L., with the company paying appropriate rate schedules. It provides also that SPA can tap the company's lines and recover energy with which to serve government customers such as Rural Electrical Administration co-operatives in the private utility's service area.

Outline of plans for the observance of chamber of commerce week, April 14-19 was presented. R. W. Currie, vice-president, presided and Pete Smith, Snyder, was a guest.

New First Sacker Should Bolster Schalk's Nine

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., April 8. (AP)—Around a nucleus of nine holdovers from 1946, in his second season as Oklahoma City helmsman, Roy Schalk is grooming the Indians' Texas League entry, meanwhile keeping a watchful eye trained on Cleveland.

The American League tribe is slated to ship six top hands to the Schalks prior to the start of the race. If the help from Cleveland is the right kind, the Indians could be a formidable factor in approaching baseball derby, for which the veterans plus some new talent dug up on their own, the warriors have made a good showing in exhibition games.

Perhaps the "find" of the club is at first base, where powerful little John Hernandez takes over. The bespectacled infielder, obtained when the regular, Elmer Sidlo, retired after last season, gives promise of playing a prominent part in the 1947 long-range hitting pace.

He may prove to be one of the loop's most constant homerun threats, on the basis of his early slick work. He played at Orienta of the Canadian-American League last year.

Only other infield spot apparently filled is at second, where little Pat Ankenman is back, fielding well and hitting the ball hard. Shortstop, a troublesome spot for several years, has Ernie Velasquez, fresh from the service, leading the race.

At third is Al Rosen, good-looking youngster who belted 325 at Pittsfield, Mass. last term but several other candidates are getting good, long looks from Schalk, both at third and at short. Schalk himself has been seen infrequently in action. After the picture straightens out the boss who played four positions last season probably will appear in a utility role.

The outfield is uncertain, and most of a new picket line will be sent in by Cleveland. At present Harry Schmel, with Waterloo in 1946; Pinky Evans, up from Clovis, N.M., and Big Bill Anovick, a .325 clubber at Harrisburg in '46, are the ones most frequently employed, but at the most only one will remain.

Two veteran catchers are back—Ray Murray and Hoyle Boger—and one of them may not survive the Cleveland shipment which is to include two outfielders, two pitchers, an infielder and a catcher.

Oklahoma City is strongest in pitching at this early stage, with five veterans back—three of them the top ranking hands from last term's cellar segregation.

At the top of the list are Len Gilmore, Ralph McCabe and Preacher Dorsett. Two young holdovers are Leo Hatley, a southpaw, and Bob Misteale.

In summary, the Indians' outlook is vastly ahead of the '46 scene, at the spring stage of planning. If Cleveland delivers half a dozen hands as good—or better—than a majority of the talent now on hand, the Schalks are destined to desert their door mat role this summer.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Texasans who pride in talking about the virtues of their state—and who is he who doesn't—should do all they can to put the game of baseball back on a solid footing, in high school, college as well as professional circles.

There has been the mistaken idea among our natives for some time now that Texas regularly supplies the most native-born sons in the major professional leagues. That is far from true.

Ironically enough, the country has climate more suited for baseball than most any other part of the country, with the possible exception of Southern California. The elements would permit something like eight months of the game here.

In California schools, baseball is emphasized just as much as any other kind of athletics, including football. Perhaps in time it will take its place near the top of the program in Texas.

This year there should be, at the very least, 2,500 youngsters playing baseball in Texas high schools. Given the proper training, some of that number are going to develop into major leaguers within a few short years.

The professional leagues, there'll be six of them operating in the state this year—will inspire others to make serious bids for jobs, boys who ordinarily could not have tried out for teams because the professional teams were too far removed from their homes.

Incidentally, there are six states which do not have a single native born representative in the majors. They are Rhode Island, Delaware, North Dakota, Nevada, Wyoming and Montana.

North Carolina, with a comparative small population, supplies 30 native sons in the big leagues while Missouri comes in with 29, Michigan 22 and Oklahoma 22. Louisiana can lay claim to only 15 big time products.

Yogi Berra Is Best Bad-Ball Hitter In Game

BALTIMORE April 8. (AP)—Stoc Larry (Yogi) Berra, the most successful bad ball hitter since Ducky Joe Medwick's heyday with the St. Louis Cardinals, is walloping the ter out of opposition hurling as the New York Yankees wend their way home.

Berra, who put together a 14-game batting streak before the Yanks broke camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., has driven home 11 runs in his last 12 official times at bat by cracking out eight hits, including three homers.

The 185-pound five-foot eight-inch native of St. Louis started his present batting rampage against crackers in Atlanta Sunday, by clubbing out five hits including two homers and batted in five runs.

Yesterday, the 21-year old socker drove in six runs by banging out a homer, double and single against the Norfolk Tars as the Yanks trounced their Piedmont League Farm Hands, 19-5.

