Schleicher County Voters Okay Law Center

It was close, but the Schleicher County voters agreed to build a law enforcement center for the county and to establish a separate office for the tax assessor-collector during the election last week.

The law enforcement center proposal carried with 170 persons voting in favor and 132 voting against, with a total of 302 persons voting. In the separation of offices election, 179 persons voted in favor and 117 voted against, for a total of 296 persons voting.

who has been sheriff and county tax assessor-collector for many years, said, "I am humbly grateful that the voters of the county chose to vote in favor of both of the issues."

County commissioners will meet with an architect Sept. 24 during a regular meeting to complete plans for the law enforcement center. The new facility will have room for 14 prisoners in addition to office space for law enforcement officials who do not have office space at the

present time. There will also be cells for juveniles and women prisoners, visitation rooms and living space for a jailer. The building will be built on the northwest corner of the courthouse square out of native rock to match the courthouse.

The court will have to appoint a county tax assessor-collector for the new position. Edmiston said he would continue to serve until the first of the year. This will enable the court to take applications for the job, choose the person and have him or her bonded before he takes over on Jan. 1, 1980. The person will serve the rest of the term which expires Jan. 1, 1981 unless he runs for re-election and is elected during the general elections in November of 1980.

County Judge Johnny Griffin said the court would probably appoint tax assessor-collector during the Oct. 8 meeting.

The 302 voters represented only 21 percent of the registered voters in the county.

Bike-A-Thon Is Set For Sept. 29

Bike-a-thon chairman Rev. Don Williford is asking Eldorado and area residents to participate in the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital "Wheels for Life" Bike-a-thon Sept. 29.

Volunteer workers and riders are needed for the Bike-a-thon to raise funds for the world-famous research center and its battle against childhood cancer and other catastrophic childhood diseases. Rev. Williford said this year's ride is being dedicated to Lisa, a leukemia patient at St. Jude. "By riding for Lisa, we'll really be helping all stricken children since research is the only way these illnesses can be conquered," he said. "We're looking for people who will contribute some of their time and energy to help children live. We really need bike riders, since they are the ones who can make this Bike-a-thon successful."

In the Bike-a-thon, riders enlist sponsors who donate a sum for each mile completed. Riders who raise \$25 will receive a St. Jude T-shirt, and those raising \$75 will receive a back pack said Williford. "We also have prizes for other riders." Sponsor forms are available at the high school, Dairy Mart and the Leader's office.

"You can put your muscles to work for a child's life in this Bike-a-thon," Williford said. "We need every bike and every rider."

Eagles Stomp Iraan Braves For Second Win

In ideal football weather, the Eldorado Eagles stomped the Iraan Braves 25 to 6 in Iraan Friday night. The week started off with a victory rally before school Monday morning on the steps of the high school followed by plenty of spirit all week, a great pep rally Friday evening and a great win for the Eagles Friday night.

Charlie Bradley received the spirit award for the week and Keith McCormack received the player of the week award.

The game started off with Eldorado winning the toss and electing to receive. On opening kickoff, Randy Morrison, deep end for the Eagles, received the ball on the 10 yard line and behind a wall of Eagle blockers, ran 90 yards for a touchdown. Unfortunately, the touchdown was called back and did not count because an illegal block was made on the run. The Eagles were penalized 15 yards which brought the ball back to the 18 yard line for Eldorado. The Eagles were not able to move the ball and had to punt. Mickey Nixon backed up to do the punting into the high wind. The punt was blocked by a Brave and four plays later, the Braves scored on a two yard run with 8:48 left in the first quarter. The point after was blocked by Eagles Rojelio Adame and Charlie Bradley and Iraan led 6-0.

The Braves kicked off to the Eagles for a return to the 30 yard line. On the second down, and nine yards to a first, Tommy Martinez picked up a first down on a 24 yard run. Failing to pick up another first down, the Eagles had to punt. This time, Nixon's punt was good for 35 yards into the wind.

The Braves took over the ball. On the fourth down and short yardage, the Braves fumbled and Tommy Martinez recovered for the Eagles.

On the second play for the Eagles, a halfback pass was picked off by a Brave on the seven yard line and the Braves took possession again.

