## Livestock Show Action Highlights Weekend

A lot of action will be going on at the 4-H Show Barn Friday and Saturday as the annual Schleicher County Livestock Show and Women's Division will be held.

Activities begin today with entries for the women's division being received from 1-5 p.m. Categories are jams, jellies and preserves, pickles and relishes, canned fruits and vegetables, hobbies and crafts, art, needlework and quilts and afghans. Entries will be on exhibit Friday and Saturday. They should be picked up from 2-3 p.m. Saturday.

Also today, calves should be in ties by 6 p.m.

On Friday, entries in the women's division will be judged from 9 a.m.

until noon.

All livestock should be in the barn by 1 p.m. Friday. From 2-3 p.m., market lambs, hogs, shorn lambs and calves will be weighed in that order.

Market lambs will be judged at 6 p.m., and swine will be judged at 7:30 p.m.

Judging of shorn lambs begin activities at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Meanwhile, local women will be bringing their entries for the cake baking contest. Entries must be received by 9:30. Entries for the food show must be received by 10 a.m., with judging beginning at 10:15 a.m.

Highlight of the day will be the barbecue dinner at noon. Prices are

\$2.50 for adults and \$1.25 for those under 12 years of age.

Breeding cattle, bulls and heifers will be judged at 1 p.m., with steers being judged at 1:30 p.m. The champion and reserve champion steers will be judged at 3 p.m.

Presentation of awards will be at 3:30 p.m. and the livestock premium sale will be at 4 p.m.

The food premium sale will be at 5 p.m. and a lamb will be auctioned Chinese style at 6 p.m.

A dance featuring J.J. Mac and his Music Machine will end the fun, playing from 9-12 in the Show Barn.

In the lamb market class, Rex Jones, Tom Green County extension agent will be the judge. Tommy Everett, Reagan County extension agent will be the judge for steers, heifers and hogs. Steve Williams will be the auctioneer.

Superintendents will be Henry Speck, Jr., cattle; Bill Hausenfluck, lambs and Johnny Griffin, swine. Bookkeepers will be Karen Homer, Wilma Logan and Beverly Jarrett.

## Cake Contest Is New Feature

A cake baking contest will be an added feature of the women's division of the livestock show this year.

Adults over 18 years of age may enter, and there is no limit on the number of cakes anyone can enter. Entry forms do not need to be given in advance, but participants should call Nancy Lester at 853-2610 by Friday so that contest officials know how many entries to prepare for.

There will be two divisions, iced cakes (sheet, layer cakes and others that have been frosted) and uniced cakes (bundt, pound, fruit, etc.)

They will be judged at 10 a.m. Saturday on eating quality and appearance. Rosettes will be awarded to the top three entries in each division.

Entries and a copy of the recipe must be received by 9:30 a.m. Saturday in the Show Barn. They will not be sold and should be picked up from 2-3 p.m. Saturday.

All pastors are invited to attend the meeting which will include the annual election of officers for the ensuing year as well as discussion concerning community projects the association performs.

