Congressional Candidates Give Views On Major Election Issues

One of the most interesting races in this year's political arena is the one for the 21st District's seat in the U.S. House of Representatives. Two young men are campaigning for the seat, which was formerly held by Bob Krueger, who is running against John Tower for the U.S. Senate.

The two men running for the office are Tom Loeffler of Kerrville and Nelson Wolff of San Antonio. NELSON WOLFF

Wolff is the founder of Alamo Enterprises, a hardware and lumber business with eight locations in south Texas. He and his family now own and operate Alamo Ranches.

He served on the Texas House of Representatives from 1970-72 and was a member of the Appropiations Insurance and Oil and Gas Committes.

He served in the Texas Senate in 1972-73 and was on the education, state affairs and finance committee as vice chairman. He authored and passed several bills concerning elections, courts, senior citizens' employment, energy and conservation. In 1974, he was delegate of the

convention planning committee and chairman of the submission and transition committee.

He received a degree in both business and law from St. Mary's University in San Antonio in 1966. He is married to the former Miss Melinda Rogers. They have four children, Kevin, 13; Lyn Marie, 8; Scott, 20 months and Matthew, four weeks, live in Leon Springs.

Following are some of Wolff's comments on the major issues:

Taxing and spending: A new approach to government spending



and taxation is needed. We must first determine what portion of our income should be paid in taxes not only this year but in succeeding years. We must create a situation in which advocates of new federal programs must either call for higher taxes or cuts in other federal programs. I have recommended the next session of Congress act on a three year tax cut plan and then control federal spending in order that a balanced budget be reached by fiscal year 1982. The plan includes a \$104 billion tax cut phased in over three years, a savings of \$53 billion in the federal budget by cutting waste, inefficiency and fraud and reducing the number of regulations, and a constitutional amendment requiring Congress to balance the budget except in case of national emergency. Defense: In view of the rapid Soviet military build-up in recent years, it is essential that we move quickly to modernize our conventional forces and our nuclear capabilities. NATO forces in Western Europe are outnumbered in personnel and weapons by the Soviet-led Warsaw pact nations. We must strengthen our front line defense in Western Europe. It is also essential that we maintain an effective Triad-a nuclear delivery system consisting of landbased intercontinental ballistic missles, submarine-launched missles and a strong bomber force. We must continue the modernization of our land-based missles and the development of the cruise missle and the Trident submarine. Agriculture: We must develop a national program that will insure long term economic stability for our farmers and ranchers and will preserve the traditional family farm and ranch. I strongly support the Bent-sen Beef Import Bill that allows for greater importation when domestic production is down and decreased importation when domestic production is up. This countercyclical approach would stabliize meat prices and would be fair to both producer and consumer. We must also move

to develop larger export markets and to reduce the importation of foreign beef by requiring the same standards of inspection as are applied to domestic beef. Finally, we must remove unreasonable restrictions and develop effective predator control measures.

Energy: I favor a comprehensive national energy policy encompassing the following points:

1) The price of natural gas should be deregulated to provide economic incentives for increased domestic production.

2) The federal government should not be given the authority to allocate natural gas from Texas to industry in other states.

3)The cost of developing our energy sources should be borne

Not only will Schleicher County voters be faced with deciding on a wide array of candidates for the Nov. 7 election, they will also be faced with voting for or against nine proposed constitutional amendments

to the Texas State Constitution. The first amendment to appear on the ballot, although not numbered as such, is "The Tax Relief Amendment." This amendment would allow the Legislature to exempt intangible property and personal property from taxation.

Also, it would tax land devoted to farming or ranching on its productive value rather than what the market price might be. It would give property tax relief to the elderly and the handicapped as well as limit state spending while enforcing uniform standards and procedures on taxing authorities imposing property taxes.

Amendment Number one has to do with the handicapped. It would strike all reference to "Deaf and Dumb Asylum" from the constitution, while allowing the state to purchase stationery and other products made by the handicapped without going through the competitive bidding process.

