

School District Receives Grant For Elementary

A grant for \$14,381 has been awarded to the Schleicher County Independent School District from the Department of Energy. The grant has been designated for use in making the old elementary building more energy efficient.

Grants to talling \$3,772,235 have been awarded to 109 recipients in the State of Texas under the U.S. Department of Energy's "Grant Programs for Schools and Hospitals and buildings owned by Units of

Local Government and Public Care Institutions," it was announced last week by Curtis E. Carlson, Jr., Acting Regional Representative for the DOE in Dallas.

Under the programs for authorized by Title III of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act of 1978, DOE is making grants to eligible institutions which have applied in accordance with a state-wide plan developed by the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

oeffler Praised By Conservatives

Congressman Tom Loettler has been lauded by' a nationwide citizen's organization for his voting record for the first session of the 96th, Congress (1979). '

Loeffler along with, Representatives James Collins, William Archer, "Kika" de la Garza, and Richard White were all rated with 100 percent marks by the group, Conservatives Against Leberal Legislation (CALL).

CALL Chairman Rhoda Stahlman also issued an attack against representatives Mickey Leland and Bob Eckhardt, both of, whom received zero percent ratings. Stahlman, while blasting Eckhardt

and Leland for their "antiquated" policies, had nothing but praise for Loeffler and the four other congressmen who scored 100's.

"These congressmen have done an exceptional job of representing their constituents," she said. "They have supported legislation that offers solutions to the problems created by the liberals in Congress like Eckhardt and Leland.

"We commend these conservative congressmen for their committment to their constituents. It is not always easy to be a conservative in the thoroughly liberal environment of Washington.

The CALL rating shows that the Texas delegation is generally conservative, with 16 of the 26-member' delegation scoring over 75 percent. Stahlman, in outlining the votes on which the Texas delegation was rated, stated the votes were divided evenly among economic, defense, regulatory and social issues.

"Congressmen Collins, Archer, de

la Garza and Loeffier voted against the creation of yet another needless bureaucratic institution--the Department of Education. This vote was important. It was another example of the government's desire to control our lives, in this case, the education of our children."

'These five congressmen also voted to balance our federal budget. They voted for increased defense spending. They voted collectively against the giveaway of our Panama Canal in the interest of our national security and the stability of Central America."

As an educational organization, CALL devotes most of its time to egislative matters and to increasing citizen awareness of the voting records of members of Congress. "We simply want to make sure the

Predator Day Scheduled Friday

The Schleicher County Producers Association has announced that it will conduct a predator control day this Friday.

This action has been taken after the recent losses sustained by area ranchers and the increase in the amount of killings of coyotes. Considerable sheep losses have been recorded on the Bob Oglesby, Ed Meador, and Steve Blaylock ranches. An independent helicopter operator from Sanderson recently recorded 7 coyote kills.

The day will consist of a "Coyote drive" in an attempt to drive the majority of these predators from the County. Volunteers on horseback will be assisted by a helicopter from Texas A&M Predator Control Service in their attempts to drive the coyotes into open territory to be disposed of.

Approximately 75 horseback riders are needed to aid in the drive. riders will not be allowed to carry firearms either.

Because of public response to the situation, the City Council will be taking applications for an Animal Control Officer to alleviate the stray animal population. An agreement has been reached with the veterinary hospital in Sonora to house the animals for Eldorado until they are either called for by their owners (who must pay all expenses) or time has run out to hold them.

The Animal Control Officer will follow guidelines as set by the City Council. Currently the plans call for all loose animals to be picked up because the number is so great. Once the animals are picked up they will be taken to Sonora where they will be held for a maximum of 3 days. If not called for within the

alloted 3 days, the animals will be destroyed in a humane manner. Before an animal can be released to its owner, the owner must pay all lodging charges impounding fees, and any necessary medical expenses (shots). These are strict guidelines because voluntary control has not worked. The Animal Control Officer will work at necessary to keep the number of loose animals in control, starting as soon as possible.

Eldoradoans are asked to keep in mind any articles placed near their trashcans or in the alley could be picked up by the City Sanitation Crew. The alleys are not storage areas and the City cannot be responsible for the loss of any thing stored there.







Loeffler Receives Award

The National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), the largest small business group in the na-tion, announced today that by voting in support of key small business issues 90 percent of the time during the 96th Congress, U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler of Texas has earned its "Guardian of Small Business Award" an of Small Business Award" and had been endorsed by NFIB's political action committee (NFIB PAC).

In announcing the award, Wilson S. Johnson, president of the 620,000-member group--with 55,145 of those members in Texas -explained that the "Guardian Award gives recognition to legislators who support small business, and at the same time assures our members of how their legislator is representing them in Congress. "Quite often," says Johnson, "some legislators will claim support for small business by voting for such things as a Small Business administration appropriations bill. We feel, however, that NFIB members should know how their legislator voted on each of those issues which we consider of key importance to small business."