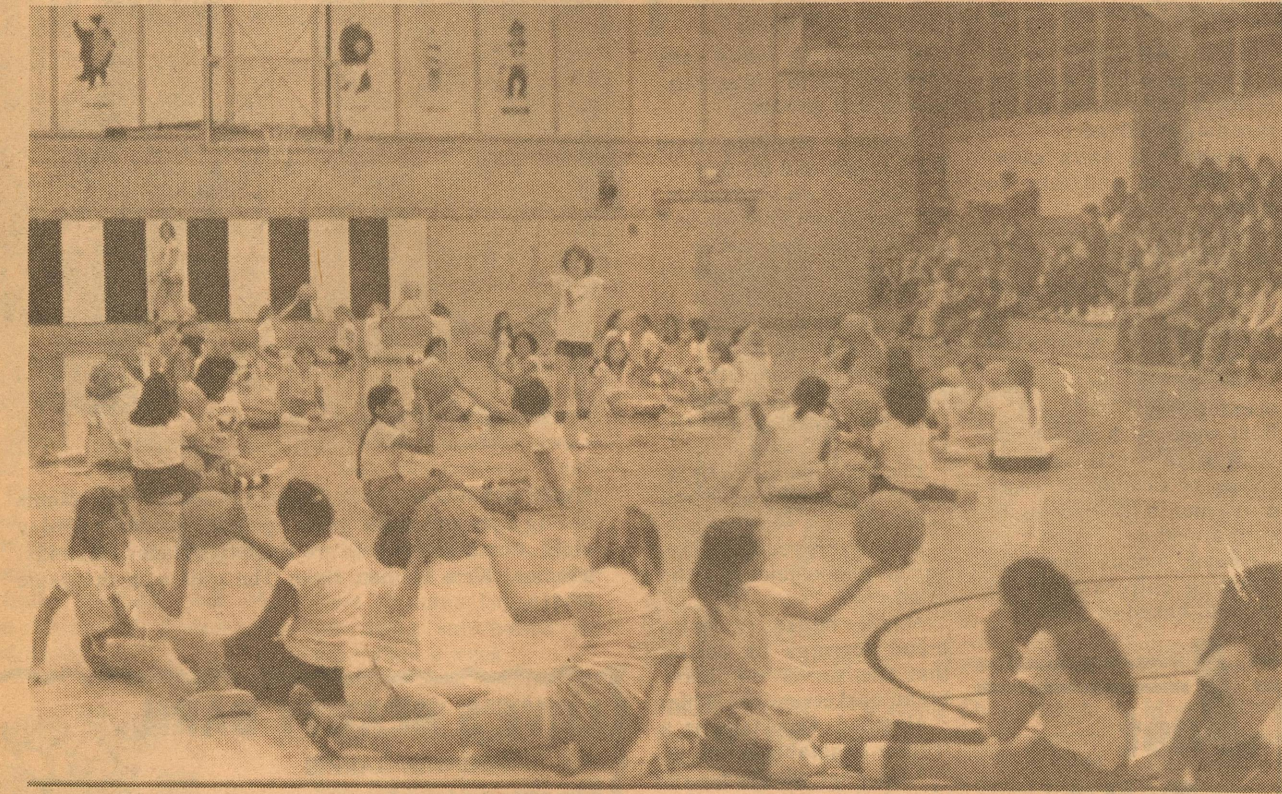
A community wide service has been planned for Easter Sunday in the Presbyterian Church at 7 a.m.

## School Board Accepts Construction Plans

A construction plan for Schleicher County Independent school system was given the go-ahead during a meeting of the board of trustees Monday night.

During the meeting, the board selected Jack Brown as a financial consultant for a \$1.2 million bond issue. Voters will chose new members for the board on April 7, and the board is hoping that will be the date called for voting on the bond issue as well. An official date for calling the bond issue has to be set during another meeting of the school board.

Three sketches of possible building plans have been presented to the board by San Angelo architect Gary Donaldson, but none have been selected as a definite choice.

Present plans call for using the \$1.2 million dollars for new elementary classrooms, a library-learning center, expanding the present cafeteria, and renovation of the present high school administrative offices into classrooms and furnishings for the buildings.

Meanwhile, board members feel they can use money from the regular budget to repair the track and seats on the football stadium.

In other business during the meeting, the board:

- Chose Southern Engraving Company as a supplier for senior rings.

## James Powell Appointed To UT Board Of Regents

James Powell, a well-known Schleicher County rancher, has been appointed to the Board of Regents of the University of Texas. He was appointed by outgoing Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

The appointment is for a six year term on the board.

Powell was appointed to the Texas State University System Board of Regents in 1971 by Gov. Preston Smith. He was reappointed to the board in 1977, and was chairman of the board from 1976-78. He resigned the position to accept the UT post.

The regents direct the affairs of the university, its medical schools and health science centers.

The rancher was named "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" in July and has hosted several result demonstrations conducted by the Extension Service for forage quality and work in range and livestock management on his ranch.

He is also serving as director for three banks, the First National Bank of Eldorado, First National Bank of Merton and the San Angelo National Bank. He is also a director of the West Texas Wool and Mohair Association in Merton.

- Listened to a status report on the cafeteria presented by Whitaker.

Judge Griffin pointed out that the 64th Legislature amended the statute which authorizes the appointment of county historical commissions and in so doing, broadened the scope of activities and responsibilities of the group.

Judge Griffin stated that in addition to the activities outlined in the statute, the county commission is to develop local history as a scholarly resource as well as a tourist attraction. He further stated that Schleicher County has a unique heritage of which every citizen should be justly proud and called on all citizens to support the goals and objectives of the county historical commission.

