Lobbying efforts and new legislation were the major topics of discussion during the District 5 Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers

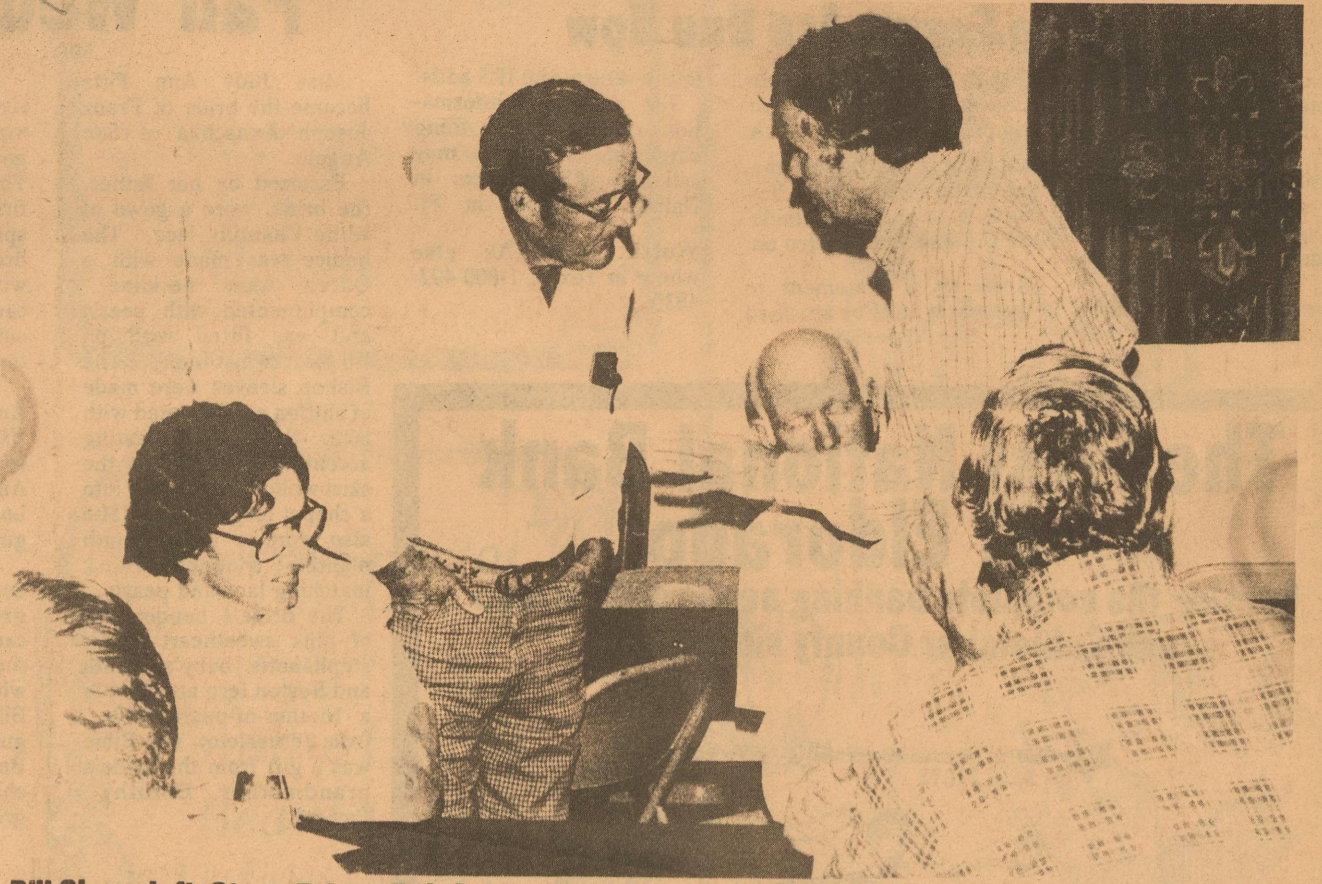
Association meeting held here last week. About 40 persons attended the event in the meeting room of the El Dorado Restaurant.