On the Brave's second play from the line of scrimmage, Iraan fumbled and Eagle Todd Swift recovered on the seven yard line and the Eldorado Eagles began flying. After not being able to move the ball on the ground, quarterback Randy Morrison connected with end Mike Griffith on a short pass in the endzone for the Eagles' first score, tying the game with 2:40 left in the first quarter. The point after was not good and the score remained 6-6.

Kicker Micheal Mertz kicked off to the Braves, with the ball going out on the 34 yard line and the Braves took over there. Unable to pick up a first down, Iraan had to punt. The punt was blocked by Eagle Joel Robledo on the 36 yard line and the Eagles took over.

On a fourth down play, the Eagles went into punt position and fake punt was run, but it only made seven yards and the ball went over on downs to the Braves.

Iraan picked up one first down and was forced to punt. Because of a high snap from the center, Eldorado got the ball on the Iraan 20 yard line.

On the Eagles' second down, a 15 yard penalty was called and this caused the Eagles' third down and 25 yards to go. A razzle-dazzle pass from half-back Michael Mertz to Griffith was good for 35 yards and another touchdown for the Eagles. The point after by Mertz was good and the Eagles led 13-6 with 8:43 left in the second quarter.

The Eagles kicked to the Braves, but the Braves could not move the ball and the mighty Eagle defense held the Braves to a minus two yards

and forced them to punt again.

Eldorado took over and picked up a first down on a pass from Morrison to Mertz which was good for 10 yards. On the next series of play, a third down pass from Morrison to end Keith McCormack was good for seven yards and another touchdown for the Eagles with 4:34 left on the clock in the second quarter. The point after was not good and the Eagles led 19-6.

Eldorado kicked off and the ball was downed on the 20 yard line for a no return. The Braves fumbled again on the second down and Eagle Tommy Martinez recovered on the 37 yard line and the Eagles took over again.

On the first down, a pass from Morrison to McCormack was good for nine yards. On the second down, another pass from Morrison to Griffith was good for 27 yards and another touchdown for Eldorado with 3:42 left before the half. The point after was not good and the fired-up Eagles led 25-6.

The Eagles kicked off to the Braves. After making four first downs, the first half ended and the happy, happy Eagles led the field with a 25-6 lead.

yards.

After picking up eight yards on two plays, the Eagles were penalized for five yards for taking too much time. Needing seven yards, Morrison kept the ball and picked up 14 yards for a first down. On the next series of plays, a third down situation, McCormack ran for 20 yards and picked up another first down. A pass from the quarterback to McCormack was good for another 20 yards and a first down. Then the Eagles failed to move the ball and had to turn it over to the Braves.

On the next series of downs, the Eagle defense held the Iraan team to a minus nine yards and forced the Braves to punt.

The Eagles took over. On the second down, a pass from Morrison to McCormack was good for 14 yards and a first down. But a fumble on the next play gave the Braves the ball.

The Braves kicked up a first down on two runs for 17 yards. A 15 yard penalty against Eldorado gave the Braves another first down. But, on the next series of plays, the Eagle defense held and the Braves had to turn over the ball on downs.

Eldorado drew a five yard penalty for delay of game. Eagle Charlie Bradley picked up 11 yards on two carries and Eagle Benny Harris picked up 13 more yards on two carries giving the Eagles a first down.

With only seconds remaining on the clock, the Eagles ran the time out and left the field winning 25-6.

Leading tacklers for the game were Bobby Lozano and Rojelio Adame who lead blocking and pass protection, which was essential in the game.

The next game for the Eagles will be against Ozona Lions at the Eagle Stadium in Eldorado.

Officials Discuss Paving Project

City and county officials and a number of local residents met in a joint session at City Hall last week to look into the possibilities of a city-wide paving project.

The meeting came about after a group of citizens living on the Old Merton Highway met with county commissioners asking that their road be paved. However, the city limits lies down the middle of the road, so the residents requested a joint meeting between the two governing bodies.

After a 45 minute discussion between the three groups, the general consensus was that both the city and county were willing to join together in a paving project, but there were several limitations.

County officials noted that they could not provide funds for the project, mainly because they were not receiving farm to market road funds from the state as they had previously.

Also, they are limited by laws that prohibit them from using county equipment inside an incorporated city's limits unless a certain kind of work-agreement can be arranged. They are also limited because of an injunction forbidding them from using county-owned equipment on private property.

