Tax Collections Discussed Monday

The question of how county taxes should be collected was the major topic during the meeting of Schleicher County Commissioner's Court Monday. The question was whether it would be less expensive for the new tax appraisal district to collect county taxes instead of the county tax assessor-collector as in the past.

Dorothy Evans, county tax assessor-collector, met with the court during the morning session and told the court she felt they would be losing control over the county's money if they put the tax collection in the hands of the new tax district. She said she also felt the county could have saved money if it had waited until 1982 to implement the new tax appraisal district.

Ray Lewis Ballow, of the tax appraisal district, met with the court during the afternoon session and explained how he thought the court could save money by letting his office send only one rendition to tax taxpayers, thus cutting down costs of printing and postage.

The tax office has already received permission from the School Board to collect school taxes. He said he would not have to hire extra personnel to collect county taxes, also.

However, the court noted that it cannot give the tax office permission to collect county taxes without the permission of the county tax assessor-collector.

The court had given Mrs. Evans permission to retain one employee in her office during that action taken during a meeting June 8. However, they rescinded that action Monday because the item was not listed on the court's posted agenda. The item will come before the court during their next meeting July 13.

Sheriff's deputy Walter Donaldson also met with the court and asked for janitorial service for the new law enforcement center. No action was taken on the request. Donaldson also told the court the representative from the Texas Jail Commission

visited the jail and would return July 13 for the final inspection.

Final payments to the architectural firm Templeton Construction and Southern Steel for the center were approved.

Floyd West met with the court and offered his airplane hangar for sale at a cost of \$5,000. The structure is 30 feet by 70 feet and holds three airplanes. No action was taken on the offer.

However, the court did agree to fill out an application for a grant to upgrade the present airport facilities from the Texas Aeronautical Commission which reviews applications for grants in September.

Curtis Andrews, insurance representative, met with the court and withdrew his bid for insurance on the

law enforcement center because of a mistake made on classifying the building. Bids will be called for again and submitted during the next meeting.

The court also:

--Agreed to buy a heating and cooling system for the newly re-modeled library.

--Gave permission to road foreman Clay Burleson to build an access way to the new home of Mr. and Mrs. Gary McKinney on the McIntosh Road.

--Hired Eugene Gibson as a steady employee on the road crew.

--Set a hearing on federal revenue sharing bonds for July 13.

Isidoro Martinez remains in intensive care in a San Angelo hospital after suffering several gunshot wounds.

