Because of delivery dates, orders need to be placed six to eight months in advance. One will be a 71passenger bus used mainly for out-of-town activities and the other will be a 19-passenger bus used for regular route use.



# **IRS Information**

Taxpayers who become sick or injured on the job and receive sick pay benefits from their employer must include the payments as income on their federal tax return, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The payments are taxable whether they were made directly by the employer or from a welfare fund, a state sickness or disability fund or an insurance company, provided the plan was paid for by the employer.

Benefits received under an accident or health insurance policy for which the employee paid the premiums are not considered taxable by the IRS. More information on sick

pay benefits is contained in the free IRS Publication 525, "Taxable and Nontaxable Income." It can be ordered on the handy order form in the tax package or by calling the IRS Tax Forms/Information number listed in the telephone dir-

# **ATPE Dislike Judge's Ruling**

The Association of texas Professional Educators (ATPE) representing nearly 30,000 educators, has labeled the federal judge's order that would require public schools to provide bilingual education for Spanishspeaking students through the twelfth grade as "totally unrealistic.'

ATPE's Executive Director, Mike Morrow, said that U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice's ruling is "not only educationally unrealistic, but will also perpetrate segregation of Hispanics and Anglos.'

ATPE, whose state president teaches at Santa Rosa in the Rio Grande Valley, supports the bilingual program currently in effect which provides for classes to be taught in Spanish from kindergarten the third through the third grade.

"The unkindest thing that we can do to our Spanish-speaking students is to create an atmosphere that is totally unrealistic to the world they must face upon graduation. The fact is that for individuals in this state and country to succeed, they must be proficient in English, both written and spoken. One of our main objectives, therefore, is to teach English, Alafair Hammett, ATPE state president and a veteran teacher of 30 years,

She maintains that most children who are in the current bilingual program and are encouraged to learn English, are proficient enough by the fourth year end of the third grade, to perform in English-speaking classes.

# Sonora And **Eldorado Receive Sales Tax Payments**

State Comparatier Bob Bullock Thursday made payments totaling \$33.1 minion to nearly a thousand cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

The payments represent the first rebates to cities this year who collect city sales rax and about \$10 million more than the cities received in January of last

Sonora and Eldorado both showed dramatic increases in the amount of sales tax received for the

ceived \$19,659.88, a 209 percent increase over the \$6,360.62 from 1979. Eldorado showed a 112 percent increase from

\$2,762.24 last year to

\$5,873.36 this period. Other area cities showing increases were Ballinger, \$6,419.99, up 71 percent; Big Lake, \$10,977.52, up 154 percent: Iraan, \$4,756. 11, up 53 percent; McCamey, \$2,938.35, up 59 percent; Menard, \$1,420. 31, up 32 percent; and San Angelo, \$225,712.63, up 40

Mertzon with \$1,621.48. Rankin with \$1,431.70 and Rocksprings with \$1,910.12 all went without a first month payment in 1979.

Only Brady with an 11 percent drop to \$12, 923,20 and Del Rio with a two percent falloff to \$43,852.18 showed losses among area

The biggest check-\$6.6 million-went to Houston, a 31 percent increase over last January's check.

Dallas received a check for \$3.7 million, a 42 percent increase over the \$2.6 million received last year. Fort Worth will receive a cheek for \$1.2 million compared to \$971,920 for the


same period last year. San Amonio will receive a check for \$1.7 million this month compared to \$1.3 million for January of 1980.







# **Farmers Can Apply For Conservation Programs**

by Becky Jones Farmers may apply for agricultural conservation program practices at their local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"We encourage farmers to sign up as soon as possible because their practices must be approved by the county committee before the work can begin," stated Ronnie Mittel, County Executive Director of the Schleicher County ASCS. Farmers who start practices prior to approval are ineligible for cost-shares, he

The agency encourages farmers to correct soil and water conservation problems, and where needed, assists them with costshare payments.

Program funds are available for the establishment of permanent vegetative cover, seed and seedbed preparation, improving permanent vegetative cover, seed and overseeding operation, cross fencing, brush control, constructing diversion terraces, storage facility, and installing pipe-





lines for livestock water. 'These practices are conservation-oriented, not production-oriented, and will provide enduring solutions to the problems of farmland being a source of agricultural pollution or land affected by wind or water erosion," said Mr.

The ASCS conservation program is a joint effort by farmers and the Government to restore, protect, and preserve the environment. For more complete details on specific practices, call or visit the local ASCS office in Eldorado. The number is 853-2838.



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