Both the city and the county officials say they are limited as to the number of qualified personnel they have to operate equipment needed to pave streets, but between the two may have enough equipment to do the job.

Officials agreed that contracting the job would be too expensive so they would like to cooperate with each other in such an endeavor.

City officials assured the group that street paving is one of the council's primary goals and has been discussed during each meeting since January. They added that street paving would be one more step of progress to match the growth of population the city has seen recently.

Mayor Jimmy Doyle said, however, the city would begin by resealing the existing streets first and then go on to a paving project. He said he would also try to see about obtaining the asphalt for a paving project and hiring temporary personnel qualified to pave streets.

City officials agreed to discuss the matter further and notify the county if and when a paving project could begin. Several residents and officials noted this was the best

relationship between the city and county in several years.

After the joint meeting with the county officials, the city council met separately and again on Thursday for the following business matters:

- *Met with Fred Teagarden with S&K Engineers who explained need for a waste water treatment plant and the necessary paperwork to apply for a federal grant.
- *Renewed insurance on the water tower.
- *Read a letter to the school asking for a joint meeting about closing

Hill and Oak Streets which are on the school campus. The city feels it needs legal counsel before the streets can be closed.

*Interviewed two persons for water and sewer superintendent.

*Renewed street material source agreement with Patton Enochs for the next six months.

*Adopted a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 assessment valuation.

The council met again on Monday of this week to attend to all the items on their agenda and interview water and sewer applicants.

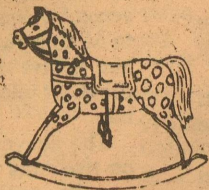

Revised Student Handbook

EDITOR'S NOTE—This is the third part of a series on the student handbook as revised by the school board. The handbook is not only for students, but also for their parents. The handbook was passed out to the students at the first of the school year. Regulations for the Use of School Building, Grounds and equipment.

Care of the Building—Eldorado High School, built in 1950 ranks among the best in Texas. This property is public property and was made possible by the citizens of this community. A student body is often judged by the way it takes care of the school unit as a whole. Writing or carving or any other destructive practices will not be tolerated by the Administration. Payment for damages done will be required. Care for the school property as though it were your own, whether it be books, desks, athletic equipment, etc.

Use of Building
 a. Students are not to enter the building prior to the bell on regular days. Those who find it necessary to enter the building before the first bell must report to the teacher on duty to receive permission to enter, except in cases of emergency.
 b. During bad weather pupils may enter the building before school and at noon with these conditions:
 (1) High School students may enter the front door or the door near the lunch room and remain in the foyer in an orderly manner.
 (2) Junior High students enter the east door and remain near the entrance in an orderly manner.

Grounds
 An attractive school must have clean, well-kept grounds. Disciplinary action can result from littering and abuse of school property.

School Uniforms and Equipment
 All school uniforms must be checked out to the individual by the person in charge and in a state of good repair. School property used by students must be checked out to them and returned in a state of repair.

Use of Special Rooms
 Gym—The gym is to be used only under the supervision of a faculty

member. Smoking will be allowed in the foyer only. Street shoes or tennis shoes that have used outside the gym may not be worn on the gym floor. All participants must be properly dressed. All equipment must be placed at the end of each class or game.

Absolutely no refreshments will be allowed in the gym. The foyer and outside area will be used to accommodate those who wish to have refreshments.

Positively no tobacco of any kind will be allowed in the gym proper.

Auditorium—The auditorium of our school is in constant use and the cooperation of everyone must be had to keep it in order. All persons using the stage must remove the props immediately after practice or performance unless special permission is granted to leave them. All borrowed properties must be returned the day after the performance. Pupils using the auditorium must be supervised by a faculty member.

Tennis Courts—Our tennis courts may be used by any student or member of the community but only when not in use by members of the school tennis teams. Tennis shoes only must be worn on the courts and wheeled devices of any type are prohibited. Any person misusing the facilities may forfeit the right of use.

Band Hall—The Band Hall is under the supervision of the band director. All music, instruments, equipment and uniforms must be restored to their proper places after each practice session.