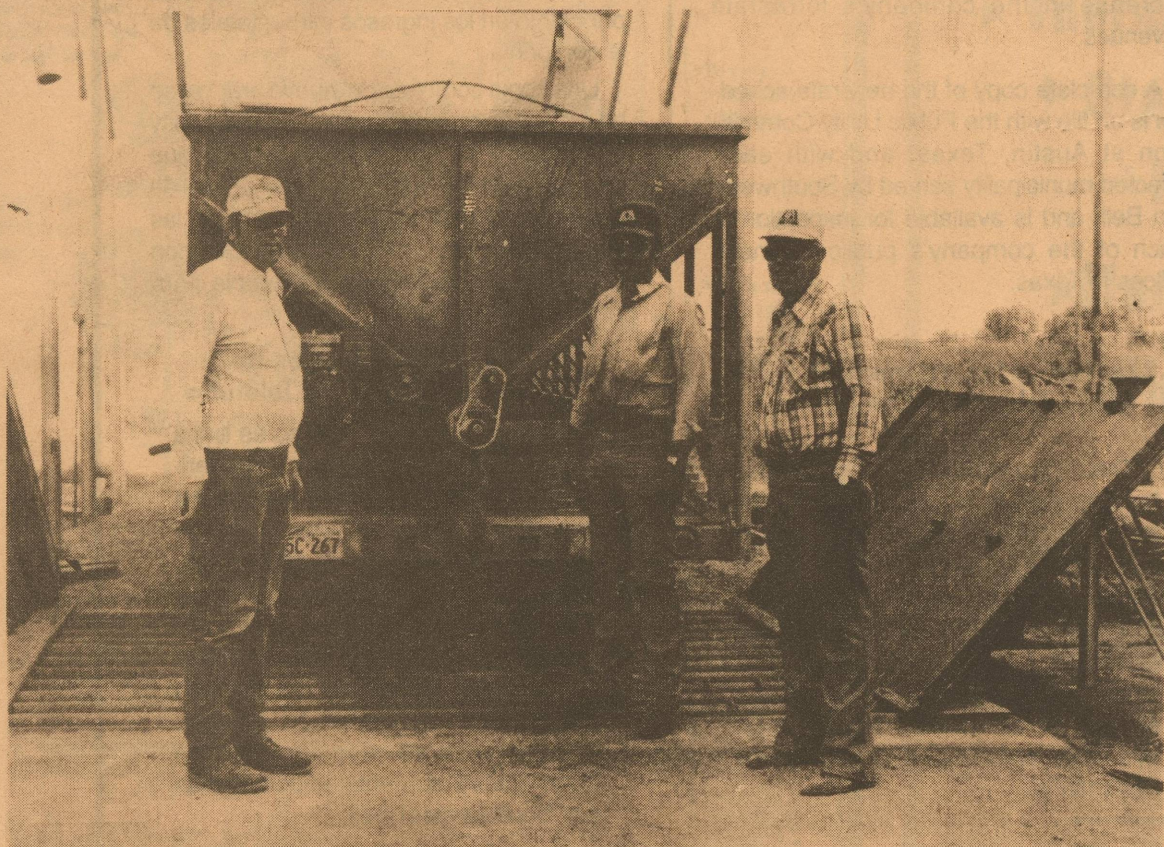
Narciso Ortega was hospitalized at Schleicher County Medical Center and has been released. He is being held at the Schleicher County Law Enforcement Center.

Bentsen Proposes Longer Prison Sentences

Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Thursday introduced legislation to provide longer prison sentences for persons who commit crimes while free from jail on bail.

The Bentsen bill is co-sponsored by 20 of his colleagues in the Senate.

"When someone commits a crime and is arrested there is a good chance the offender will be released from jail on his own recognizance or on bail," Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his bill.

"Many of these accused individuals, however, do not sit around abiding the law and patiently wait for trial. Rather, many of them take this opportunity to go back out on the streets and commit more crimes."

"One reason they feel free to do this is the knowledge that the courts can, and often do, impose concurrent sentences for crimes; sentences that run at the same time. The criminal, once charged for a specific crime, has nothing to lose by committing additional crimes."

The Bentsen bill mandates consecutive sentencing for individuals convicted of federal crimes while they are free from jail on bail. It would require that in these cases the sentences for any additional crimes be in addition to -- and not run concurrently with -- the sentence for the first crime.

Someone in these circumstances, convicted of two armed robberies and sentenced to 10 years for each robbery, for example, would serve only 10 years total if the sentences run concurrently. But 20 years would be the time in prison if the sentences run consecutively.

"How much would crime be reduced if my bill is enacted into law? One study found that 65 percent of those arrested for auto theft were again arrested for the same offense while on bail; 40 percent of those arrested for larceny were

A total of 13 permits for more than 58 miles in new pipelines were granted by the Railroad Commission in May 1981, according to the RRC Oil and Gas Division.