**DIETING**

You can avoid a waistline disaster when eating out by planning in advance.

Remember, extra calories do count and they do show — on you.

So, keep the following suggestions in mind:

- When eating lunch out regularly, plan smaller morning and evening meals.
- When eating a late evening meal out, eat a light snack such as a piece of fruit, a small cube of cheese or a couple of crackers earlier in the evening to curb appetite.
- Read menus carefully selecting entrees that are broiled, baked or grilled.

Avoid items which are prepared with breading, sauces and gravies.

Remove breading from fried meats and discard.

- Select plain vegetables. Cut baked potatoes in half and eat only one portion.
- Limit butter or margarine to one pat and season to taste. Decline sour cream, cheese and bacon bits.
- Green salads are an excellent slimming choice. Ask for dressing on the side.

Use only enough to lightly moisten and flavor the salad.

Better yet, request vinegar or lemon juice for the salad.

- Limit intake of extra bread servings by asking that the server not leave bread baskets on the table.
- Instead of cocktails try a fruit or vegetable juice.
- Ask that plates be removed immediately after finishing and do not return to buffet lines for seconds.
- When eating at fast food establishments, select the smaller burger or fish dinner.

Remove batter from fried chicken to save calories.

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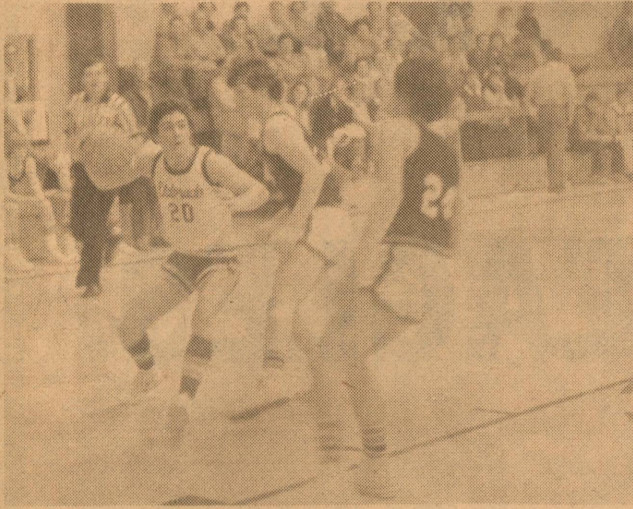
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# White Hits 30 Eaglettes Down Junction 54-43 For District Win

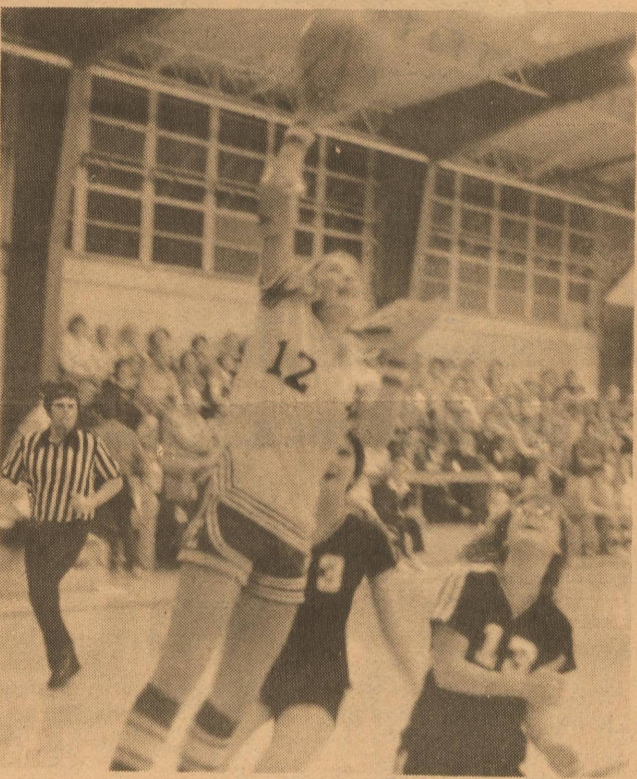

Diplomas will be mailed to graduates upon receipt from the engraver. December graduates may, upon request, participate in spring commencement exercises.