The new Bronx Bomber currently filled is at second, where although he is a catcher by trade. However, he played 15 games in the Garden with Newark last year and is rapidly learning the finer tricks of fly-chasing.

Berra, who came up from Newark in September last year and clubbed two homers while batting .364 in seven games, broke into

the Yankee organization with Norfolk in 1943.

The likeable youngster hit only .253 for the Tars that season but he performed one batting feat that probably is without parallel. Berra drove home 23 runs in two successive games by smacking three homers, four doubles and three singles.

The successor to Babe Ruth's territory will probably provide Manager Bucky Harris with some anxious moments with his wild swinging but his frequent long ball hitting should serve as a balm for the former boy manager's apprehensions.

POISON PELLETS Cost Coyote His Rep, Life OKANOGAN, Wash. (AP)—They call him the wily coyote, but let's watch the critter for a moment while he loses his reputation—and his life: Up in the timbered foothills of the Cascade mountains a hunk of horse lies frozen on the snow as the sun drops from sight and the last long move beneath the trees, sliding warily into the open. Maybe there's a scent of man left in the thin winter air, but the scent of meat is there and hunger can be stronger than fear. The yellow furred little wolves don't waste as much time investigating as you would expect from an animal with a reputation. Their white, strong fangs soon are ripping great bites from the old horse. In a moment one coyote staggers drunkenly and collapses. The others pay little attention. They stay and eat and die and next day Mel Williams, predatory animal hunter for the Washington state game department, comes and picks them up. 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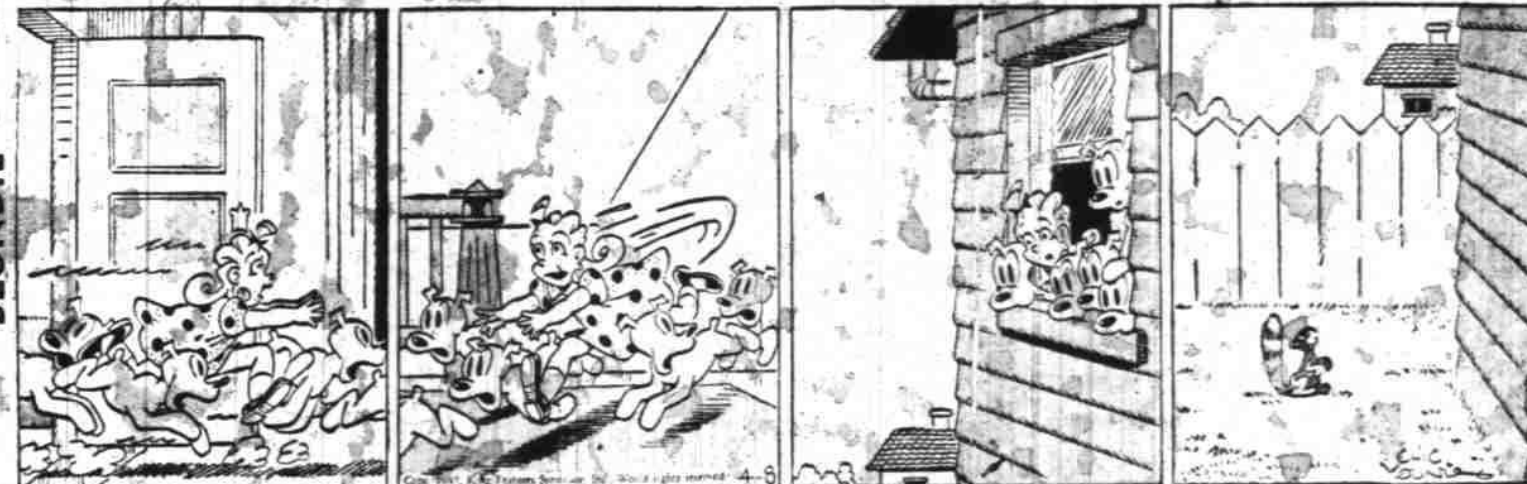

Story Of Brief, Furious Battle In Which Marines Foiled Reds Unfolded

HSINHO, China, April 8 (AP)—The story of how a small band of US Marines foiled a well-planned attempt by Chinese Communists to destroy a big ammunition dump last Saturday was unfolded here today.

Only a small section of the depot was fired by the Communists. Witnesses said it exploded with a great burst of orange light and a thundering roar that smashed windows for five miles around.

As the first US newsman to reach this village of mud huts west of Tientsin, I learned how the Marines overcame superior numbers in a brief but furious battle which cost the lives of five of the Americans. Sixteen others were wounded. Of the 14 still hospitalized, one is in critical condition, the other 13 are making "encouraging progress."

Six Communists were left dead and many of their comrades fled along a blood-spotted route across the Chinchung River, eight miles to the north. A seventh Chinese—a non-participant—was killed by a stray bullet.