Lunch Room—The lunch room is an auxiliary service to provide you with a hot, well-balanced noon meal. Lunch tickets can be purchased from the secretary in the office at \$16.00 for 20 meals or \$4.00 for 5 meals. If the meals are bought individually, the price is 80 cents a meal. All lunch charges must be paid before semester examinations may be taken. No more than 10 charges may accumulate (additional arrangements may be made with the superintendent of schools). At the noon bell all persons eating in the lunch room are to form a line by classes and pass by the lunch room secretary to pay for your meal or have your lunch ticket

punched. After finishing your meal, you are responsible for returning your tray, dishes, silverware, and waste to the window at the rear of the cafeteria. Soft drinks are not allowed in the cafeteria.

Library—Information and Rules:

(1) Hours—School days 8:00 to 4:00 (May be adjusted to fit school needs)

(2) Borrowers—Students and faculty members

(3) Numbers of books—Up to the discretion of the Librarian

(4) Time limit—Books may be retained one week and may be renewed once for the same period if a book has more than 250 pages.

(5) Reserve books—Reserve books may be used at any period during the day, but they may be kept for only one period at a time. Reserve books (except Encyclopedias) may be charged out of the library after school opens the following morning except Saturdays.

(6) Overdue books—At the end of each 9 weeks the student must have cleared all borrowed books to take his or her examinations. Failure to clear overdue books before

scheduled examinations may forfeit the student's right to take examinations.

(7) Damaged—Any loss or damage to a book must be paid by the student to whom the book is charged.

(8) Permit—A student must have a written permit from one of the teachers when he or she goes to the library and must leave the library when not actively engaged in its use.

(9) Magazines—Must not be taken from the library or defaced; magazines will be sold to guilty party for regular price.

(10) Students write their own names on the library cards. No one can charge a book in another person's name. All books are to be checked in by the librarian.

(11) As students enter the library, they are to sign in, find their assigned places, and begin to work at once.

(12) Faculty members are encouraged to use the library, but are requested to check out all materials through the librarian.

(13) Any students that remove library material from the library without checking it out will lose their library privileges until they are reinstated by the Administration.

The team is also hampered by injuries suffered by Jimmy Lloyd who broke a bone in his foot and Gene Edmiston who broke his hand in the Sonora scrimmage.

ENMIENDAS CONSTITUCIONALES PROPUESTAS ELECCION ESPECIAL 6 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1979

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 108)

La Resolución Conjunta #108 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas referente al nombramiento y a los plazos de los notarios públicos.

La enmienda propuesta: —Requerirá que el Secretario de Estado nombre a un número conveniente de notarios públicos para el estado; y —autorizará para que los plazos oficiales para notarios públicos sean por no menos de dos años y por no más de cuatro años.

La provisión temporal de la enmienda constitucional propuesta declara que la enmienda entrará en vigor el 1° de enero de 1980; que cada persona que haya sido nombrada como notario público antes del 1° de enero de 1980 continuará ejerciendo como notario público hasta vencerse el plazo por el que fue nombrado; y que esta provisión temporal se vencerá el 1° de enero de 1982.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

“La enmienda constitucional para el nombramiento de notarios públicos para el estado para un plazo de no menos de dos años ni de más de cuatro años, según lo previsto por la ley.”

PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 133)

La Resolución Conjunta #133 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para proveer una revisión del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo. Esta enmienda propuesta permitirá a la Legislatura el decretar leyes:

- Para proveer una revisión legislativa del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo;
 - Para prescribir condiciones para que las leyes sean puestas en vigor;
 - Para suspender, revocar o expirar las reglas;
 - Para prescribir procedimientos; y
 - Para delegar autoridad a cualquiera o a ambas cámaras, o a los comités de cualquiera o de ambas cámaras.

- “La enmienda constitucional para proveer una revisión legislativa del

proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo.”

PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 13)

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados “Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds” (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Tejas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces compradas con préstamos garantizados. Estos fondos serían usados también para adelantar un porcentaje del principal y del interés debido en esos préstamos, a la persona que califique para el préstamo. La Legislatura también podría autorizar al comisionado de agricultura para que venda cualquier terreno adquirido mediante esta enmienda. El comisionado de agricultura requeriría al menos un 6 por ciento de interés en dichos préstamos. La enmienda propuesta apropiaría la cantidad suficiente para pagar el principal y el interés de los bonos que vayan adquiriendo más valor, o que se venzan durante el año fiscal, menos la cantidad del fondo de interés y amortización al final del año anterior.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: “The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law.”

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: “The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called “Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds” of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

“The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.”