Amendment Number Two would permit the Legislature to allow local governments to issue revenue bonds to create employment and finance industry. If passed, this amendment would allow local governments to compete with private investors and financial institutions in the field of industry.

Amendment Number Three would allow local cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. In theory the bonds would be repaid with funds collected by taxing the increased value of property in the redeveloped area.

Amendment Number Four would exempt solar and wind-powered energy devices from taxation in order to encourage private investment in them and encourage alternate energy sources.


Amendment Number Five would extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases. This amendment would raise the \$200 limit to \$500 in small claims court presided over by JPs where an attorney is not necessary.

Amendment Number Six would allow the Legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals and allow the court to sit in sections and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case.

Backers of the amendment believe it is more practical and less expensive to increase the size of existing courts to meet increasing demands than to create additional courts which require separate personnel and facilities.

Amendment Number Seven would eliminate the State Building Commission and State Building Fund from the constitution. These exist in name only and no longer serve a function. All records have been transferred to the State Board of Control.

Amendment Number Eight would authorize certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds for this purpose. This amendment would authorize water districts to establish fire protection programs and to spend district funds to finance them.



4)A national commitment should be made to the development of alternative energy sources such as the sun, hydrogen and the fused atom.

The bureaucracy: I recommend the following measures be implemented to cut waste, inefficiency and fraud in the federal government and to reduce the number of federal regulations:

1) Comprehensive sunset legislation that would subject a program or an agency to periodic review and possible termination.

Schleicher County deputy sheriff Ricky Bishop submitted his resignation to sheriff Orval Edmiston Wednesday morning, effective immediately.

Bishop will be moving to Ozona to work for an oil company. He has been deputy since September of 1977.

Edmiston said he did not have anyone in mind for the job. Applicants must be certified in law enforcement or attend a law enforcement school.

This places an added burden on the sheriff's department, as two patrolmen of the Department of Public Safety are not working here now. That leaves only two law enforcement officers in the town whereas there were five two months ago.

Lux Files For Office

De Lux, a local farmer, has filed as a write-in candidate for county commissioner of precinct 4.

Lux is opposing incumbent commissioner David Meador. Both of the men ran for the post during the May primary and were close enough to face each other in a runoff last June, which Meador won.

According to a new state law, write-in candidates must file with the county judge before their names can appear on voting ballots.





Cooperatives Are Sign Of Democracy

from Texas Federation of Cooperatives

The American spirit we so often celebrate in the U.S. is that of the indivividual. The individual carries a host of inviolable rights in this country and rightly so. We are a country of individuals.

There is, however, another American spirit which ought to be recognized and that is the cooperative spirit. To develop this country, individuals cooperated with others to clear land, build barns and to do what they couldn't do alone. In America's earliest history, settlers cooperated to settle the wilderness, to survive. Later they got together in business organizations to compete with economic forces which threatened their individual economic existence.

Those business organizations are called cooperatives. They enable Americans to work together to help themselves. Since October has been declared **Cooperative Month by most** governors in the U.S., including Dolph Briscoe, this is a good time to take a closer look at what cooperatives have meant to us.

Cooperatives were first officially organized in the United States by individual producers, usually farmers, to market their goods together in order to obtain fair prices in the marketplace. A farmer selling alone had little bargaining power. So farmers got together and marketed ther own produce, creating competition for outside organizations. Until Congress passed helpful legislation in 1922, farmers were often challenged by the courts when bargaining for higher prices. Today, cooperatives are an integral part of our society and more important than many people realize.

Texas has more the 440 cooperatives with over 133,000 members. They supply Texans with a multitude of products and services. There are cooperative insurance companies, credit unions, food stores,

power companies and housing and health groups. Farmers are big users of the huge marketing, supply credit and service cooperatives which have helped make agriculture Texas' number one business. These Texas cooperatives do almost 1.7 billion dollars of business volume.

Cooperatives are owned by the people who use them and all savings belong to the users in proportion to the amount of business done with the cooperative. All cooperative members have one vote in its operation regardless of their investment in it.