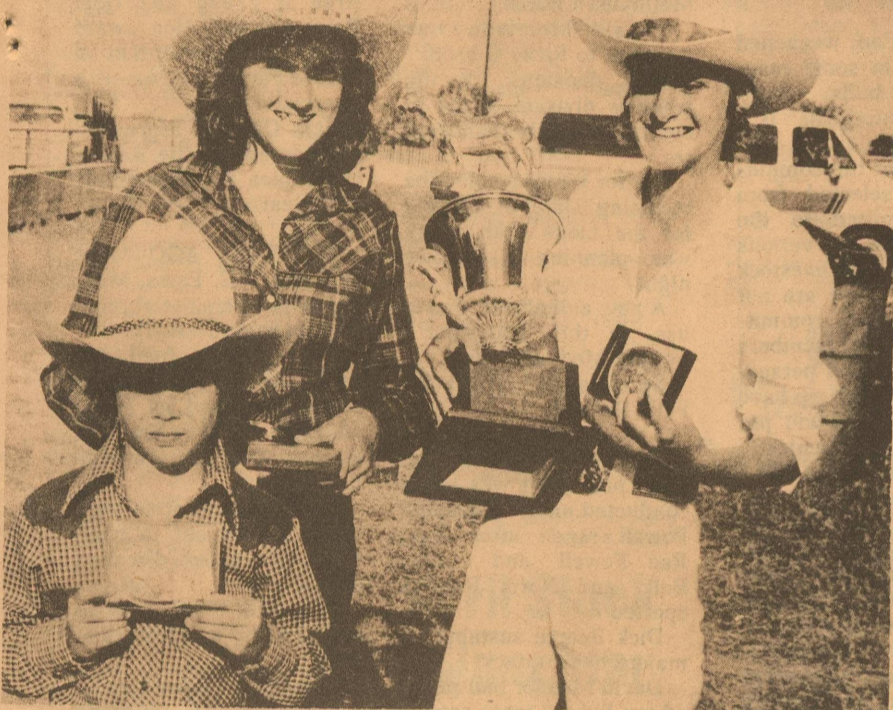
Miss Harrison was also the senior overall winner. The junior winner was Kim Bishop of Ozona and sub-junior winner was Lewis Baker.

## Loeffler Issues Statement on 'Israeli Bomb Raid'

Jim Overton, press secretary to Congressman Tom Loeffler, called Tuesday morning to issue a statement on Israel's bombing of an Iraqi nuclear facility.

Although admitting they were still pretty much in the dark, he said, "We must be concerned that the Israeli raid may complicate our

peacemaking efforts in Lebanon as well as delay settlement of other Arab-Israeli problems in an already tense region."

"In addition, it raises the spectre of continued Soviet presence and penetration into the Middle East. It is a matter which must be monitored very closely."

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county of Schleicher will be accepted by Farmers Home Administration until 6-29-81 for production losses.

Emergency loans for farm and ranch operators are available through the Eldorado or Eden county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), according to Ben T. Rucker, Jr., FmHA County Supervisor.

Rucker asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought 9-1-79 through 9-1-80 make their needs known at the Farmers

Home Administration office at Eldorado or Eden.

FmHA loans covering actual production losses may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Rucker said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five

percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasibly consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the operator restore damaged farm and ranch operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used

to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Rucker asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the disaster make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office in Eldorado, located in the County Agent's office, on Thursday following the second Wednesday of each month from 1:30 pm to 3 pm, or at the Eden Farmers Home Administration in the ASCS building. ### Extension Forms Are Due Now

Taxpayers who asked for an automatic extension to file their Federal income tax returns must file the complete return and pay any remaining tax due by midnight, June 15, the Internal Revenue Service says.

A copy of the extension request, Form 4868, to the completed return. If a taxpayer is entitled to the automatic extension because he or she was outside the U.S. and Puerto Rico on April 15, a statement to that effect must be attached

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock. It affects the reproductive organs resulting in abortions, partial loss of

milk production, weakened calves, and in some cases sterility in bulls. In humans, brucellosis is known as undulant fever.

Members of the committees were selected from names submitted to the Commissioners by various segments of the livestock industry. "These are not 'rubber stamp' committees. We have members who come from all persuasions. We believe we have committees which will provide us with practical advice, which we will incorporate wherever possible in the Texas brucellosis program", Armstrong said.

More than 600 names were submitted statewide for consideration. A total of 180 producers were selected and have agreed to serve for terms ranging from two to six years.

New band uniforms were being passed out to band members, under direction of C.K. Jones.