Funeral services for the five dead Marines will be held Wednesday.

The Reds struck with the aid of ice aid of what is suspected here of being a fifth column, since they knew in advance some of the secrets of Marine communications. Their apparent objective: destruction of all the ammunition which couldn't be carried away.

The attempted coup failed because the Marines reacted with typical leatherneck speed and hard-fisted fighting.

"We're just going for the trip," explained the Texan. "I'm an oil field worker and a preacher—a kind of good-will ambassador, passing out a good word here and there. People smile when they see a big fat man like me riding this little scooter on such a long trip. And I like to see them smile. I hope we get a million smiles on our trip."

Many old timers in West Texas are never convinced that spring is here until they see mesquite come out of retirement.

This doesn't mean that they are never caught napping, for once in a blue moon winter's tardy curtain call catches even the sturdy native brush and trees. It happened in 1938 when the historic spring blizzard struck on April 8 and blew for 72 hours to nip grass, young crops, and all manner of trees. However, this is a rare exception and residents are entitled to believe that spring indeed is here when mesquite think it is safe to bud.

Life Of Small Girl Wrapped Up In Bananas

PITTSBURGH, (AP)—The life of little Lucille Tielsch is still all wrapped up in bananas—but it may not be too long before she can "take 'em or leave 'em."

Six years ago, doctors despair of the life of the sickly, undernourished baby who couldn't digest food because of a rare, colic disease. Then they discovered the banana diet.

Now a sturdy, yellow-haired youngster of 8, Lucille is beginning to fulfill predictions that she will outgrow the malady.

The bananas, bought monthly from a wholesaler in 40-pound crates, are now eaten mostly for dessert and "snacks" as fish, meat, cottage cheese, gelatin and fruit juices supplant them in her diet. Lucille used to eat 40 pounds of bananas a week.

She weighs 50 pounds and differs from her 11 healthy brothers and sisters only in that she has learned to say "no" when candy, starches and fats are passed.

With most of her life spent in hospitals, Lucille's choice of a future vocation is not surprising, although her reason is.

"I want to be a nurse," she says firmly, "because I like to make beds."

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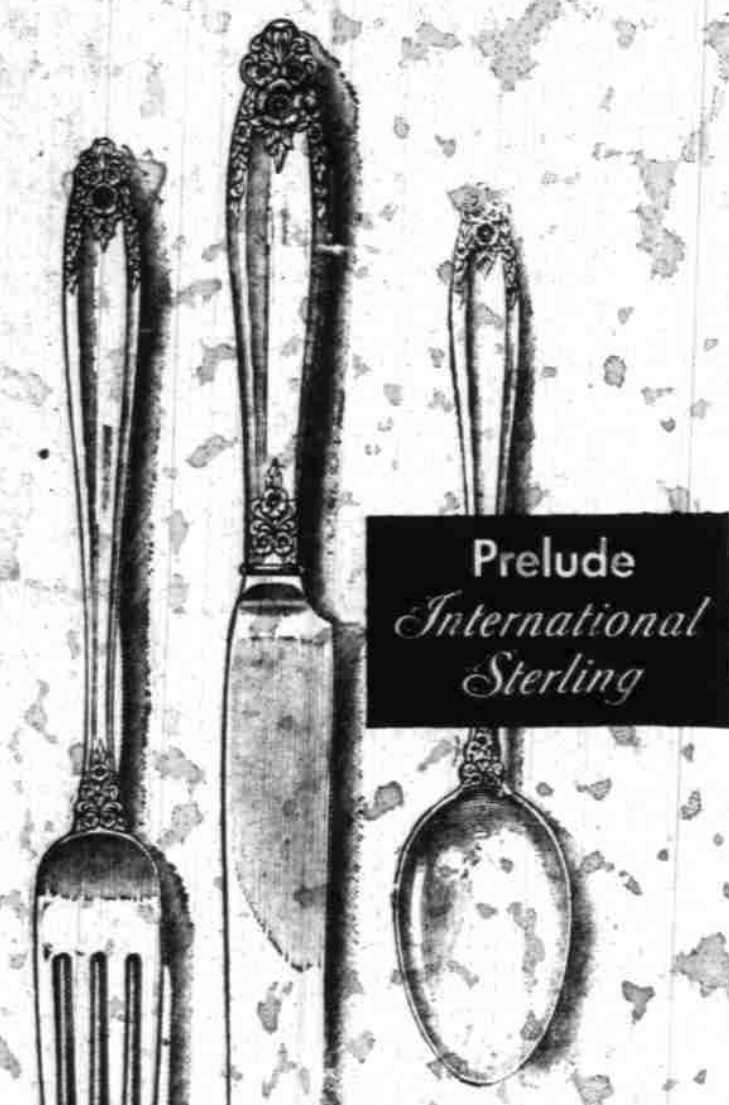