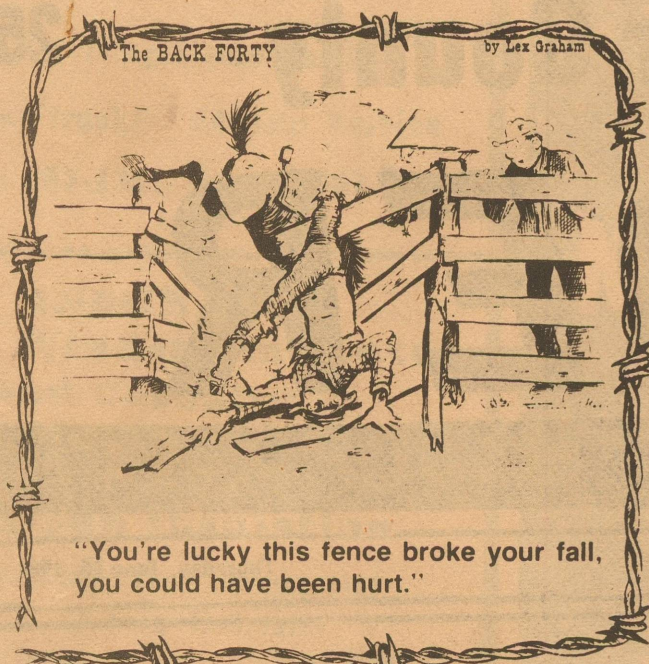

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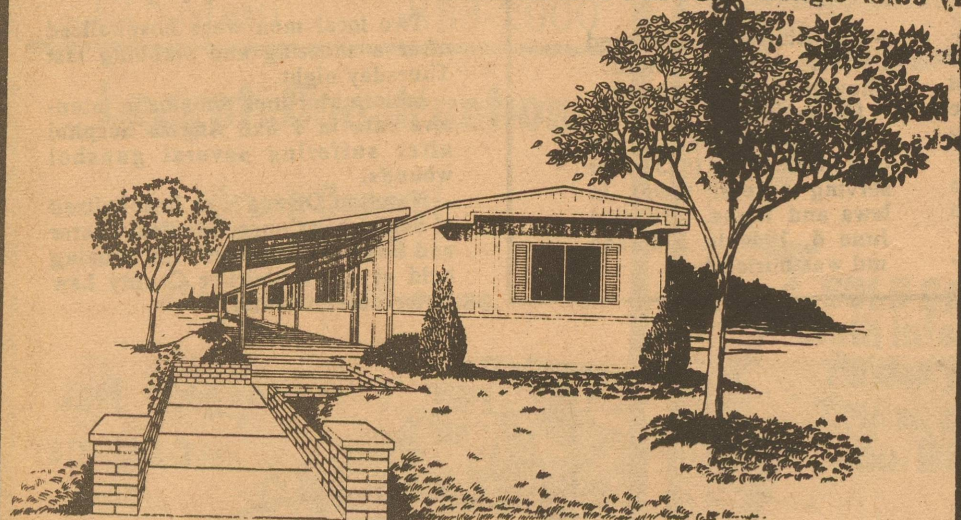

The Debate On Social Security

In recent weeks Americans have demonstrated a new pride born out of the success created by working in a bipartisan way on the nation's economic recovery.

Looming on the economic horizon now comes the issue of financing the Social Security system. It is incumbent on all of us to assess our position because whatever path we take will require extensive consideration and debate. The issues involving Social Security are both complicated and controversial. And they affect each and every one of us.

Simply put, the Social Security system is on the verge of bankruptcy. Benefits going out far outstrip revenues coming in.

It was just four short years ago that the American people were told the Social Security system was in dire financial trouble and the only workable solution was the largest single tax increase in the peacetime history of the nation.

Today it is clear the heavy tax burden — once billed as a way to "put the system's retirement and disability trust funds on sound footing until the early part of the 21st Century" — was not the answer. The system is in deeper trouble now than it was four years ago — a problem President Reagan inherited and has chosen to face head-on.

Consider this: In the next five years, the Social Security trust Fund could encounter deficits of up to \$111 billion and in the decades ahead its unfunded obligations could run well into the trillions.

Since Social Security was enacted nearly 50 years ago, it has grown far beyond the intent of those who created it as a program to supplement retirement. Today, certain Social Security programs have become as much welfare programs as they are an insurance program. It is an economic drain on the country and an unreliable reservoir for the elderly.