We salute coopeatives for the contributions they have made to this community and State. Cooperatives are true democratic, grass root organizations that are working for both its members and all of us. This is democracy in action.

Tax Forms Are Due Oct. 3

Employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1978 by Oct. 31. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

Persons who have deposited the entire quarterly tax liability in a Federal Reserve Bank or approved commercial bank have until Nov. 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," the Internal Revenue Service said.

Employers should use the preaddressed Forms 941 mailed to them by the IRS or obtain copies of the form from the nearest IRS office

IRS Publication 15, "circular E — Employer's Tax Guide," provides more information and is available free from local IRS offices.

Facts from a pro on driving to survive.

Q. I would like to put fog lamps on my car. What are the laws concerning their position? - L.U., Farmersville

A. Fog lights may be mounted on the front of cars according to the following specifications: they must be mounted no more than 30 inches and no less than 12 inches above the road surface; and, they must be aimed so that the high-intensity portion of the light to the left of the center of the car is projected at a level of four inches below the center of the lamp from which it comes at a distance of twenty-five feet.


Q. If an intersection has a left turn signal, can you still turn left when the through traffic has a green light but the left arrow isn't showing?-L. F., Caddo Mills

A. Yes, as long as you give through traffic the right of way. The arrow indicates that your left turn is protected and that you have the right of way.

Q. When towing my ski-boat it sways from side to side when driving about 45-50 miles per hour. This makes it difficult to control the car and when I put on the brakes to slow down the swaying gets worse before it goes away. What can I do to prevent this? — E.J., San Antonio

A. The most likely cause is insufficient trailer tongue weight. You can increase the tongue weight by moving the boat forward on the trailer or by storing your extra gear in the bow instead of the stern. The tongue weight should be in the range of 100-150 pounds (some trailer manufacturers specify a recommended tongue weight). Trailer sway is dangerous and if severe enough can flip the trailer and the car.





School Speed Zone Questioned Recently

Safety of school children going to and from school here has been a problem for a long time, especially since many children have to cross busy Highway 277. This summer, the city and the state entered into an agreement that was to offer a partial solution to the problem. However, for a while, the validity of the agreement was in question.

Under the agreement, the state erected the caution lights and agreed to maintain them. The city, in turn, assumed the responsibility of enforcing the 20 mile an hour speed limit around the school.

The validity of the agreement was questioned by a San Angelo lawyer whose client was one of the first persons to be stopped for violating the new speed limit.

The agreement was then interpreted by justice of the peace Frank "Pancho" Bradley as a city ordinance, as the city assumed enforcement responsibilities. City ordinances can only be tried in a municipal court which this city does not have. Therefore, the JP does not

have jurisdiction in several cases filed in his office, where persons were stopped for driving over 20 miles an hour in the speed zone. For this reason, about five cases were dismissed.

Cases in which persons were charged with driving over 30 mph still stood, as there was a violation of a state law, which JP's can try.

A solution was found, however. Now anyone stopped for driving between 20 and 30 mph can be charged with failure to heed a traffic warning device.

According to section 32 of the Texas Motor Vehicle Laws, drivers of any motor vehicle must obey official traffic control devices unless they are directed by a traffic or police officer with exceptions granted to drivers of authorized emergency vehicles.

The speed limit is in effect when the lights are flashing, from 7:30-8:30 a.m., from 10:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. and from 2:30-4 p.m. It was put into effect in an effort to protect children who had to cross the street on their way to and from school.

Social security benefits can be paid to retired persons age 62 and over, to workers who become severely disabled before age 65, and to survivors of deceased workers.

Monthly social security checks are also paid to certain dependents of a worker who has retired, become disabled, or died. Of the 466 social security

beneficiaries living in Schleicher County, 247 are retired workers and 22 are disabled workers. Another 70 persons are receiving benefits as the wives or husbands of retired or disabled workers. Widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased workers number 71.

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