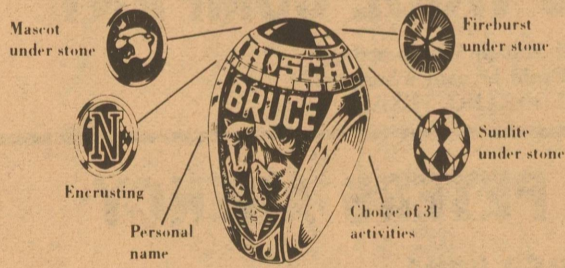

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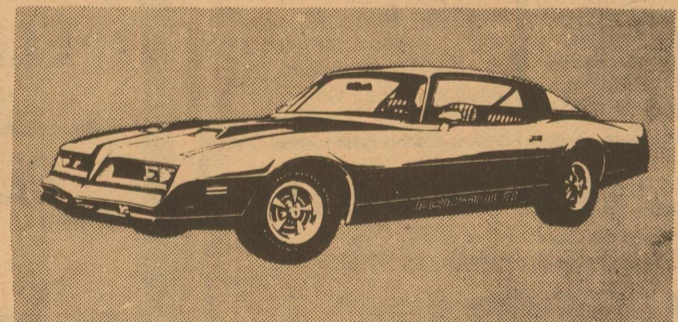

In seventh grade boys action Monday night coach Ken Thomas' chargers lost to the Sonora seventh grade 22-16.