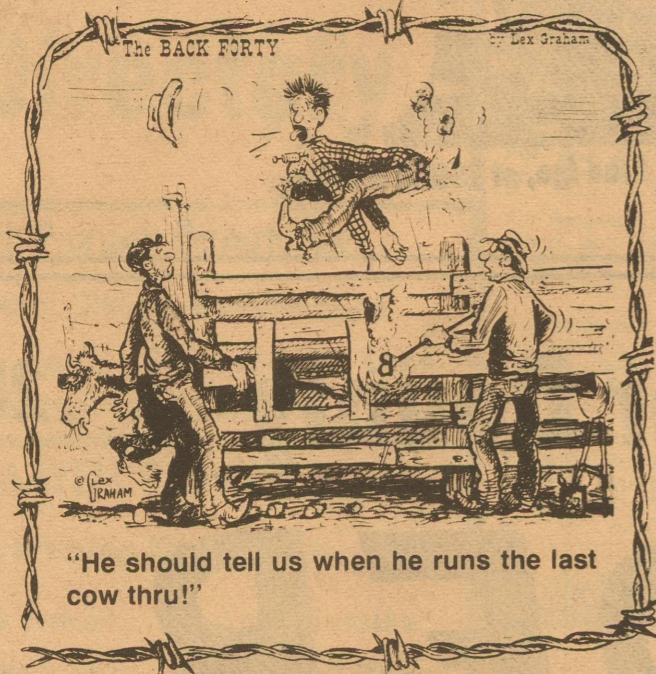

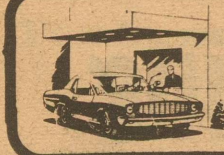

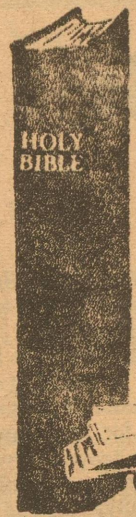

# Practice Boating Safety This Summer

With more than half a million boat owners in Texas, boating safety is a timely topic as summer approaches, says an official of the Texas Safety Association.

In fact, Governor William P. Clements Jr. has declared June 7-13, 1981, as safe boating week in Texas to impress upon boating enthusiasts the merits of safe boating, says Nelson Mueller, TSA's vice president for home and leisure activities. The observance will coincide with ational Safe Boating Week.

"Safety and accident prevention behavior will save lives and increase the quality of water recreation for all Texans," reads the governor's proclamation on safe boating. The proclamation points out that 575 accidental drownings, many related to boating, occurred in 1980.

"It's very hard for boaters: speeding across the water to spot a swimmer's head. And even if boaters are alert, they might not be able to avoid swimmers that suddenly appear.

Slowing down is a good precaution to take to prevent this situation," he says.

He suggests the following safety tips for boaters: \*Continually scan the water ahead of your boat for objects in the water, particularly swimmers. Heading directly into the sun makes vision ahead difficult. Wear a sun visor or sun glasses.

\*Before making a turn, look over the water in the direction of the turn.

\*Never run too close to an anchored or drifting boat; swimmers might be near.

\*Always expect to find swimmers beyond the authorized swimming areas. If you see one, expect to find more.

\*Don't be distracted by one hazard so that you fail to watch out for others.

Mueller advised swimmers to swim near shore and never alone. Any swimmer entering a boat Channel for whatever reason should have a boat accompany him, the safety official adds.

# To Producers Exemption Is Important

Congressman Kent Hance, Democrat from Lubbock, and Tom Loeffler, Republican from Hunt, are working to have the 1,000 Barrel Exemption from the Windfall Profits Tax put in President Reagan's Tax Bill. If the exemption passes, it would apply only to independent producers and royalty owners.

The Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois, said he is considering the 1,000 Barrel Exemption, but hasn't made up his mind as yet. Hance is a member of the Ways and Means Committee.

A spokesman for the Treasury Department said the Reagan Administration has no specific position on exempting independent and royalty owners and their stand would depend on what the entire tax bill looks like.

If Hance and Loeffler and Senators Lloyd Bentsen and John Tower are successful, producers and royalty owners would be able to keep 50.9 billion dollars over the next nine

years according to the Joint Committee on Taxation.

# Blood Machine Helping Patients

A laboratory machine normally used in a hospital blood bank is helping save the lives of a special group of cancer patients--members of the Jehovah's Witness faith in need of surgery at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

Blood cell separators at the UT M. D. Anderson staff came up with the idea of using the blood cell separator in the operating room to help bring a 21 year old Jehovah's Witness safely through surgery. The procedure since has been used successfully on four other patients.

The machine's most important characteristic for Jehovah's Witnesses is that the blood remains in constant contact with the patient's body. "That's why the blood cell separator meets with the approval of patients and their families," said Dr. Jacques F. Dupuis, assistant professor of anesthesiology. "Patients of this faith will not even consider having their won blood drawn in advance to have on hand during surgery. Such blood has been removed or 'separated' from the body, which is against their religious beliefs."

Jehovah's Witnesses interpret certain biblical scriptures to mean that they are to refuse any type of blood transfusions, even in life-threatening situations. This belief has jeopardized the lives of many Jehovah's Witnesses.

es, who have died during or after surgery from blood loss, or who have died from disease because necessary surgery could not be performed effectively without blood transfusions.

Dr. Dupuis and Dr. Benjamin Lichtiger, M.D. Anderson Blood Bank chief, devised the idea to use the blood cell separator to assist in cancer surgery on these patients. The machine is normally used to centrifuge whole blood taken from donors into its component parts. The collected white cells and platelets are vital in helping cancer patients fight infection and hemorrhaging.

