Not Enough Return For Their Dollars by Jim McWilliams

This is the final part of a two part series on the economy of Schleicher County.

Last week we discussed the growth of the county in population and economic wealth. We proposed that businesses would want to locate in our county to get closer to their customers. But this is not always the case.

We spoke with several businessmen in San Angelo and several businessmen in Eldorado. We asked one specific question: "Why don't major chain stores or larger San Angelo businesses open stores in Eldorado?"

We got one answer almost everytime. The businessmen said "The return on our initial investment would not be regained at a reasonable rate.

Though the population is growing, the service area is not dense enough to warrant that large an outlay of capital."

Basically, Eldorado and surrounding Schleicher County is not populated enough to have large supermarket or department type stores. The reason is wholely economic. If a furniture store or large food supermarket was built in Eldorado, it could cost up to $1\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars in the first year for construction, merchandise and salaries. The store might set its financial goal at paying off this initial investment over a 15 year period with profit of 25 thousand dollars per year for the first 15 years. This type of financial expectancy is not uncommon in large corporate plans.

If the 1¹/₂ million dollars were paid off in 15 years in Eldorado, BUT the profit was projected to be only 5 thousand dollars, then the corporation would probably decide NOT to locate in Eldorado.

This is the general attitude that San Angelo companies have toward Eldorado. They feel that the money could be better invested in a market where the profit margin would be greater. The companies WOULD make money in Eldorado. . . but not ENOUGH MONEY to justify a large capital outlay.

However, smaller companies who do not need a large return on their investment are locating in Eldorado. The newest is Wagley Auto Sales on Highway 277 South.

The Express News loves it here and we hope to encourage other businesses to become a part of the growing Schleicher County business community.

TIME FOR PLANTING TREES, SHRUBS

COLLEGE STATION--Although most people shun the outdoors when cold weather arrives, that's the best time to add winter hardy trees and shrubs to the home landscape, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service landscape horticulturist.

Dr William Welch. "This allows the plants set out in the fall and winter to better withstand summer drought than those set out in the

spring.' The main concern when setting out trees and shrubs in the winter is to keep them watered to avoid damage during freezing weather. This is especially true for evergreens which have a tendency to dry out or contract leaf burn, warns Welch



INDIVIDUAL CHEESECAKES

Generously butter small muffin tins and sprinkle with graham cracker crumbs.

- 8 ounce cream cheese
- 3 eggs, separated
- ³/₄ cup sugar

Mix cream cheese, egg yolks and sugar well. Fold in beaten egg whites. Spoon 1 teaspoon mixture in each pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Remove from pan while warm. An indentation will form as it cools.

FILLING

³/₄ cup sour cream, 2 tablespoons sugar, ¹/₂ teaspoon vanilla. Mix well and place in a small baking dish. Bake at 400 degrees for 5 minutes. Place 1/2 to 1 teaspoon on each cheesecake. Makes 48.