When Social Security went into effect in 1935, the maximum tax imposed on business and industrial workers was just \$30 annually. Today, it is \$1,975. In 1950, the program served 2.5 million people at a cost of \$522 million. Today, it provides assistance to 36 million people at a cost of \$174 billion.

To finance Social Security in 1935, there were 11 adults paying into the system for every retiree funded. Today, there are only three workers supporting each retired beneficiary. By the year 2020, the ratio will be two workers for each retiree.

Over the next 50 years according to actuarial projections we will have a 100 percent increase in our population 65 years of age and older, while our real population will increase by only 40 percent.

Under current conditions our estimates show that the retirement and survivors portion of the system — the heart of the system — will go broke by next fall unless Congress takes action very soon.

The problem is two-fold: First, in the short term we must make certain the system does not run out of money next year or the year after. Secondly, we must provide now for long-term reforms in the program that will prevent these sporadic crises from recurring.

And we must find the solutions without looking toward higher taxes.

In this time of belt-tightening, we also must hold down the tax burden on workers who support Social Security, as well as eliminate the abuses that can rob the elderly of their rightful legacy.

Whatever the vehicle, the problems must be met because the future for generations of Americans to come will rest upon our actions.

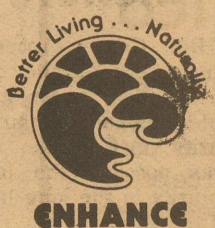

From The County Agent's Office

With three more 1981 Texas screwworm cases confirmed recently in Presidio County, producers of the state need to "beef up" their surveillance programs.

The newest cases were confirmed in sheep on a ranch about 35 miles southwest of Marfa, according to officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Screwworm Identification Laboratory at Mission.

Texas thus far has had five cases confirmed this year, and producers have submitted 1,056 non-screwworm samples since January. This compares with one confirmed screwworm case for the corresponding period in 1980, when only 716 non-screwworm samples were received for identification at Mission.

The new cases are being treated with sterile flies produced at the Tuxla Gutierrez plant in Mexico.

Pellets which contain an insecticide, attractant and feeding material, also are being used. The latter system is known as SWASS which stands for Screwworm Adult Suppression System.

Earlier this year, the first case was confirmed in a dog at El Paso. The second case was diagnosed in April from worm samples collected from a sheep at the Texas A&M University Research Center near Sonora.

With the wet, hot and humid weather of the past several weeks highly favorable for screwworm outbreaks, producers should increase their efforts to check animals on a regular basis.

Samples of all suspected screwworm larvae should be mailed to the USDA's Screwworm Lab at Mission. All Fly production has been shifted to Tuxla, but lab identification of larvae samples is continuing at Mission.

It is important to know if there are outbreaks of screwworms as early as possible in order to help bring them under control.

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Refinery Production Is Down

Sixty-seven refineries processed 122,481,979 barrels of crude oil and hydrocarbon blends during February 1981, according to their reports to the Railroad Commission.

This volume compares with 138,830,198 barrels in the previous February, the Commission's Oil and Gas Division reported in its monthly recapitulation of Texas refinery operations. Inputs of crude oil and blends totaled 133,375,817 barrels in January 1981.

Texas refineries ran 97,799,434 barrels of crude oil in February compared to 112,811,654 barrels in February 1980 and 104,484,624 barrels in January 1981.

Products manufactured in February 1981 totaled 122,892,659 barrels, down from 139,099,310 barrels in the same month the previous year, and down from the 135,253,955 barrels in January 1981.

February 1981 manufac-

ture of motor gasoline totaled 47,313,765 barrels, compared to 53,945,104 barrels in the year-earlier month and 51,087,451 barrels in January of 1981.

Texas refineries manufactured 12,169,766 barrels of home heating oil in February 1981—an increase of 3,138,351 barrels from the year-earlier volume. January 1981 output was 12,008,161 barrels.