The machine removes blood from the body at one rate and simultaneously returns it at a different rate. Because of that difference in rate flows, the blood cell separator can build up a reservoir of blood outside the patient's body during surgery and reinfuse it as needed. The blood remains in constant contact with the body, a factor vital to its use in treating Jehovah's Witnesses.

So far, five M.D. Anderson patients of the Jehovah's Witness faith, all with solid tumors, have utilized the blood cell separator during surgery. Although their individual conditions prior to surgery varied, in each case the doctors said the machine helped preserve precious blood during the operations.

The surgical benefits of the blood cell separator are not limited necessarily to patients who are Jehovah's Witnesses, the doctors said. The machine could be used to help patients with rare blood types, for whom blood might not be readily available, or for patients who run the risk of contracting post-transfusion hepatitis.

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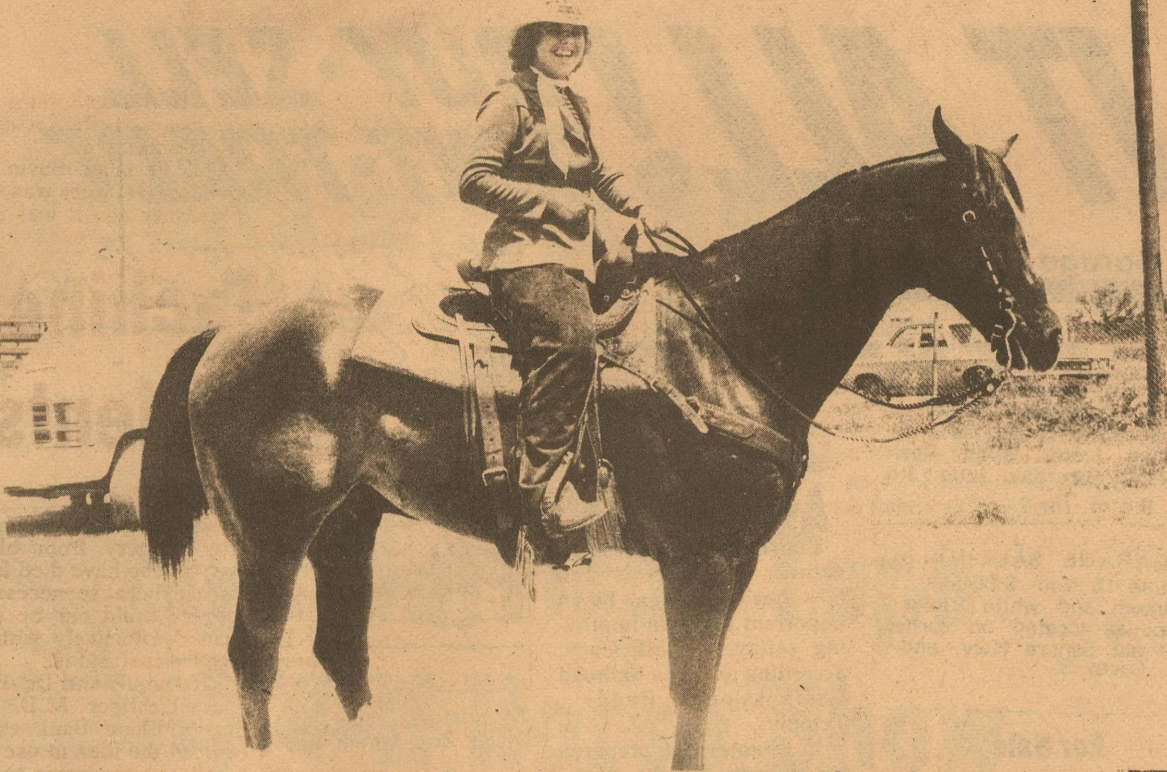

### Cattle Placements Down from '80

Although Texas cattlemen sent 40 percent more cattle into feedlots during April, the total cattle on feed inventory in Texas was 4 percent below 1980. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown has reported:

Insufficient rains in the Northern High Plains region have made for a shortage of grazing forage for cattle," Brown explained.

The area is the state's biggest region in terms of cattle inventories and without adequate pasture, cattle have had to be taken to feedlots.

According to the May 1 report from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, placements during April were 40 percent above 1980, and 23 percent above last month.

April cattle marketings stood at 370,000 head, a 1 percent increase.

### April Stock Slaughter Reported

Livestock slaughter in Texas totaled 329 million pounds during April, just slightly below 1980. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown has reported:

According to the May 21 report from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, the number of head slaughtered compared with last year as follows:

cattle, 479,000, up 2 percent; calves, 15,700, up 25 percent; hogs, 121,100, down 7 percent; sheep and lambs, 114,000, up 8 percent.
