W. House lawyer subpoenaed

A federal grand jury has subpoenaed the White House lawyer who was in charge of the so-called coffee tapes." The videotapes show President Clinton meeting at the White House with potential campaign contributors. Although they were shot in 1995 and '96, the tapes were only turned over to investigators this past weekend. Lawyer Lanny Breuer will appear before a grand and is expected to be asked to explain the delay. Meanwhile, former White House deputy chief of staff Harold Ickes was back on the hot seat yesterday at a Senate hearing on campaign fund-raising abuses.

Convicted CIA spy pardoned

President Boris Yeltsin has pardoned a former Russian diplomat who was sentenced to seven years hard labor for spying for the United States, Itar-Tass news agency reported Wednesday. It quoted presidential administration sources as saving Yeltsin had signed a decree pardoning Vasily Makarov, who was jailed at a trial in June. Tass has said Makarov was recruited by Washington's Central Intelligence Agency in Bolivia in 1976. He worked for the CIA until his return to Moscow in 1979 and then again in Spain from 1989, Tass.

Clinton travels to raise funds

President Clinton is leaving the finance reform storm behind in Washington this week and heading to New Jersey and Pennsylvania to raise more money for Democrats. After he visits a Newark, N.J. church this morning to make his case for child care programs, the president is scheduled to spend time at political fund-raisers. The president defends his continued money-raising in the face of investigations into fund raising practices. He says he has to raise money because the Republicans continue to do so.

Israel, PLO hold summit

U.S. Middle East peace envoy Dennis Ross said Israeli and Pal estinian leaders made it clear yesterday that they were determined to work together at their first summit in eight months. He said Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian President Yasser Arafat "committed themselves to overcome all the differences." It was their first meeting in eight months after the peace process was disrupted by Jewish settlement building and Islamic militant bombings in Israel. President Clinton said he was encouraged by the brief summit, saying it came "not a moment too soon."

Hillary Clinton visits Panama

First lady Hillary Rodham Clinton flew to Panama Wednesday for a three-day visit. The trip is the latest in a series Mrs. Clinton has made around the world, including visits to Central Europe, Latin America and Africa, to draw attention to her core issues of advancing the civil rights and the economic interests of women

Eagles furrow the Plowboys 21-6

The Eldorado Eagles hosted the Roscoe Plowboys last Friday night and scored touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams while allowing the Plowboys to find the endzone only once.

"It wasn't pretty but it was a win and at this point that's all that counts," commented Eagles head coach Jim Fryar after the 21-6 vic-

The not-so-pretty win moved the Eagles up another notch in the Associated Press statewide poll Eldorado is now ranked 13th and is a perfect 5-0 on the season.

The game began with the Eagles kicking to Roscoe. The Eagles defense held forcing the Plowboys to punt. But Eldorado's offense sputtered, too. That's when the Eagles defense and special teams took control and posted two touchdowns in the opening quarter. The initial score came at 5:32 in the first quarter when sophomore linebacker Casey Poynor stepped in front of and errant Roscoe pass and carried it back 52 yards for a touchdown. point through to give Eldorado a

The Eagles defense continued to shine on the following possession when they held Roscoe and forced a punt. That's when, with 3:23 left in the first quarter, Garrett Bownds fielded the pigskin and toted it 73 yards for a touchdown. Again, Reeves added the extra point and the Eagles led 14-0.

Roscoe gained momentum in the second quarter and appeared to be driving when Eagles defensive back Alton Bybee intercepted the ball to kill the threat. But the Eagles couldn't muster a scoring drive either the second quarter elapsed with neither team posting any points.

The Eagles found the endzone for the last time at 5:59 in the third quarter when quarterback Casey Snelson lofted the ball to senior receiver Kyle Hunter. Hunter outjumped a Plowboy defender to haul in the 12 yard TD pass. Cory Reeves kicked the extra-point and jailers. the Eagles led 21-0.




