# Trickett honored by Air Intelligence Agency

Technical Sergeant Tim Trickett isn't accustomed to receiving public recognition for his work. His job in the U.S. Air Force's Air Intelligence Agency (AIA) usually means that his work isn't usually seen by anyone without a "need to know" security clearance. It's one of those, "If I told you, I'd have to kill you," things.

But now, Trickett is being recognized by the Air Force and the Air Intelligence Agency for being one of the "Best of the Best" among enlisted technicians in the gency. In all, more than 400 senior airmen through technical sergeants were chosen from among 22 individual career fields to compete for the honor. Trickett advanced through several levels of competition, first winning a gold medal at his group level. He then won gold medals at the wing and center levels before moving up to compete in the agency-level Sensor Olympics. There Trickett won the Gold Medal in the Information Systems Management category but not before taking an agency level academic and application test developed by the Sensor Olympics Test Development Committee.

Major General Doyle E. Larson began the Olympics in November, 1979, when he was the Commander of Electronic Security Command. It was Gen. Larson's hope that the games would express the appreciation of the Air Force command to its enlisted technicians. Since then, the games have grown and, in 1993, they were renamed the Sensor Olympics. The change came at the same time as the Air Force Intelligence Command was renamed the Air Intelligence

TSgt. Trickett, who is currently stationed in South Korea, returned to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio for the 24th annual Sensor Olympics Awards Banquet on Sept. 24, 2003. He was joined there by his wife Sulema. She watched as Major General Paul J. Lebras, AIA commander at Lackland's Joint Operation Center, placed the coveted Gold Medal around her husband's neck.

TSgt. Trickett a native of Warsaw, New York, has been in the Air Force for 15 years. His wife Sulema and daughters, Sara, Lauren, Victoria and Hannah, make their home here in Eldorado while Trickett completes his tour of duty in South Korea. He is the son of William and Faye Trickett of Warsaw, New York. He is the son-in-law of Zaragoza and Amparo Esquivel of Eldorado.

# County fathers eye long list of projects

Cemetery Chapel, Civic Center, Airport Fuel System among items considered by County Commissioners

Schleicher County will be moving ahead with construction of a chapel at the county cemetery just as soon as architect Gary Donaldson gets finished with the blueprints. That news came Monday, Sept. 29, when members of the Chapel Committee met with Schleicher County Commissioners to inquire about the status of the project. Wenona Isaacs and Juanice Orr explained that they had received several inquires from people who have donated to the Chapel Fund.

Judge Johnny Griffin assured the ladies that the county will move ahead with the chapel project as soon as possible. He also advised them that the county commissioners had set aside \$50,000 for the project in their upcoming budget. Ms. Orr noted that the Chapel Committee has collected more than \$16,000 so far and is ready to order five church pews, each of them 18-feet long, along with cushions, two pedestals and a minister's chair. The purchase will cost the committee some \$9,000 including tax. Construction of the pews could take as long as 120 days, it was explained. Meanwhile, the ladies intend to continue soliciting donations for the project. They intent to purchase ceiling fans and cover any other expenses that may arise.

The commissioners next turned their attention to a pending purchase of radio communications equipment. Emergency Services Coordinator Jerry Jones met with the men and went over the status of \$81,000 in combined county/city grant funds from the Homeland Security Dept. that are being used to order two Motorola repeaters, 10 mobile radios, 3 hand-held radios, all for use by the Sheriff's Office and Fire Dept., and two base station radios for use by the City of Eldorado. Jones explained that the purpose for the grant is to improve radio communications between the Sheriff's Dept., Fire Dept. and City personnel. It was noted that the county's old repeater and radio channel will be turned over to the County Road Dept.

County Library Jeri Whitten then met with the commissioners and informed them that the Library will be losing the services of Vonnie Dannheim, who has worked at the library under the State's Green Thumb Program. She explained that the program is suffering from state budget cuts and asked the commissioners if they would consider funding a part-time position. The library is currently open from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00

# Educator attends Oxford gathering

#### Assistant principal picks up 'multitude of ideas' at round table

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
Vickery Elementary School assistant principal Heliodoro T. Sanchez, Jr. remembers the moment he knew he would be an educator.

It was during fifth grade, when he realized that all of his peers weren't getting the same treatment and encouragement at school that they deserved.

Years later, fixing that problem is still important to Mr. Sanchez. He recently offered some ideas toward that goal during a prestigious roundtable discussion on improving education at the University of Oxford in England, where he was one of 12 people invited to make pre-

'I came back from the Oxford Round Table with a multitude of ideas," said Mr. Sanchez, 28, recently hired at the

new Flower Mound campus that opens next week. "All the presenters had great ideas on how to improve education, how to take it to the next level. I know I will be able to incorporate some of those ideas to help children succeed.'

Mr. Sanchez was one of 35 people invited to the Oxford Round Table at St. Anthony's College in the University of Oxford. The week long program, held in July, is designed to improve education. Participants are nominated by past participants and undergo a rigorous screening process, officials said.

Mr. Sanchez's honor came as no surprise to William Stockebrand, a former associate professor of educational leadership at Sul Ross State University.

"He was one of the best students I had," Mr. Stockebrand said. "It also would be fair to say that he was one of the most positive people. Nothing could shake him. He was always dedicated to doing a job right and beyond what was asked of him.