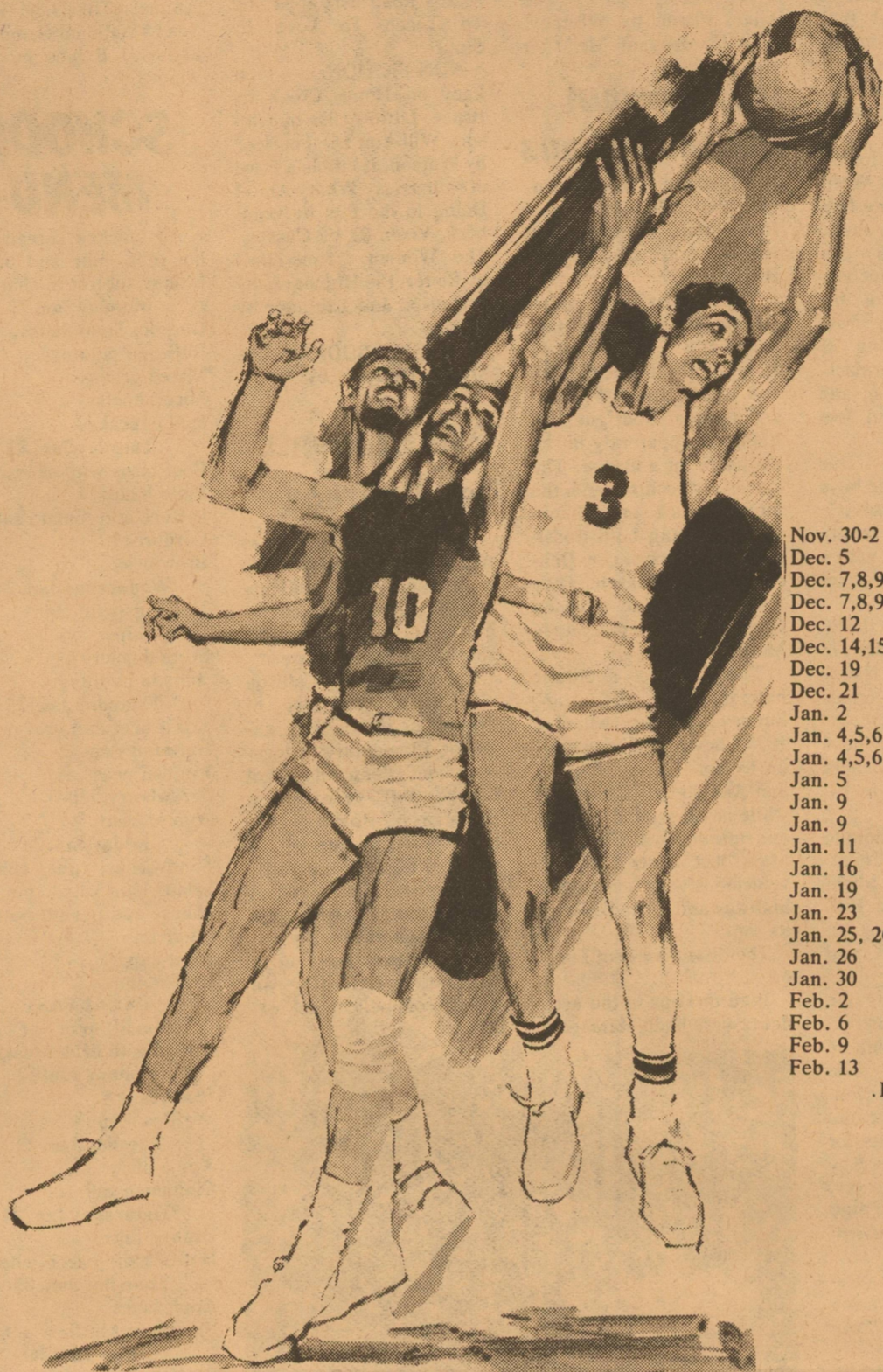

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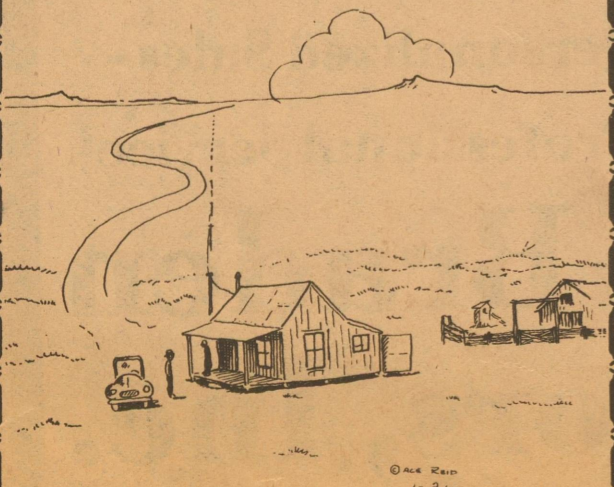

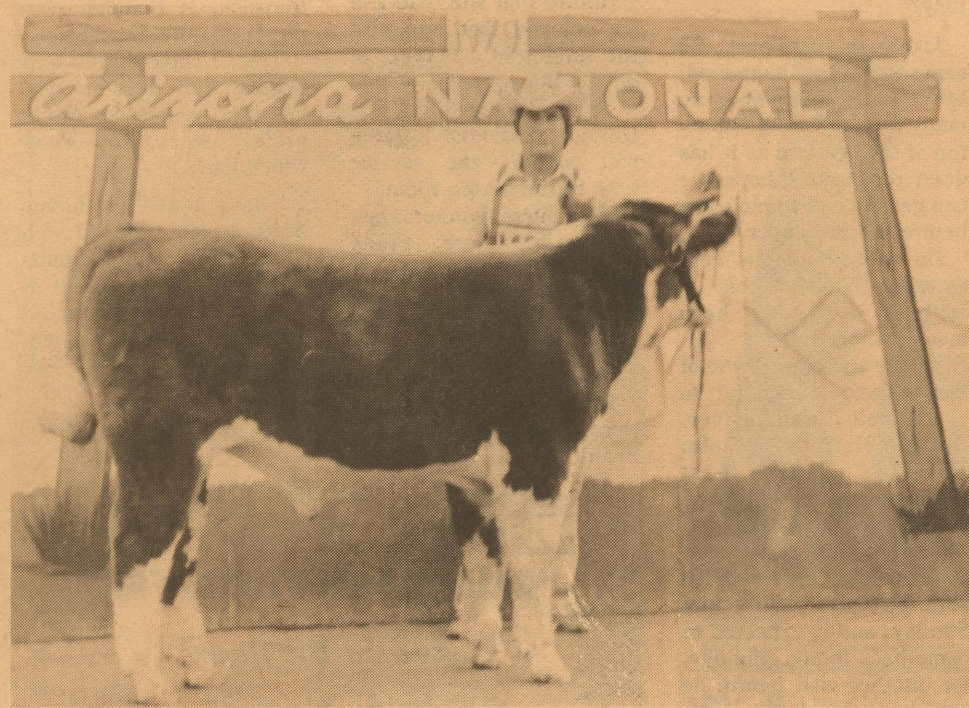
