The Mason Punchers, District 9-2A champions, defeated Eastland 29-12 in bi-district action and hosted the Moody Bearcats last Saturday in a regional match-up. The game was expected to be a sell-out at Puncher

The Punchers, coached by Don Abbott, dominated Eastland on every count. They had 366 total yards to Eastland's 136. The Punchers, cashed in on four intercep-

Coach Abbott was able to play most of the team during the victory, which enabled Mason to advance against the Bearcats.

However they found things unfavorable for the first time since early in the season, when the Punchers were beaten twice in pre-district

Coach Johnny Clawson believed

Abbott's Punchers to be capable of winning the Moody contest, but crucial turnovers caused them to come up short, 14-10.

The Announcement has been withheld pending the end of their season. Eldorado was honored by the other 9-2A coaches as Senior Keith McCormack led five other Eagles honorees. Keith was the only member of the team to be elected to the first team. He was selected as a defensive back due to his alertness in the secondary and good speed.

For instance, Senior Mike Griffith's versatility garnered him positions both ways as a defensive back and flanker. Mike impressed the coaches with his aggressive style of play also. Texans Baptists Give To Brazilians

This Christmas, Texas Baptists are working to give Brazilian Baptists one of the best Christmas presents they have ever received--a \$2 million missions offering called Lottie Moon Plus.

The \$2 million Plus offering is part of a total statwide goal of \$10 million for the annual Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, a special offering taken in Southern Baptist churches to help support foreign missions.

In one of the largest cooperative mission ventures in history, Texas Baptists are working with Brazilian Baptists and the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to double the number of Baptist churches and members in Brazil--6,000 chruches with a million members--by 1982 the Brazilian Baptist Cen-

tennial. More than 10,000 decisions for Christ have been reported this year by about 500 Texas Baptist who have paid their own way to help Brazilian Baptists win their nation for Christ, said Texas Baptist Executive Director Ĵames H. Landes.

Dr. Landes anticipates that at least 2,000 other Texas Baptist volunteers will go to share their faith with Brazilians in the next two years.

Texas and Brazil have much in common and are strong allies for world missions, said Landes. Southern Baptist missionaries from Texas--W.B. and Anne Luther Bagby--organized the first Brazilian Baptist church in 1882.

The \$2 million Christmas gift will go to aid a "Major Cities Evangelization" program which pairs ten Brazilians cities with Texas cities and areas.

The Brazilian cities and their Texas counterparts which have been matched include Sao Paulo and Houston; Rio de Janeiro and Dallas; Belo Horizonte and Fort Worth; Curitiba and El Paso; and Recife and Amarillo-Lubbock-Plain-

Other partners include Salvador and San Antonio-Austin-Waco; Fortaleza and San Angelo; Belem and Wichita Falls; Victoria and the Golden Triangle; and Brasilia and Midland-Odes-



Now the weather prognosticators are saying the whole pattern will change drastically as a result of St. Helen's volcano burps.

Weather people are pre-dicting very hot and dry summers and cold damp winters in the sunbelt. And the frightening thing about it is the fact that is what we have witnessed in West Texas for a year or more. Last summer was hard on livestock as well as the land. Already we have seen two snows this fall.

Most parts of Central and Wst Texas did receive good moisture early in autumn... enough to grow some grass and weeds before frost. In my travels west, quite a contrast has come to the terrain in three months.

Visiting on the Keith Mitchell ranch in Terrell County before the holidays, I noted that country wet and green. A snow proved to be an asset following some good rains. "Matter of fact, the snow

here and on our Alpine ranch has delayed shipping of cattle for four weeks." commented Mitchell. "But those kinds of delays we can live with," he smiled.

Bill Frertag of Eldorado talked about the good cover of vegetation in Schleicher County along with expressing his jubilance at not having to feed so heavy

However, some problems are coming as a result of the moisture, for instance, Loco Weed is breaking out in a big way in the Alpine/ Marfa country. And with the summer drought followed by a wet fall, some of the pecans in San Saba have not matured or have fallen

from the trees before. The same thing is said of acorns in parts of the Texas Hill Country. Although the liveoak product is falling early, it is nonetheless providing a small meated kernel keeping deer away from feed blinds and sheep and goats scattered in the past-

Well, perhaps the hardest hit area in Texas last summer was the Southwest part of the state. Going from a drought said to be the worst in half a century to flooding from hurricanes probably the worst on that side of the scale, weather patterns have indeed changed.\$

So, if what the weather people believe to be more than theory proves to be fact, those of us in the sunbelt may need reconsider moving further south. And again, we may need to change our lifestyles and plant earlier, harvest earlier and stockup for winter





Texas Foragé Picture Mixed--Forage quality and quantity are mixed over Texas, but for the most part, quantity is down while quality is better than last year, says a range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service,

Texas A&M University System. This situation has been brought about by drought conditions in late 1979 and through most of this year followed by September rains. These rains brought a lot of droughtstressed grasses back to life and caused an upsurge in quality, with protein content doubling and tripling in some cases.

Legumes Getting More Popular--More and more pasture growers throughout Texas are planting legumes, says a forage specialist with the Texas

The fee for this service is \$35.00 to employer/community representatives and \$15.00 to applicants seeking positions. The Texas Project M.E.D.I.H.C. is a state funded program sponosred by the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, School of Public Health. This matching service is free of charge for both the employer/community and the health professional. At the end of its first year of operation in June 1980, the NHPPN had received applications from more than 1400 dentists seeking positions as well as
