## Pesticides, household chemicals and used oil recycling planned at Wall on April 9

On April 9, 2003 at the Wall Co-op Fertilizer Facility unwanted pesticides, home chemicals or used motor oil can be brought to the Wall collection site free for safe disposal. This collection event is open to all Texas residents.

The collection hours will be from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on April 9th at the Wall Coop Fertilizer Facility which is located 7 miles east of San Angelo on Highway 87, south on FM 5769. The collections, which are free are conducted rain or shine.

This program is also accepting household hazardous wastes from all Texans. Household hazardous wastes are products that can no longer be used and include: automotive waste products, such as antifreeze, brake and transmission fluids; old painting supplies, such as old paint, solvents, varnishes, paint strippers or wood preservatives; gardening supplies, such as pesticides, insecticides, fertilizer, weed killers and rat poison; and cleaning supplies, such as polishes drain cleaners, oven cleaners and degreasers, concentrated cleaners, moth balls, and cleaning concentrates.


Only clean, properly rinsed plastic containers will be accepted for recycling. The waste material should be handled with care. Inspect the containers before moving. If, upon inspection, you suspect that a container will tear or rupture when moved, do not attempt to move or load the container for transport. Notify collection site personnel for assistance.

Wear protective clothing and use respiratory protection described on product labels.

Make use all waste material is securely packaged and line the storage area of the transport vehicle with a plastic sheeting to contain any spillage that might occur when moving. If possible, arrange the pesticides by hazard class. Make sure labels are securely attached and brace containers to prevent shifting.

Keep containers dry during transport and to not transport pesticide wastes in a manner that will allow fumes from those wastes to enter the passenger compartment of the vehicle. Lastly, drive directly to the pesticide collection program site after you load your vehicle.





## **Bruce and Wren win team roping at Rodeo Houston**

Zane Bruce of Eldorado and Brady Wren of Kerrville won the team roping event at Rodeo Houston on Sunday claiming \$14,536.40 in prize money. The pair were among 12 teams reaching the "short-go" money round from among 20 separate performances. Bruce and Wren won the overall average after placing 3rd in the second round of competition and 4th in the short-go. Their cumulative time of 25.1 seconds edged out the 2nd place team of Tee Woolman from Llano and Patrick Smith of Midland whose cumulative time was 25.5 seconds.

Bruce and Wren are currently ranked 4th in the national team roping standings. Winning isn't new to the pair -- they have been teammates for years, dating back to their high school days when they won the team roping event at the Texas High School State Finals Rodeo in 1996. Interestingly, they still rope from the same horses as in their high school days. Bruce's horse is named Julio.

Rodeo Houston was held for the first time this year in the massive Reliant Stadium, located adjacent to the Houston Astrodome. Rodeo organizers say the move to the new arena was a good one, with record crowds turning out to cheer on the cowboys and cowgirls.

Terry Don West of Henryetta, OK, was the top money winner at the rodeo. In addition to the \$19,426.59 he won in the bull riding event, West received a \$25,000.00 bonus as the top money winner.

Other winners included: Houston

Hutto of Del Rio in tie-down roping; Will Lowe of Canyon in bareback bronc riding; Cody Demoss of Mt. Pleasant in saddle bronc riding; Curtis Cassidy of Donalda, Alberta, Canada in steer wrestling; and Kristie Peterson of Chilton, TX in barrel racing.

Highlights of Rodéo Houston will be broadcast on the Outdoor Life Network and may be viewed locally by satellite TV subscribers. It is slated to air Sunday, March 30 at 6:00 p.m. and again on Tuesday, April 1 at 6:00 p.m.

Zane Bruce is the son of Bob and Ima Bruce of Eldorado. His wife, Tina Marie travels with him to rodeos. When he's not making the circuit of pro rodeos, Bruce trains horses and works as a substitute teacher.

## **Comptroller Strayhorn delivers sales tax rebates**

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn today sent \$280.2 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. While state sales tax collections continue to fall, this month's local allocation actually represents a 3.3 percent increase compared to March 2002. This can happen occasionally due to a wide variety of factors that can affect local tax revenue.

This month's increase results largely from additional money gained from

## Isaacs wants county to build chapel at the local cemetery



• Monitor account activity on your billing statements.

• Immediately report the crime to Local police and the Federal Trade Commission. Provide them with as much documentation as possible. Get a copy of the police report. Credit card companies, banks and credit reporting agencies may require you to show a police report to support your claim.

• Contact the fraud units of the three credit reporting agencies and ask them to place a fraud alert on your credit report to prevent new fraudulent accounts from being opened.

### **Additional Steps:**

• If your bank account has been tampered with close the account, destroy checks and cut up ATM cards. Ask for password protection when opening new accounts.



cording to Jan Wanoreck, County marketing assistance loans provide producers with interim financing Executive Director for Schleichon their production. Instead of selling the wool and mohair immediately after shearing, a nonrecourse loan allows a producer to store the production, pledging the commodity itself as collateral. The loan helps an eligible producer pay bills

when they come due without having to sell the wool or mohair at a time of year when prices tend to be lowest. Producers must meet eligibility requirements.

As an alternative to obtaining a loan, producers may request LDPs on graded or ungraded wool. The graded wool loan rates are announced by region according to eight specific micron ranges and apply to wool that, in addition to meeting the criteria above, is skirted, classed, untied, clean and with bellies out, and has a minimum length of three inches.

Wool and mohair marketing loan gains and LDPs received by producers for each crop year are subject to one \$75,000 payment limitation per crop year.
